## NURMI LOSES RACE TO U. S. HALF-MILER

### Penn State Star Middle Distance Runner Defeated Paavo Nurmi by Twelve Yards in Half Mile Race; Finn is Tired and Tried Too Fast a Pace in U. S.

NEW YORK, May 27.—Tired, worn and stale from a campaign that was too much for a superior Paavo Nurmi, world's champion distance runner, returns home to Finland tomorrow with a tired assortment of trophies. He beat everyone in this country at his first race but when he stopped out of his race last night and attempted a race where sustained speed and not durability was the main essential he was defeated.

Nurmi finished 12 yards behind Allen Helfrich, of Penn State, one of the greatest middle distance runners on the track in a special half mile race on the track at the Yankee stadium. It was the final appearance of the Finn.

It is not generous to Helfrich, a fine boy and a superior runner, to say that he is only fair to blame the rather crushing defeat of the Finnish star upon lack of condition. Helfrich finished 12 yards ahead of Nurmi in 1:56.4 which does not compare to Helfrich's nine year old record of 1:52.1-2.

Those who had seen the great Nurmi run in Antwerp and in Paris at the Olympic games, and in his early races on the boards in this country, know that he was not there when he tried to keep up with the faster American.

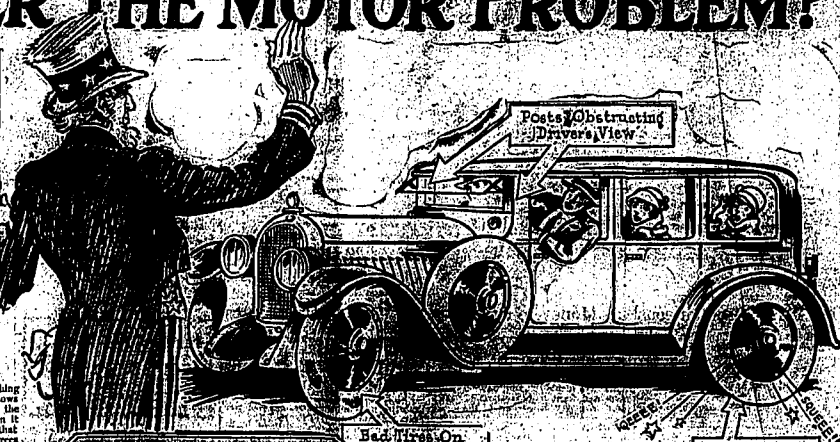

# WHAT WILL HAPPEN IF UNCLE SAM TAKES OVER THE MOTOR PROBLEM?

### An Appalling Death-List, Mounting Yearly, With Injured Reaching Into The Hundreds of Thousands, Makes Auto-Safety Question of Tremendous Importance To Owners and Non-Owners Alike



**E**VERY now and then Uncle Sam amends his Constitution or takes some other radical step for the "greatest good of the greatest number." His most recent action was in the matter of beverages. What if his next move was to untangle some of the big problems that have been forced upon us by the amazing growth of the automobile industry?

Herbert Hoover, secretary of the Department of Commerce, acting as chairman of the conference on Street and Highway Safety, appointed a Committee on the Motor Vehicle, and the report of this committee, rendered a few weeks ago, is of interest to the owners of the 15,000,000 automobiles and motor trucks now rolling through our streets and over our country roads.

**Motor Killed 18,788 In 1925**  
In 1925, the last year for which complete figures are available, automobiles were responsible for 18,788 deaths. If an earthquake or flood had destroyed every soul in California, Pennsylvania, or Arizona, the disaster would not have been more appalling. And this number refers only to deaths. The multitudes injured by motor cars amount into the hundreds of thousands.

In addition to insuring more safety by means of greater "vision" the all steel body offers greater protection in case of collision. Its superiority over wooden bodies in this respect has been demonstrated by the superiority of steel alloy coaches over the now obsolete cars of wood.

**No Need For "Blind Spots"**  
In declaring there is no practical reason for permitting a continuance of the blind spot frequently found in closed cars by reason of the heavy wooden construction that supports the windshield, the committee probably had in mind the all steel body which many manufacturers now equip their chassis. The all steel body is set down to a minimum the bulk of the body at the right and left of the windshield, and allows a maximum of vision to the driver as well as in the other directions.

**Bad Tires on Front Wheels**  
Regulation was undertaken. In the early regulation the question of spare tires was treated as being of paramount importance and practically nothing was done to ensure that a safe driving light should also be obtained. As a result, the Illuminating Engineers Society and the Society of Automotive Engineers took up the subject in a very serious manner, with the result that a certain form of light distribution was

on the part of the owner. Up-to-date the lamp equipment on the cheaper cars cannot be expected to unambiguously fulfill the requirements of this type of regulation.

It is recognized by the committee that regulation of the headlights is a very difficult problem, due not only to the conflicting requirements as outlined above but also to the wide range of conditions under which motor cars are operated. The regulations described above have been made legal in a very considerable number of states, but will be impossible to enforce until the final standardization of these regulations.

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**Bumper Dangerous!**  
The bumper as developed up-to-date has been worked out almost entirely from the point of view of safeguarding the vehicle upon which it is mounted, and it is recognized that undoubtedly desirable results, the committee stated, "It may also possibly conduce to the safety of passengers seated in the vehicle upon which it is used, but there are certainly no facts available to support this proposition definitely."

**Better Vision For Driver**  
This is a matter of extreme importance in that the most has been given the attention that it deserves, the committee stated. "It applies both to passenger cars and to many types of commercial vehicles.

**Would Use Engine As Brake**  
The committee found that there are few if any motor vehicles built today that are sufficiently large braking surfaces to control the car without overbraking or, at least, a high degree of retardation by using the proper combination of gears.

**Five-Sixths of World's Motor Cars are in U.S.**  
worked out as being the best compromise between absence of glare and the sufficient light for safe driving.

**Poor Enforcement of Laws**  
This light distribution is obtained by the use of either special mirrors or lenses, or both, in connection with very delicate adjustment of the headlights themselves. These mirrors have been put into force in a very considerable number of states during the past few years, either by legislation or regulation. It is fair to say, however, that only one or two states have made a serious effort to enforce the regulations as laid down. It is more and more apparent, however, as time goes on, that we have not yet reached an ideal solution of the problem.

**Better Lamps Needed**  
The accurate working out of the direct light distribution requires a better lamp equipment than has been commonly furnished up-to-date and a certain degree of care and attention

**Industry's Gigantic Growth**  
That the automobile should finally become the object of official study and possibly of technical investigation is evidenced by the unprecedented growth of the industry producing in 1925 over 15,000,000 passenger cars and trucks with a wholesale valuation of \$4,700,000,000. There are today in the world approximately 20,000,000 automobiles of which more than 14,000,000 are operating in the United States.

**Enforce Headlight Regulations**  
Secretary Hoover's committee regards the question of proper illumination of roads for night driving as a most difficult one, and there is here for its consideration. Although several states have laws regulating automobile headlights, the committee stated that in only one or two was there any serious effort being made to enforce the law.

**Glare of Early Gas Lights**  
The first headlights of any real power on motor cars were of the acetylene type, and when first used were criticized very severely as producing glare. This was due to the fact that most other vehicles had either no lights at all or else very ineffective oil lamps.

**When the electric headlight was introduced as part of automotive equipment, there came a time when the number of motor cars on the road was increasing with extreme rapidity and the combination created a very undesirable condition. This was partly due to the early design of the electric headlight in which the most objectionable possible was produced by the aid of a high-power bulb in connection with a parabolic reflector.**

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**There is no practical reason for allowing this condition to continue and stringent measures should be taken to**

### Secretary Hoover's "Committee on the Motor Vehicle" urges less obstruction of driver's vision, the use of motors as brakes, and favors engine governors to prevent speeding.

### Recommendations of Secretary Herbert Hoover's Committee

### Brakes

They should stop a car going 30 miles an hour in not more than 30 feet.

### Driver Vision

Automobile bodies should be designed to give the driver the maximum amount of vision.

### Headlights

Present lighting regulations should be more rigidly enforced.

### Tires

The use of badly worn or repaired tires, especially on the front wheels, should be avoided as a possible source of danger.

### Speeding

The committee is of the opinion that a practical governor controlling the speed of this vehicle is desirable.
