**THE GOSPEL IN LYSTRA**  
LESSON TEXT—Acts 14:1-7  
CHILDREN: How glad are they which are rescued for righteous men's sake! For in the Kingdom of Heaven—Matt. 5:12  
THE PEOPLE AND ADULT TOGETHER—Tribulations and Triumphs of Missionaries

1. Paul and Barnabas were preaching at Iconium (ev. 17). Their experience there was similar to that at Antioch. They entered the Jewish synagogue and preached, causing a multitude of Greeks and Gentiles to believe. The unbelieving Jews stirred up the Gentiles to the most bitter opposition.  
2. Their manner of preaching (v. 11). This is suggested by the little word "and" which is used to connect the great multitude believed. They were true preachers. Only that which brings conviction of sin and induces decision of the heart can be true preaching in the Biblical sense. It is not enough to merely bring the truth to the people. It must be brought in such a way that men and women will decide for Christ. This is also true of the Sunday school teacher.

3. Their attitude towards opposition (v. 5). This is suggested by the word "therefore." Long time therefore they ministered. The word "minister" means to continue preaching. The word "therefore" indicates that Paul and Barnabas were not discouraged by the opposition. Since the opposition was so fierce, the Lord granted special help which was needed.  
4. The effect of their preaching (v. 4). The multitude of the city was divided. Where men faithfully preached the gospel, there will be division.  
5. Paul and Barnabas assaulted (v. 12). The Jews and the Gentiles united in this assault. Being applied of their effort, they fled to Lystra and Derbe.

YOUTH DIES AFTER AUTO SMASH UP

Clifford Zacharias Receives Fatal Skull Injury When Ford Is Struck Last Night; Harris Held Pending Consideration of Charges.

Investigation is being completed today by Prosecuting Attorney J. W. Taylor in consideration of whether there is sufficient evidence upon which to base any or all charges of manslaughter, driving while intoxicated, illegal possession, and driving at an excessive rate of speed against Harry Harris of Twin Falls as a result of an auto wreck on the highway in front of the natorium Thursday evening in which Clifford Zacharias, aged 20, was fatally injured and the other occupants of the Ford car, which was standing at the side of the road, were variously bruised. Zacharias was rushed to the hospital and died three hours later without regaining consciousness.

Clifford Zacharias, age 20, died from a crushed skull on the operating table at the Twin Falls county general hospital following the collision of a Hudson coupe driven by Henry Harris with the Ford "bug" in which Zacharias was riding. The latter car stood parked on the highway in front of the Twin Falls natorium last evening about 10 o'clock.

Witnesses in the Ford, driven by Clarence Black who, besides the driver, who sustained a sprained back, Dale Goswell, driver of the Hudson, and Ralph Gillette, who left the county hospital this morning after being treated for painful injuries which he sustained. All involved in the accident were from Twin Falls.

The Hudson car after the smash slid some 250 yards down the highway, coming to a halt directly opposite the entrance to the county hospital, when the Ford was thrown into the ditch in the front of the entrance to the natorium.

We carried him to the hospital on a stretcher which he had in the car, first for Dr. Alexander. Zacharias was sitting in the rear seat on the left side where the right wheel had broken off the Hudson. Death was caused from impact by the Ford which according to the statement made by Dr. Alexander this morning consisted of, contusion of the brain, a badly fractured skull, a fractured neck, and a fractured trachea. The other occupants of the Ford were with only various sprains and bruises.

Three men and one woman sitting in the coupe, the driver, who is an employee of the Vincent A. Purcell company, Frank McJarry, a theatrical machine operator, and G. W. Wilson, a painter, and his wife, sustained various cuts from the broken glass in their car. Mrs. Wilson received a deep cut across the eye and arm, while Mr. Wilson sustained a big laceration in his arm.

Evidence of liquor was found in the weeds alongside of the Hudson. It is alleged, where it is believed by members of the sheriff's force they may have been thrown from the car after the accident. The odor is said strongly to resemble the odor of the car.

Harris was placed under arrest by Sheriff E. C. Finch and Deputy Sheriff H. E. Prater, after he had returned to the scene of the accident to get his suit, and was taken to the jail. He is now being held in the county jail. He is said to be traveling at about thirty miles per hour and when he saw the "bug" by his own lights he answered to avoid the collision but his wheel struck the rear end of the Ford.

The wheel of the Hudson was crumpled back under the front of the car and the bumper and front of the Ford were badly mangled. Details, according to the occupants of the Ford, were all operating on the parked car, including the tail light. Both cars were headed west on the highway with the dance at Eller as their destination. Slack, it is presumed, was driving the Ford from Powers, to take a party to the dance. He picked up Dale Goswell and later they and Zacharias in front of the City Pharmacy, who joined them in the proposed trip. The Gillette brothers, were invited to go but only accepted the ride to the natorium. Harris and his party were also bound for a dance in Piler.

Lived Here Many Years—Clifford was the 20-year old son of Mr. and Mrs. Archie C. Zacharias, 222 Third avenue east, resident of Twin Falls for many years. His mother, who is a victim in Philadelphia, was notified of her son's death by telephone this morning and funeral arrangements are being held up pending word in regard to the time of her arrival. The father is a janitor at the natorium. Clifford was the oldest of the four brothers, the other three being, Gerald, and Wilson. He leaves two sisters, Alice and Blanche.

For the past five months Clifford had been employed in the grocery department of the Idaho department store. He was a corporal in the local unit of the national guard, Company C, 20th infantry. He carried some life insurance. He was formerly married but had recently been divorced from his wife, who is now employed at work in Bull. The body is at the Blue mortuary.
