## DYER OPPOSES REGULATION BY THE GOVERNMENT

**Dean of Economists at Vanderbilt University Makes Talk Against the Federal Control of the State in Management of Industry.**

Declaring the possibilities of natural development in Twin Falls in the way of factories and waterpower is wonderful from the point of view of almost any country, Dr. C. W. Dyer, dean of the department of economics of Vanderbilt University, Nashville, Tennessee, spoke before the Rotary club at dinner on Wednesday evening at Tom's Cafe. Rivivals and city officials were guests of the Rotary club.

Dr. Dyer, who was introduced by Charles Seely, manager of the Twin Falls branch of the Idaho Power company, displayed particular concern and stern opposition to the extension of governmental regulation over public utilities. The government, he stated, is driving the best men out of the railroad business. The railroad companies, he said are subject to four bores: congress, the interstate commerce commission, transportation board, and the labor brotherhood. He attributed the increased cost of railroads to the multiplicity of control to which he said the railroad business is subjected.

**Industry Is Leaving No Doubt**—The present trend in industry toward decentralization. There is an economic reason now for the rising of industrial plants in congested urban areas. Electricians are now seeking the freedom of small towns or rural situations. The central location of the community toward governmental control of business is to be a determining factor in the location of business interests in the future in the opinion of Dr. Dyer. He charged government and politics at the present time with being deserved by the man of business who can be declared now to avoid politics and participation in government.
