ATHLETIC FANS ARE UNABLE TO DOPE OUT WINNER OF HALF MILE EVENT BETWEEN ALLEN HEITRICH, WORLD CHAMPION, AND NURMI

There is no question that Nurni is one of the greatest runners that ever lived and Heitrich is probably the best middle distance runner developed in this country since the days of the Marston. The problem is to dope Nurni's form over a short route, the race being similar to a match between Babe Ruth, the champion slugger of baseball, and Tris Speaker, the king of the two base hitters. If they were to meet in a double hitting contest, Nurni can run short distances. He is famed here chiefly for distances over the mile and it is not generally known that he is the sprint champion of Finland. That does not mean so much, however, as the Finns are not a sporting nation.

Nurni was in the same condition now that he was during the Olympic games. He would have the odds of 7 to 5 that he would win. Lawson Robertson, head coach of the Olympic team, after watching Nurni in Paris said, "If that fellow went out to do it I believe he could take every runner west of the sand dunes."

Nurni said yesterday at the point where he is training that he did not feel quite sure of himself and that he was not certain he could not hurt himself out.

The board which builds either type of this kind of road and goes off and forgets it is following a policy which is both unwise and uneconomical. Because no road is ever built so well that it did not deteriorate in time and need repair. Several of our hard surfaced roads leading from Twin Falls have begun to go to pieces rapidly and unless these are repaired they will soon be worse than an ordinary dirt road. The old adage is appropriate here, "A stitch in time saves nine."

The acquittal of former Governor Jonathan M. Davis of any charge of bribery or fraud indicates stronger than ever that this suit was brought largely for spite. Few people who have read of the case are inclined to think that the former governor of Kansas was actually guilty of soliciting a bribe for paroles of prisoners from the state penitentiary. That his son used his father in this particular goes without saying. But many a son nowadays thinks that such a procedure is perfectly legitimate and perhaps young Davis felt that way about this abuse. But to lay anything of this nature at the door of a good, honest old dirt farmer such as Davis is cannot but sound preposterous to the average thinking individual. But the thing that hurts is that such jealous, mean spirits are abroad in the land today. One really wonders whether such people would not, if they could, take all the joy of living away from their neighbors. We are not laying this dirty hat at the door of the Republican party, because we do not believe that this was a partisan affair. The part that the Journal-Post played in this campaign of vituperation and vilification is deplorable beyond all terms of expression. A newspaper may be justified at certain times of acting the part of a detective and prosecutor in hunting up evidence but this particular case looks too much like a kid that gathered up his playthings and went home because the other boy would not play as he wanted to play. The spirit of revenge and destruction seems rampant today as never before and this trial of Ex-Governor Davis is the result of that spirit, we believe.

KANSAS GOVERNOR IS NOT FIRST MARTYR

Former Governor Jonathan Davis is not the first-noted Kansan who suffered mentally for the sins of a son. When the Wilson-Gorman tariff bill was before the senate in July, 1894, the son of United States Senator W. A. Peffer in some way got a tip that the duty on sugar would be increased before the final passage of the measure and invested in sugar stocks quite heavily, making some money on the transaction. Senator Peffer was not a member of the finance committee and as a populist, though in some things supporting President Cleveland, was not close to Senator Gorman, the most reactionary of democrats. Although there was nothing to connect Senator Peffer with the tip received by his son, he was subjected to many scathing attacks by the republican press of the state. Peffer was beaten for re-election in the future legislature in 1897 for other reasons, and in 1900 supported McKinley on the issue of imperialism. His financial honesty was never successfully attacked, though his ability was regarded as small while in the senate.

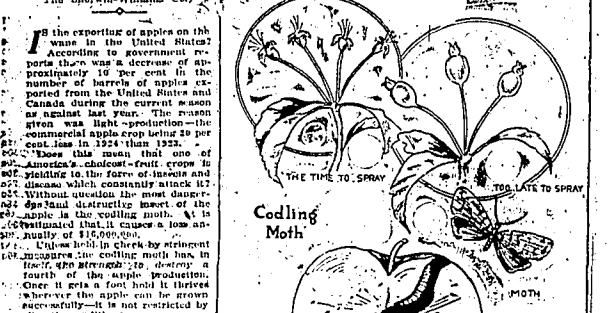
