

INTERNATIONAL RELATIONS UP TO CHURCHMEN

Federal Council of Protestant Churches Explains That Purpose of Coming Conference Is to Secure Consideration of Affairs of Nations from the Viewpoint of Christianity.

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 11.—Seeking the facts.
That is the object of the churches in calling an Institute on International Relations from the Christian viewpoint at Chautauque, N. Y., July 20-25, according to a statement by Dr. Sidney L. Gulick, secretary of the commission on International Justice and Goodwill of the Federal Council of Churches, under whose auspices the gathering will be held.

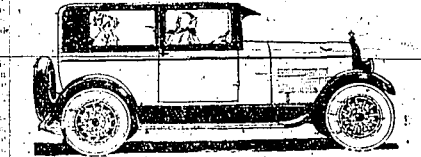
