

SHEPHERD MAY PROVE OYSTERS CAUSED DEATH

Star Witness White Returns Unexpectedly; Physician Who Attended Millionaire Orphan Testifies That Ward Had Eaten Raw Oysters at Banquet; Co-Guardian Gets Huge Sum Is Claim.

CRIMINAL COURT ROOM, Chicago, June 12.—Attorneys for William D. Shepherd today attempted to show that his client died from typhoid fever contracted through eating raw oysters.

Through cross-examination of Dr. Rufus D. Stolp, who attended Billy during his fatal illness, it was brought out that Billy had eaten raw oysters two weeks before he became violently ill.

"Did Billy admit eating oysters?" Shepherd's attorney asked Dr. Stolp.

"He did," the physician replied. "He said he had eaten them at a hotel two weeks previous."

"How long, in your judgment does it take typhoid germs to show their effect?"

"From one to two weeks," Shepherd, who is in the act of murdering his wealthy wife by feeding him typhoid fever germs, leaned back in his chair and smiled.

It is Shepherd's contention that Billy's illness was contracted while attending a banquet with his fiancée, Miss Isabel Pope, at which raw oysters were served.

Dr. Billy had been called as a state witness and told Billy's first attorney that he would testify that his client died from typhoid fever until the case was advanced.

"I am not convinced," the witness said, "that the young man was suffering a very malignant case of typhoid fever."

William Scott Stewart, Shepherd's chief counsel, claimed the physician's testimony as an admission of guilt, especially when Dr. Stolp testified that there was an epidemic of typhoid fever in the neighborhood of Billy's home.

James Herrick, a typhoid specialist, who was called in to assist Dr. Stolp during Billy's illness was the next state witness.

White then walked up to the court room, where a recess was taken for several weeks. White had his body with him.

When he disappeared, State Attorney Robert E. Crowe charged White had been bought by the defense.

As all the state's attorneys were in attendance at the Shepherd trial a fight broke out in the courtroom.

BISHOP RICE HAS CHALLENGED BRYAN TO PROVE MIRACLES

Dearest Liberal Churchman Chief James Nobles as Members of The Church and the Rev. Bryan to Join, and Explain, Virgin Birth.

DENVER, Colo., June 12.—Citing Clarence Darrow, Nicholas Murray Butler and Robert H. Ingham as liberal members of the active liberal church, an article which Bishop Frank H. Rice today announced his willingness to accept a stipular honor, upon William Jennings Bryan with certain stipulations.

Bryan must prove the virgin birth by "reliable evidence" and that he must be willing to carry out the "miracles of our Lord" by duplicating the resurrection of Christ.

In regard to proof that duplicating the resurrection of Christ is an impossible task, Rice declared he would accept the modern adding machine and mathematical sciences.

"No further," specified that Bryan prove the blood atonement by chemical analysis; the bodily resurrection by natural biological construction and evidence required in a modern court of records; the deity of Christ by the human species, and the origin of man by the age of rocks instead of by natural biological construction.

"In matters of command and sacrament," Rice said, "I will accept his acceptance of the honor, should he have all the fiber of his nature and the power of his mind, and should the percentage of alcohol be lawfully increased, your body would be made of pure wine which would be increased to the lawful percentage is raised."

The proposer was directed to Bryan in the form of an open letter addressed to "Dear Mr. Nicholas Brotherton," which was certified before a notary public.

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MEXICO MUST PROTECT U. S. INTERESTS

Secretary Kellogg Threatens to Withdraw American Support From Mexico Unless Our American Rights and Lives Are Protected; Mexico Is On Trial Before the World.

WASHINGTON, June 12.—Secretary of State Kellogg, in his first notable act since becoming head of the nation's foreign affairs, today bluntly rebuffed the Mexican government's contention of relations with the United States in a factory and virtually threatened withdrawal of American support.

He heralded with the tenor that the international situation of diplomatic relations among nations is not a matter of mere courtesy and politeness, but a matter of vital importance to the United States.

Washington, June 12.—Secretary of State Kellogg in a statement today declared that the Mexican government is now on trial before the world and will receive the support of this government only so long as it protects American lives and rights and curtails its international engagements and obligations.

A great deal of property of Americans has been taken under or in violation of the exaction laws for which no compensation has been made and other property practically ruined and in one instance, taken by the unreasonable demands of labor.

STRIKERS IN CHINA STOP ALL FOREIGN TRADE

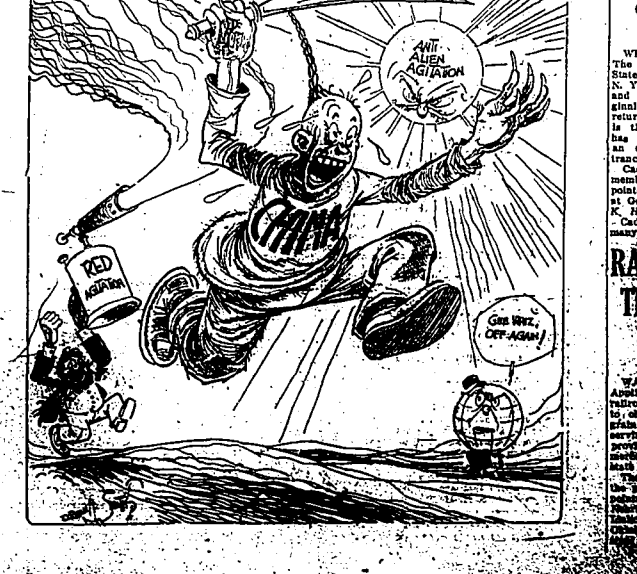

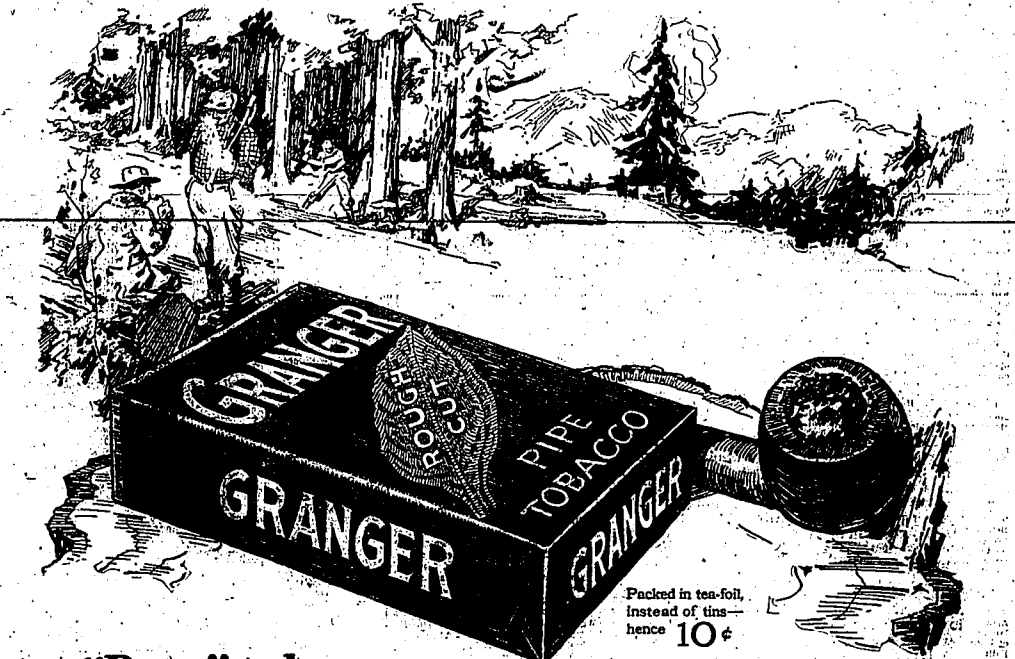

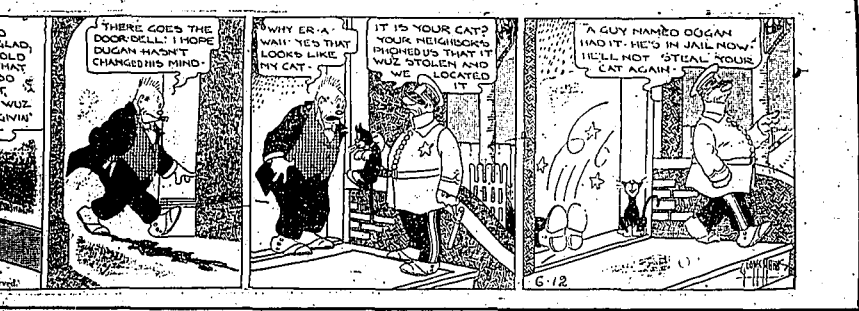
