Delaware is facing a marked shortage of prepared public school teachers, particularly for rural schools. It was necessary last year to issue more than a hundred provisional teacher certificates. In practically all cases these were issued to graduates of four year high schools who had received at least six weeks of summer training.

Topographic and geographical surveys of the Craters of the Moon area in Butte county in co-operation with the United States geological survey were authorized as one of the new projects for 1925 and 1926 at a meeting of the state board of control of the Idaho bureau of mines and geology which held its annual meeting last week in the office of Governor C. C. Moore.

"Style show" competition was another name for the sixth annual girls' clothing contest, under the auspices of the Texas State Department of Education, and open to all public schools in Texas maintaining home economics departments. All clothing exhibited was the work of the girls and, through cooperation of the State Mothers' congress, prizes of silver and linen were presented.

Milk receipts at the Wendell cheese factory have increased rapidly in the last few weeks, and are now nearly 100 per cent more than they were a month ago, according to Roy Dean, the local manager of the factory. The factory paid 44 cents a pound for butterfat for the month of April, which is 10 cents more than the price paid the first half of April last year, and 7 cents more than the last half of April of last year.

The fishing season in Idaho does not open until Monday, June 1, but due to the fact that two holidays, Memorial day and Sunday, precede that date, reports have been circulated throughout the state that the state game department would issue permits allowing fishermen to fish on those two holidays, but these reports are denied by the game department. "It is top bad that the fish and game department of Idaho hasn't a heart."

RAILWAY TO USE TRUCKS

A great railroad company has placed an order for a fleet of trucks to cost a million dollars and will use them as feeders for the road. This new era has been in process of dawdling for some time but now it may be said to have arrived. All of which is of special interest to Idaho. We are just entering upon a road program which appeals to the people. These roads mean that a majority of the farmers will have access to market. It is hardly probable that any more railroads will be built in this state except to make connections and gather up loose ends. But the transportation along the highways will become greater each year. Our road program is not large enough and it must expand sufficiently to put a good road in easy access of every farmer in the state. The program works to that end.

The age of iron is being supplemented by the age of cement, the steel rails are carrying the big loads but the eighteen foot highways are carrying on an equally important work as feeders.

IDAHO IS GETTING BETTER

While Idaho felt secure for its immediate present market for dairy products the thoughtful dairymen were apprehensive of the future markets. Now comes the carefully prepared letter of the National City Bank of New York with a survey that is encouraging.

The heavy stocks of storage butter which depressed the markets last fall and in the early winter disappeared rapidly in later months, particularly in March, and prices improved accordingly. They are now about 42 cents per pound, New York, against 37 cents one year ago.

Butter producers are agitated by apprehensions of increased supplies and are making a plea to the tariff commission for an increase in the customs duty from 8 to 12 cents per pound. The chief competitor at present is Denmark, a country with a total cultivated land area of 10,625,000 acres, which compares with 22,148,223 acres in farms in Wisconsin. It seems almost humiliating to take refuge from Denmark behind tariff barriers, for as to soil, climate and feed supplies the Danish butter-makers certainly are at a disadvantage in comparison with the butter makers of this country. The fact, indeed, is, that the value of cow feed imported into Denmark from the United States usually exceeds that of imports of butter from Denmark into the United States. When the trade relations between the two countries are considered in their entirety the situation affords still less excuse for hostile action on our part, as in 1924 exports from this country to Denmark amounted to about \$49,413,028, while imports into this country from Denmark amounted to \$6,118,264. On the whole, they seem to be doing quite as much for us as we are doing for them.

Largest Man on Record
Miss Duncanson, who at the time of his death in Tennessee in 1857, weighed more than 1,000 pounds, is said by some authorities to have been the largest man ever in any record. He was 6 feet 9 inches in height, and at the time of his death weighed 1,000 pounds. He was fifty-five years old when he died.

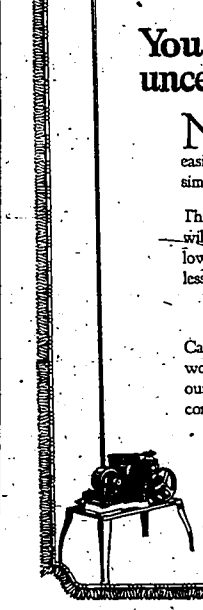
