DARWIN KIN RUNS STORE NEAR TRIAL

Relative of Famous Father of Evolutionary Theory is Dayton Merchant; Descendants of Scientist in Tennessee Are Divided in Regard to the Truth of the Doctrines of Forebear.

DAYTON, Tenn., July 12.—Business isn't as good as usual in this little general store which Jim Darwin has run for some years in Dayton, Tennessee.

There's a reason! Some folks who heard about the Darwin theory, said started out the "monkey business" at Dayton, got the notion that Jim Darwin was the man who did it.

It was years and years ago that James Darwin, grandfather of Dayton's merchant, came to this country from Virginia. Here Capt. W. H. Darwin, father of the merchant, was born.

When he was a father of some he moved to a spot in this county about the year 1840, Dayton, settled there and called the town Darwin Station.

For years this descendant of the scientist tilled the land here, managed his general store, and Darwin was the town as a regular family affair.

Malone indignantly denigrated defense against "contemptuous references" to himself and his colleagues and Judge John P. Haston smoothed things over by apologizing and saying—perhaps the "evolution" was so dull that it was not understood.

The outbreak came during argument over a motion by the defense to dismiss the indictment against John T. Scopes, Attorney Neal and Hays' spoke for the defense.

The latter stirred up a hornet's nest by humbly suggesting an indictment, collected in the terms of that drawn against Scopes, citing a law which forbids anyone, under penalty of death, from teaching any theory except that which held that the earth was the center of the universe and that the sun moved around it from east to west.

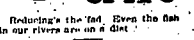

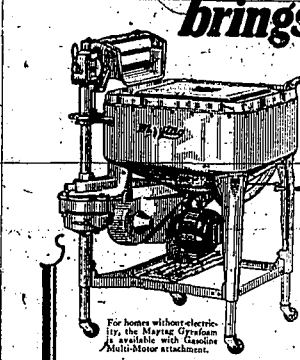

SHEEP MEN AND THE TOURISTS

Last week two articles appeared in The Times which dealt with a very vital question in Idaho. The first article, the matter in which was secured from the secretary of the Wool Growers association, in effect stated that there was a tendency on the part of the tourist to usurp the land which has been used by the stockmen for grazing purposes for camp sites, etc. He argued in this connection that much grazing land was likely to be lost to the stockmen of the state by this practice of throwing the bars down to the tourists and campers.

T. A. Sanderson of Castleford comes back with a reply which is trite and calls to mind a rather pertinent issue in connection with our method of letting grazing rights to stockmen and especially sheep growers. In part he speaks as follows on this subject:

"In the first place the amount of land taken up by campers in the mountains is so insignificant as compared to the land allotted to sheep grazing that there can be no room for argument that the campers are driving the sheepmen out. In the second place if the time should ever come that the campers take up all the grazing land in the mountains who shall deny that a citizen of this state can go into the mountains and enjoy its wonders in preference to a sheep.

"Mr. Bacon complains that the grazing rate paid by sheepmen for forest reserve privileges is too high and my answer to him is that no one is forcing the sheepmen to pay the rate. There are many farmers on the Twin Falls tract who have tried for years to get their small flocks of sheep on the forest reserve but have not been allowed to do so because of the fact that there are hundreds of thousands of sheep, belonging to owners, on the reserve. In this land of the free one man should have the same chance to put his flock on the reserve as another. Grazing privileges in the forests of the United States should be let to the highest bidder. The naval reserve, oil lease at Tea Pot Dome should have been let in that manner, and so should the grazing leases on our forest reserves.

"I will give the sheepmen credit for having one of the tightest organizations in the state and I do not blame them for trying to buy reserve rights and hay as cheaply as possible, but I do censure them for putting out a lot of propaganda at this time of the year to try and force the price of the farmer's hay down. Mr. Bacon is right when he states that alfalfa is a wonderful crop for the soil but the farmer had better plough it up if he has to depend on the sheepmen to get rid of it. Until such time as the farmer can put about on the forest reserves of this state his hay will be better raised only so much hay as he has stock of his own to feed."

In our opinion, the plan suggested by Mr. Sanderson of letting the forestry grazing lands out to the highest bidder is the proper procedure for our government to follow. Nearly all privileges granted by the government in the shape of leases, etc., are granted on the basis of bids and we feel that this should be the basis of letting our grazing lands. We realize that those who hold these leases on a priority basis will not agree with this, but there is justice, nevertheless, in this argument.

This government was founded upon the principle of "Equal rights to all and special privileges to none."

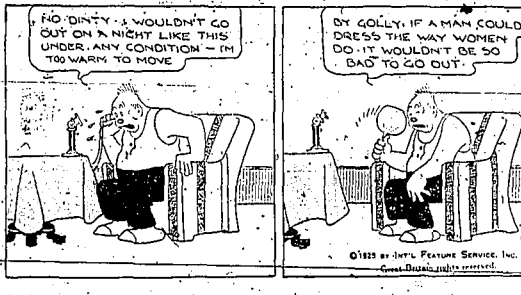

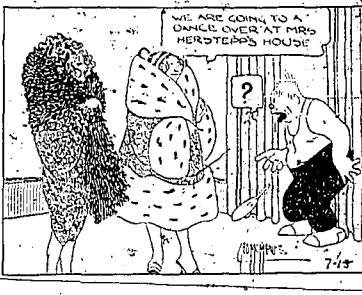
