REFUSAL MAY COST DEMPSEY FIGHT CROWN

Tex Richard Reaches Tentative Agreement with Tunney and Willa for Title Bout; New York Commission May Take Action.

By HENRY L. FAIRBELL. NEW YORK, Aug. 1.—Anticipating that the New York boxing commission may declare void the world heavyweight championship at its next meeting, Tex Rickard has reached a tentative agreement with Harry Willa and Gene Tunney to meet in the Yankee stadium next month.

"I've talked it over with the managers of the two fighters and we have agreed on conditions," Rickard said today. "It all depends on what the commission does about Dempsey. Willa wants a hard fight for the championship and so does Tunney but they'll accept my proposition as soon as they find out that there is no chance for a Dempsey fight."

"I gave them assurance that Jack Dempsey would not fight either one of them this year—for I know well that he doesn't want a hard fight until next summer and I think that will be convinced of it in a few days."

Little Willa in Game. "There has been very little money made in the boxing game," Rickard said, "but there will be a good market for a heavyweight fight that will draw a fight in the nearest thing to a natural that I have seen."

Willis in Europe now and expects to return there for at least another month but he will come back immediately to California, Rickard says for him. Willis asked that the fight, if it is made, be billed as a world championship with Willis verified as the champion, but Rickard said he could not do that unless the commission would support him.

Commission Silent. It is known officially what the New York commission will do next Tuesday about the fight. As Dempsey said yesterday in an exclusive interview with the writer over the telephone from California he is not going to appear before the commission at its next meeting. He has asked that action be delayed until he finishes the writing of his ways with Jack Kearns. Dempsey has made it clear that he has not planned for any fights and the tone of his letter to the commission was unambiguous. It was felt that the commission will grant him another stay, as it has understood that he will not fight. Willis might come out next summer even if the commission ever fore the signing of the articles.

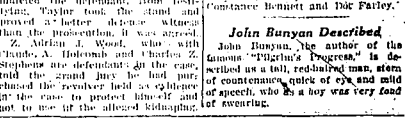

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## WHAT IS MEANT BY "TAX REDUCTION"?

The Chicago Journal—It is gratifying to everybody to learn that Secretary Mellon's estimates of treasury surpluses for the fiscal years 1925 and 1926 will permit of another reduction in income taxes of about \$306,000,000. Secretary Mellon has been a consistent and persistent advocate of the lowering of this class and his efforts are generally appreciated by income tax payers.

But while the secretary of the treasury has been working along this line, his party has been the persistent advocate of the maintenance of the highest and most oppressive form of indirect taxation which falls most heavily upon those least able to bear it.

Any intelligent discussion of tax reduction must include the kind of taxes paid, the methods of levying and collecting them and a knowledge of what becomes of the money collected. When the present national administration uses the term "tax reduction" it means a reduction of the taxes on incomes and profits. There are only about 8,000,000 actual income tax payers, and the estimated amount to be collected from them in the fiscal year 1925 is about \$2,000,000,000. Every dollar of this goes into the treasury of the United States, and pays a little more than one-half of the running expenses of the government.

The income tax is a direct tax, for which the taxpayer writes his check and forwards it quarterly to a collector of internal revenue. It is possible steadily to reduce this tax by reason of continuous decrease in the interest on the public debt, the decrease in the pension rolls and the cessation of activities growing out of the war.

While the income tax is being reduced for the benefit of 8,000,000 taxpayers, the tariff tax, amounting to \$4,000,000,000 a year and paid by every one of the 110,000,000 people, is in full effect, and the republican party is almost solidly opposed to any reduction thereof. This is the tax that keeps up the high cost of living. This is the tax that is breaking the farmer's back, costing him over \$300,000,000 a year; that has driven millions from the farms and has bankrupted 25 per cent of the farmers west of the Mississippi river. This is the tax which the republican legislature of Illinois has unanimously denounced. Under the present tariff everything is taxed from the safety pins in the diaper of the new born infant to the coffin of the oldest inhabitant.

The tariff tax is an indirect tax. It is paid by the ultimate consumer every time he purchases any article upon which duty is laid. The tariff tax, unlike the income tax, is passed on to him. The ultimate consumer pays every dollar of the tariff tax, and this means that it is paid by the masses of the people, only a small percentage of whom pay an income tax.

To make matters still worse, the government gets only a little more than \$500,000,000 of the \$4,000,000,000 tariff tax. The balance of \$3,500,000,000 goes into the pockets of tariff protected interests for whose special benefit it is levied under the republican theory of taxation.

Although the tariff amounts to twice as much as the income tax, the republican party is not proposing any reduction of tariff taxes. On the contrary, it insists that this tax shall remain, and the more greedy beneficiaries are clamoring for an increase.

To have genuine tax reduction there should be a general readjustment and lowering of both income and tariff taxes, and more especially of the tariff tax, because it is paid in large part by those least able to afford it and for the benefit of private special interests, while the income tax is paid by those best able to bear it and for the benefit of the government of the United States. There is perhaps no greater or more vital issue before the people than genuine tax reform, with reduction all along the line.

The meaning of the phrase "tax reduction" as used by the republican administration, it too limited; it does not apply to nearly 97 per cent of the taxpayers.

The passing of William Jennings Bryan just on the eve of the opening of the chautauqua here serves to remind the people of the merit of the institution through the instrumentality of which he often conveyed a message of eloquence and advocacy of religion and political principles to the people. # DWIGHT DENIES RUMOR OF BAD FAITH BY CLUB

Secretary of Chamber of Commerce Declares That Rumor Has Been Directed from Road South and Reiterates Report of Discrimination

He says that nobody has been diverted either toward Wells or Contact and that the road conditions. 
