Tonight one hundred and seventeen seniors of the Twin Falls high school will be presented with diplomas by the board of education and the faculty of the high school. These young people will go out with the blessings of the Magic City and the good wishes of every citizen of Twin Falls. We hope they will realize the sacrifice that the fathers and mothers have made that they might possess this training which should fit them for greater service in life and more usefulness to humanity. If this training fails in that particular then our school system has failed inasmuch as the average student fails to grasp the great lesson which has been presented. The taxpayers of Twin Falls sacrifice every year because they believe in better schools and if our student body realizes this then lesson alone is worth the price.

Our highway boards have a solemn duty to perform in building new roads for the people and they have a double responsibility in keeping roads already built in proper repair. Thousands of dollars have been spent in Twin Falls county for road building. Some of these are paved roads and others are gravelled roads, but regardless of which type of road building has been constructed, both require a certain amount of repair from year to year. The board which builds either type of this kind of road and goes off and forgets it is following a policy which is both unwise and uneconomical. Because no road was ever built so well that it did not deteriorate in time and need repair. Several of our hard surfaced roads leading from Twin Falls have begun to go to pieces rapidly and unless these are repaired they will soon be worse than ordinary dirt road. The old adage is appropriate here, "A stitch in time saves nine."

The acquittal of former Governor Jonathan M. Davis of any charge of bribery or fraud indicates stronger than ever that this suit was brought largely for spite. Few people who have read of the case are inclined to think that the former governor of Kansas was actually guilty of soliciting a bribe for paroles of prisoners from the state penitentiary. That his son used his father in this particular goes without saying. But many son nowadays thinks that such a procedure is perfectly legitimate and perhaps young Davis felt that way about this abuse. But to lay anything of this nature at the door of a good, honest oil dirt farmer such as Davis is cannot but sound preposterous to the average thinking individual. But the thing that hurts is that such jealous, mean spirits are abroad in the land today. One really wonders whether such people would not, if they could, take all the joy of living away from their neighbors. We are not laying this dirty trick at the door of the Republican party, because we do not believe that this was a partisan affair. The part that the Journal-Post played in this campaign of vituperation and vilification is deplorable beyond all terms of expression. A newspaper may be justified at certain times of acting the part of a detective and prosecutor in hunting up evidence but this particular case looks too much like a kid that gathered up his playthings and went home because the other boy would not play as he wanted to play. The spirit of revenge and destruction seems rampant today as never before and this trial of Ex-Governor Davis is the result of that spirit, we believe.

## KANSAS GOVERNOR IS NOT FIRST MARTYR

Former Governor Jonathan Davis is not the first not Kansan who suffered mentally for the sins of a son. When the Wilson-Gorman tariff bill was before the senate in July, 1894, the son of United States Senator W. A. Peffer in some way got a tip that the duty on sugar would be increased before the final passage of the measure and invested in sugar stocks quite heavily, making some money on the transaction. Senator Peffer was not a member of the finance committee and as a populist, though in some things supporting President Cleveland, was not close to Senator Gorman, the most reactionary of democrats. Although there was nothing to connect Senator Peffer with the tip received by his son, he was subjected to many scathing attacks by the republican press of the state. Peffer was beaten for re-election in the fusion legislature in 1897 for other reasons, and in 1900 supported McKinley on the issue of imperialism. His financial honesty was never successfully attacked, though his ability was regarded as small while in the senate.

Speculation on the part of the son of General Leonard Wood last year in Philippine business was attributed without proof to alleged tips from his father, the governor-general. This is a reversal of the doctrine of the sins of the father descending on the children.

## Watch for These

A familiar pest is the tent caterpillar, which is very destructive to all fruit trees. The reddish brown moth lays its eggs in clusters, the caterpillars being brownish and more frequently in Oregon than in other histories. There was an Albert the Great away back in the thirteenth century, a Spanish nobleman bishop of Toledo, who was so unusually fond of his garden that the peasant accused him of being too cleverly provided with nests and nurseries. During the same century there was an Alfonso of Empuries Bishop of Tortosa, who made a pilgrimage to Austria and at the same time founded a hospital by its people. Historians term Albert a monaster and he seems to have worked energetically to deserve the epithet.

Albert means "mildly bright, illustrious," a significance that did not always prevail. The caterpillar feeds on the leaves of the tree and the leaves fall to the ground, covering with a varnish-like substance, say the American Forestry Magazine. Washington, D. C., has caterpillars in the spring and the young caterpillars make their way to the nest fork, where they spin a little tent of silk to protect them. They work day and night feeding on the leaves and adding to the tent as they need more room. If there are many caterpillars working a tree they strip off the leaves.

## LEGION OF COUNTY PREPARES FOR THE ENDOWMENT DRIVE

Eastend Workers Are Already Busy; Purpose of Fund Includes Work of Rehabilitation and the Care of the Orphans and Families of Disabled Soldiers.

The campaign for the raising of the American Legion Endowment fund, which started in the east end of the county, is now in full swing. The Eastend division is in charge of John W. Hardin of Kimberly, an enthusiastic worker in the cause.

The purpose is to raise an endowment fund of \$5,000,000 to endow permanently the American Legion work behalf of disabled World War veterans and their dependents.

The American Legion cannot use a penny of the fund for its own organization purposes; it is an organization authorized to administer and subject to audit by inspection.

### Rehabilitation Work

It is proposed to assist in the rehabilitation of veterans through this fund, supplementing the work of the Red Cross and other organizations that are unable to technically meet governmental proof connecting disability with service.

It is estimated there are now 5,000 disabled veterans who are not cared for properly. It is proposed to establish a biferent system, for orphans and disabled veterans, which will be operated on a non-profit basis.

When the purpose for which the fund is subscribed has been fulfilled it becomes the property of the government.
