## FILIPINOS IN ROW ON HOSPITALITY

American Congressmen Asked to Accept Hotel Accommodation as Guest of the Leader of the Philippines and Are Charged with Trying to Influence Them in Favor of Independence.

MANILA, P. I., July 9.—Widepread discussion rest the city today following the report that Filipino congressmen have accepted the invitation of the Philippine president to stay at his residence while they are paying the hotel bills of a party of American congressmen who arrived here last night.

There were 12 congressmen and secretaries in the group, which reached Manila aboard the army transport Chaumont. Most of them were in Manila during the naval maneuvers there.

The expose resulted when a few members of the party refused to accept the offer of free lodgings and disclosed the secret.

Opinion of the colonists is split, regarding the propriety of accepting the invitation. It is "the consensus of more courtesy the same as we do at home."

Opponents, however, declared that "such an exposure of such a substantial nature is impossible."

Senate President Quezon deplored the revelation, "newspapers coming in from the last days have placed the Americans in an embarrassing position."

The local press has entered into a heated discussion over the episode, the Filipino newspapers defending the visitors and the American publications ridiculing the affair.

"The Times," of Manila, said, "the story is calculated to embarrass our visitors by deliberately misrepresenting the nature of a friendly visit, which is what it really is implied. The implication that politicians are scheming to influence the minds of the colonists regarding independence is vicious."

The Times, an American daily, said, "the visit of the Americans is a mere courtesy call, not calling for the expenditure of money for propaganda purposes. It is poor strategy to let the colonists control the independence cause, which are already converted. It is wise to save the funds for lobbying the republicans who have not yet been won over to the cause of independence, spending missions and defunct press bureau."

Porterfield was born in 1852 in the Bronx, N. Y., and came to Idaho in 1883.

He attended the University of Michigan and studied civil engineering.

Mr. Porterfield was one of the first engineers to work on the Twin Falls irrigation project.

He was a member of the Idaho Irrigation Engineers Association and was a member of the Idaho Society of Engineers.

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# RAILWAY MEN CONFER HERE ON SHIPPING

Preparing for Interstate Conference at Boise; Say Twin Falls Has Nation's Best Crop; Need Advertising.

President of the National Farmers for Railways committee, who came for heavy crops to be harvested in the Twin Falls country; H. J. Arnott, from the American Legion association, and L. H. Gibson, of the state board of public utilities, were in Twin Falls to discuss the problems of commerce and produce dilemma relative to the shippers' regional board meeting to be held in Boise.

Mr. Arnott and Mr. Gibson continued on to Bush this noon, where they were guests of the Rotary club at luncheon.

"You have the finest crops in the nation," said Mr. Arnott. "Your system is a revelation to me and should gain nation-wide publicity. What a difference there is between your California's advertising ability and life-time publicity both on the marvelous facilities and the superior products of our great state."

Conferences were held with local members of the various commodity committees who will make their recommendations to the national farmers for the states of Idaho, Utah, Wyoming, Colorado and Nebraska. T. C. Bacon is chairman and Dr. M. M. Chapman, the state livestock committee; L. L. Breckinridge has the state chairmanship on the state shippers' committee.

The state shippers' committee: Carl D. Louis, potatoe; C. E. Munson, can; E. J. Ostrand, lumber and William E. Ketchum, grain, are all represented on the carload lots. A dairy and poultry products committee is to be organized with members from the district.

In the Afternoon:

Attending by all interests are used shippers at the Hotel Postoffice, and by Mr. Arnott and Mr. Gibson, so that an accurate and satisfactory arrangement for fall freight movement can be made.

Twin Falls is estimated, will ship 1000 carloads of potatoes, 1000 to 1400 carloads of beans. Large crops are to be harvested all over the state, says Mr. Arnott, and will have a 20,000,000 bushel wheat crop.

To Visit Here:

It is hoped to go to M. J. Gormley, who has charge of the car distribution, and, also, to see Mr. Arnott, who will discuss more fully the car situation.

The main body of the association, which will be here on July 12, will not be able to come over the Twin Falls tract—the day following—unless it was hoped, by reason of previous arrangements, to have a special car provided for a stopover at Parma for lunch and picnic and further stopovers cannot be obtained.

# WHEAT CROP IS LESS THAN IN YEAR OF 1924

WASHINGTON, July 9.—The condition-of-wheat-in-the-United-States on July 1, was 73.4 per cent, forecasting a total production this year of 680,000,000 bushels, the department of agriculture estimates today.

This compares with a condition of 73.2 per cent, on June 1, when the crop was 70.4 per cent, and a forecast of 685,000,000 bushels, the department of agriculture estimates today.

The estimate for acre this year was 125 bushels compared with 161 last year and a five year average of 152.

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
