

GERMANY TO EXCEED AID TO PATRIOTS

Prussian State Government Prepares to Help Refugees Arriving from Poland; Border Camp Presents Pivotal Scenes of Suffering.

BERLIN, Aug. 3.—The Prussian state government faced by bitter complaints of hordes of German men, women and children, urged that the flight from Poland in the next few months be organized on a systematic basis.

Five million marks had been appropriated to meet a situation in the concentration camp at Gensersdorf, near Danzig, which had been completely broken down, leaving a mass of wretched, suffering refugees.

Prussian interior minister Severing, sometimes known as the czar of Prussia, had instructed the concentration camps with their belongings were herded together in a state of chaos.

Their clothes and goods mixed with the straw, but they carried through the camps in a state of misery.

Many of them are existing on short rations which they brought with them from Poland, and the throngs have become so great that the secret police have to be called in to keep them in line.

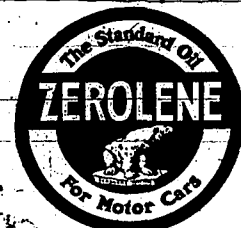

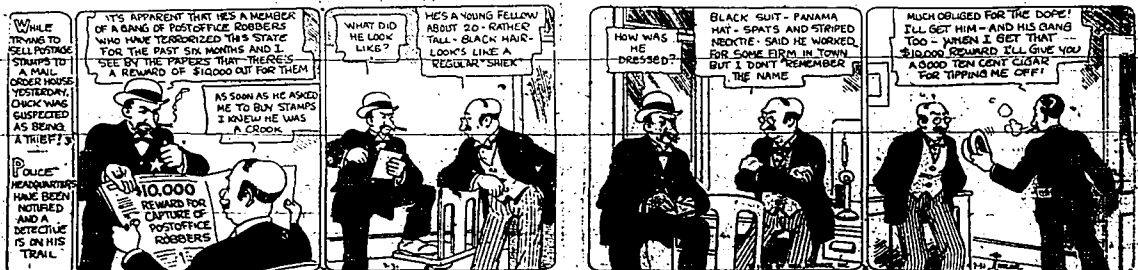

# LOCKE CASE IS UP BEFORE COURT TODAY

Preliminary Hearing Starts in Prosecution of Employee of Idaho Power Company for Alleged Embezzlement of Funds of the Corporation; Plea of Not Guilty Is Entered.

Preliminary hearing of Jay J. Locke, charged with embezzlement while in the service of the Idaho Power company in a sum which the company takes as an officers' salary, started this morning before Probate Judge J. L. Holden, with blind Leighton associated with Prosecutor J. W. Taylor and with Stephen A. North representing the defense. While reported admission were said to have been made previously by Locke, he has entered a plea of not guilty.

Joseph Testifies. The testimony of J. E. Jensen, auditor of the company, who also is the complaining witness in the case, indicated the theory of the state. The state introduced the evidence from \$27,244 to \$2500 in an effort to show that Locke had pulled out money by check charged to the Idaho Power Company office where he either had no requisition from that office or that the sum paid was not the amount of the requisition.

Mr. Jensen declared that the petty cash fund of the company here was used to pay small bills, checks and from substitutions under the general direction of District Manager Joseph Jensen. Mr. Jensen testified, to check up on requisitions and where correct to pay out of the district general fund of \$1200. The amount checked out was then charged to petty cash of the Idaho Power company and the Boise office was drawn on for the amount. It is claimed that Mr. Locke drew the checks in evidence against "Cash, P. C. Fund" and then drew on the Boise office.

Will Talk All Day. Shortly before noon, the state asked Jensen to introduce more checks and will get ready to do this, although for the defense questioned Jensen regarding the checks and the prosecution claims were improperly issued. It is thought that examination of the auditor will last all day. Nothing regarding requested admission has been offered today. George Locke, father of defendant, was present from Chicago.

Largely Churches and Sunday Schools. Influence Here Is Growing. Membership Japanese Activities Are Described by Returned Missionary From the District of Hwanghae Province to the Project.

Christianity is taking place rapidly in Korea, Rev. W. H. Lamb, the missionary, who with his family, is visiting at the home of John W. L. Smith, told a large congregation at the Union meeting at the Twin Falls city park last evening. The music which was furnished by the Protestant choir was well done. The scripture reading was by Rev. H. H. Humphreys of the Methodist church, and announcements by Rev. A. E. Pearson, pastor of the Presbyterian church, who also offered the prayer.

An interesting feature was the statement of Rev. Mr. Pearson that in investigating the report that the temperature of the hot springs in Idaho had increased 20 per cent following the earthquake in Santa Barbara, he referred to the immense quantities of metals and minerals removed from the ground are possible causes of alterations in the balance of the Japan's Isle Efficient.

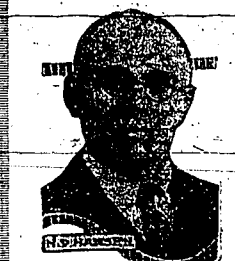
