In New York City, for instance, the better journals pass by a countless amount of such material every day because they regard it as too sordid or too commonplace. Selection and truthful presentation, not suppression—that is what the intelligent and conscientious should ask for. Even The Christian Science Monitor, contrary to common belief, prints some news of crime. It does so when it thinks that he crime in question seriously affects history. It recorded recently the shooting of the Sirdar of Egypt and has had some details about the assassinations in Bulgaria.




