Eight New Air Mail Routes Will Be Established; the Route From Elko to Boise Will Pass Over Twin Falls Tract; Bids for the Routes Asked.

WASHINGTON, July 28.—Commercial aviation in the United States received a tremendous boost today with an announcement from the postoffice department that eight new air mail lines, covering 4,612 miles would be inaugurated on November 1.

The routes will be leased to private firms and mail planes will also operate on commercial routes. Passengers and freight. The new lines, which are to be operated by the system, are: 1. A route from Boise to Twin Falls, Idaho, and back. 2. A route from Boise to Elko, Idaho, and back. 3. A route from Boise to Salt Lake City, Utah, and back. 4. A route from Boise to Reno, Nevada, and back. 5. A route from Boise to Sacramento, California, and back. 6. A route from Boise to Los Angeles, California, and back. 7. A route from Boise to San Francisco, California, and back. 8. A route from Boise to Portland, Oregon, and back.

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 28.—High-up on "Downy Knoll" in Arlington National Cemetery, the boundary line of William Jennings Bryan's estate will be marked Friday afternoon among the nation's warriors.

Not all plans for the funeral of the commoner have been completed, but such as have been tentatively approved ignore all military and other ceremonial display. Upon the arrival of the funeral train here on Thursday morning the body will be conveyed to the Arlington National cemetery to be interred in the far-famous family, William Jennings Bryan.

Services, probably at the New York Avenue Presbyterian church, will be held on Friday, followed by a funeral cortege to Arlington and interment there of the body with the last resting place of the commoner in one of the many plots.

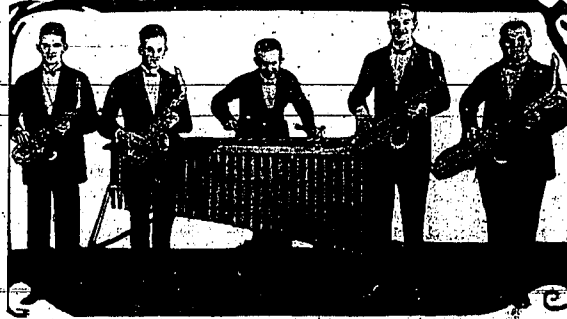

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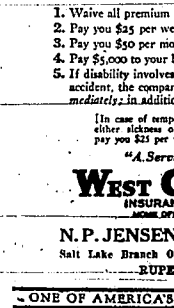

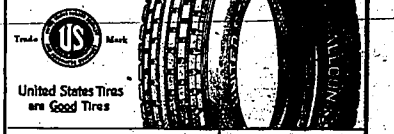

A document before us tells that modern methods are curing insanity except in cases of paresis. Until recently insanity had the world bluffed. The theory was that when the mind was gone there was nothing to build upon. Now the rebuilding is on the solid rock of flesh and bone. If the blood strengthens the body it likewise does the same work for the mind. Then the closed faculties revive as the withered grass under the beneficent influence of the rain and sun—While insanity is increasing it is also being cured.

It is an easy way to dismiss a subject to attempt to laugh it out of court, but it is not always effective. The attempt to show that Idaho is saving all the money it ought to save is just as futile as to try to influence a jury by sneering. The people fortunately want results. They can always look at their tax receipt and then calculate their indirect taxes. The people cannot be fooled. Expenses must come down. This business of going far enough may satisfy a few politicians but it does not satisfy the man who pays the taxes. He knows.

In the olden days when the blood, was not supposed to circulate the leeches would bleed both sides of a man in order to have the blood equal. That sounds foolish now but it is no more foolish than many things we do now. We educate the brain of a man without educating his body, or we do educate his body, make it strong and muscular, without educating the brain. What we need is to recognize the whole and educate it entirely. What we mean by an educated fool is that a man is not well rounded. His development is not symmetrical. The child of today has a right to a systematic, coordinate and complete education. Unless we do this for our youth we are doing no better than the leech who bled first on one side and then on the other.

The American fleet entered the harbor of Australia and received a demonstrative welcome. Our relationship to the people of Australia must become closer. We showed our feeling by oversubscribing a loan but that was a mere incident. Sometime the final battle for supremacy of our race must be fought, either with arms or otherwise. Australia holds the key to the situation. Japan will be arrayed against us, China will be against us, the Philippines will be against us. Only the little base we have in mid-ocean to the west will be with us. England is far away and has its own interests. Australia will have to hold the fort until the world centers upon the adversaries. Belgium held the Germans back 12 days and saved the world. Australia likewise will throw itself into the breach and hold the hordes of uncivilized nations back while the world gathers itself together for the final conflict.

PUBLICLY OWNED POWER

Public ownership of electric power in the province of Ontario is now considered more than justified. The hydro-electric power commission has just issued its seventh annual report, which ought to be of interest in this country where public attention is only now being turned to hydro-electric development.

The Ontario commission now serves 138 townships in 90 rural districts. It has contracts with eight more townships. In addition to consumers served through municipalities in suburban areas, the commission reaches 10,800 rural consumers. Much of this service is now given at cost.

According to the commission, the year ending October 31, 1924, covered by this report, was the most successful in the project's history. The financial soundness of the system is assured. The only difficult problem remaining to be faced is power shortage. The demand for power keeps this country, where public attention is

It would be well for more Americans to inquire into power conditions in Ontario, not through biased reports in this country, but from authentic sources.
