

DARROW STIRS BIG AUDIENCE IN THE COURT

Famous Criminal Lawyer Makes Notable Speech Which for the Moment Sweeps the Crowd... Declares Law is Opening Wedge to Fanaticism.

DAYTON, Tenn., July 14.—Tennessee, for all its fundamentalism, admits a fighter and the dramatic, thundering speech of Clarence Darrow at the resumption of the Scopes trial declared by the lawyer's friends to be the greatest of his career today had the respect of it not the approval of Dayton.

Thumb in his suspender, now dropping his voice to a deeper, now raising it to a thunderous pitch, Darrow started a challenge and a warning to opponents and spectators alike when the trial of John T. Scopes for teaching evolution was resumed.

William Jennings Bryan set grimly, arms folded, apparently impervious to the shafts of Darrow's wit, the broad strokes of humor, the sudden exuberance of rage as the defense lawyer warned the public school teacher that the prosecution joined in the occasional applause which swept the courtroom.

This is as brazen and bold attempt to destroy liberty as ever was seen in the middle ages, shouted Darrow, referring to the indictment against Scopes, which he moved be dismissed.

One thing I never could account for," he said, "is the venom and hatred of people with very strong religious convictions."

The lawyer said the indictment was absurd and illegal, but then he swung into the main portion of his speech, which was a war of attrition movement which the indictment represented.

"If today you can take a crime to teach evolution and make it a crime to teach in the public schools, you can make a crime to teach in the private schools and next year you can make it a crime to teach in the churches of the church. At the next session you may have books and newspapers, and you may get Catholic priests against Protestant and Protestant against Protestant and try to follow your own religion upon the streets."

"If you can do one, you can do the other," he said, "and fanatics are never busy and need feeling."

The purpose for which Darrow came here actually has been fulfilled. He has sounded what he regards as necessary alarm against "bigotry and intolerance" and if the Scopes trial ended today, he would have accomplished his purpose.

Judge John Tate Stauley will rule.

SLIDE ON GROSVENTRE CAUSED BY SLIP JOINT

Shoep of Geological Formation Responsible for Fall of Slide of Grosventre, Says Manager Smith After Visit; Reservoir Formed May Reveal Twin Falls Tract.

The Grosventre slide on the Grosventre was the direct result of a slip joint in the geological formation which is on a hill, according to Burton Smith, general manager of the Twin Falls Cattle Company who visited the scene of the newly formed irregular dam last Friday.

An area of approximately 100 acres slumped from the side of Grosventre and the force of the landslide caused the material to be built up against the Grosventre canyon side to a height of some 100 feet above the remainder of the dam. The same of the dam, Mr. Smith estimates to be over three-quarters of a mile thick, while at the top the width is only a few feet. The top stands about 200 feet above the base.
