

# DEATH TOLL MOUNTS IN HEAT ZONE

Most Disastrous Heat in Month of June Since Establishment of Weather Bureau; Loss of Life Reaches 112 and Sun Burns Again for Fifth Day.

(United Press.)

The most disastrous June heat wave since the weather bureau was established, has increased its toll to 112 lives this morning, when, for the fifth successive day, a rising tide of heat enveloped a large portion of the nation.

Soaring temperatures, coupled with low humidity, were expected to continue havoc and suffering, with no relief in sight for the next three days.

Forty-four more deaths attributed to the heat during the last 24 hours have created a mortality list that has no parallel in the weather records for the month of June. Sixty-eight fatalities previous had occurred during

Only the Pacific seems to have entirely recovered from the heat wave. In some rural sections of the affected districts fear is felt for the crops. Precautions against the possibility of forest fires have been taken in Michigan and Minnesota.

been broken in New York during the past 24 hours when at one time the mortality reached 95. Nine more deaths occurred in the metropolitan district, bringing the week's total to 15. Thirty-seven other casualties were attributed to the meet.

Reports from other cities, particularly those of the middle west, mentioned a movement of the island.

NEW YORK—Nine more deaths have increased this city's heat toll to 15. Casualties involving 37 other persons during the last 24 hours also were attributed to the extreme temperatures.

Down in the smouldering caverns of the east side, men, women and children leaved out of tenement house windows till long past midnight, seeking a breeze of fresh air that was not there. Others walked the streets. Suburban roads were congested by motorists seeking relief in the country.

Be Reopened by Crawford Moore  
of Boise.

 and H. B. Methoppe, from the San  
 Francisco City branch of the federal  
 reserve bank, Crawford Moore, presi-  
 dent of the First National bank of  
 Idaho, Boise, give rise to a flood-  
 of rumors concerning the reopening  
 of the First National bank of Buhl.  
 That there is some truth in these  
 rumors there is no doubt but nothing  
 can be definitely stated except  
 that negotiations are being made  
 which successfully carried out may re-  
 sult in either the reopening of the  
 old bank or the establishment of a  
 new one.

The First National bank was closed  
 March 19 by reason of the fail-  
 ure of the federal reserve bank to  
 extend any further credit. —Buhl
