

BORAH TALKS ON CAUSES OF GREAT WARS

Idaho Senator Comments on Nations Preparing for War Today as Compared with Number of Men Under Arms in 1914; Nations Tend to Peace War Spirit-Instad of Trench

BOISE, Idaho, July 25.—Governments taught their people during the world war a doctrine which would sweep future wars. From accepted and as now the governments have turned around to prepare for more war. This, said the United States Senator William E. PROHIBITION FORCES TO BE RED RESTRICTED

New Board of Twenty-four Administrators Will Be Appointed; Group Heads Similar to U. S. District Attorney's Office to Be Created; Old Force Must Go

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 25.—The plan for revision of prohibition legislation under a new organization project was announced today by Acting Secretary of the Treasury. Simultaneously Winston announced that the new schedule will not be in full effect until September 1 in order to complete administrative details—that the majority may operate annually from the start. Headquarters office, with boundary changes for certain districts, were announced as follows: Sixth district: Baltimore, over Delaware. Seventh district: Roanoke, over Virginia and West Virginia. Eighth district: Charlotte, over Georgia, North and South Carolina. Ninth district: Columbus, over Florida. Tenth district: Chicago, over Illinois (except the southern counties), Indiana, Michigan, Wisconsin and the eastern judicial districts of Illinois and Wisconsin. Eleventh district: St. Paul, over Minnesota, North Dakota and the western district of Wisconsin. Twelfth district: Omaha, over Nebraska, Iowa and South Dakota. Thirteenth district: St. Louis, over Missouri, Arkansas and the eastern judicial districts of Illinois and Kansas. The changes in the eight out of 24 regions were made upon recommendation of internal revenue commissioners. The new administrative reasons, Winston said. CHIAUTAUQUA, N. Y., July 25.—Mentally armed against the West the people of the East have confidence in their racial strength and are prepared to oppose the strongest nations of the world for the sake of their rights even if in the struggle they have to die their own graves. This is the way John Ruskin, Cornell, a British Indian and professor of philosophy at Lucknow University answered the question, "Is Asia a Menace to World Peace?" at the closing session of the Conference on International Justice and Good Will, Christian Point of View under auspices of the Commission on International Justice and Good Will of the Federal Council of Churches. While the West has sought the conquest of physical nature, lands and peoples, he explained, the East has developed a spiritual civilization—non-material in its nature. In this respect, he asserted, the West has not controlled 47,000,000 out of the 52,000,000 square miles of the world's earth, and the white man dominates the people, the commerce and the economics of the world. Deprecating that Australia with 2,000,000 square miles and one-fifth of the population of the world is the policy of the white race everywhere, he declared that the East has a different attitude toward "the world situation." 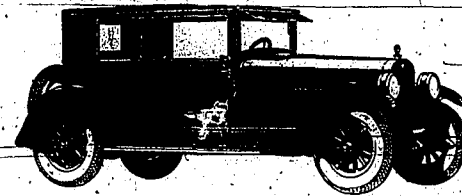

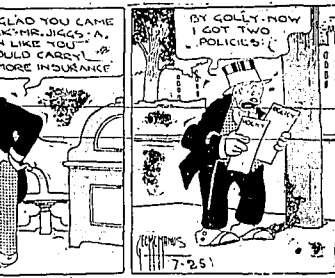
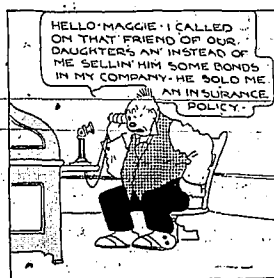

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GREAT CROWD SEES WAGON TRAIN ATTACK

Thousands Gather on the Banks of Rock Creek to Witness Battle Between Emiliana and Indiana Wagon Is Burned by Savage.

The banks of Rock Creek last evening witnessed one of the most striking scenes in its history, when the crowd congregated to see the burning of the emigrant wagon after an attack on the train by Indians. With wild yells the sons of the desert, now highly civilized in their ordinary walks, sallied around the emigrant wagon, firing as they rode.

It was estimated that one thousand people saw the exhibition and the assembly of autos was the largest in the history of the state. It was a real covered wagon incident. The fireworks from the airplane were beautiful and thrilling and stirred the large crowd that saw the delightful exhibition of the daring aviator. The last scene was the dance along the fenced area on Rhoads street next to the park.

The affair was successful in every way, the crowd was good natured and pleasant, there were no disturbances and no arrests. The weather proved delightful all through. The stands and concessionaires all did a big business. The final feature of the Rock Creek battle was the fireworks display of the American flag in honor of which red and white united.

APPLES HAIL HIT MAY SELL FOR COOKERS

Story of Storm Brings Many Quicker From Possible Buyers Prices Are Not Quoted But Many Sales Are Expected—Fruit-Look-Over-After the Storm.

That the fruit market this year may result in paying the price for half a bushel apples for use as cookers so high that there will be considerable salvage in the orchards of the hill belt is the opinion of buyers here, although no offers have been made so far, pending further investigation there have been many inquiries from all parts of the country in this respect.

Will Make Survey—Chief Inspector Sabin of the horticultural department of Idaho will be here in a few days to go over the situation with E. V. Gibson, the district inspector and after a complete examination of the orchards a report will be made for the information of both buyers and orchard owners.

Apples which are merely speckled, as many are, will sell as russets. Other crops likewise. While some crops in the center of the hill are apparently ruined, others like beets are practically unharmed and still others are problematical. John R. Ault said today that an examination of his onion field by A. L. O'Rielly, former county club leader and agricultural expert, who is here representing an English fruit exporting firm, resulted in the opinion by Mr. O'Rielly that the real condition of the onion in the field examination would not be known for 10 days. Should they get a second growth, they would be worth 50 per cent more. The potatoes and other crops are much better in the hill belt than they appeared immediately after the storm. The bean situation is more promising but in the worst strip—unsatisfactory.
