

## MORE DAIRIES ARE NEEDED TO SUPPLY U.S.

Milk production in America is falling far below consumption. More than 60,000,000 pounds of dairy products are imported and reverse was true.

BALT LAKE CITY, Aug. 5.—More than 375,000 new milk cows need to be added to the dairy herds of the United States each year to keep pace with the increase in the population, according to Dr. C. W. Lippin, chief of the United States bureau of dairying, who arrived in Salt Lake yesterday for a visit of two or three days. Lippin has been in Denver attending to dairy food and animal convention held there last week and will continue from here to the coast.

The population increases annually about 1,500,000 each year, Dr. Lippin points out, and the average consumer in the United States gets each year some 1000 pounds of milk and dairy products. The average cow produces 1000 pounds of milk and dairy products in the year. Besides the increase in population, there is a per capita increase in the use of dairy products which must be taken into consideration also. Therefore, the rate of the increase must be kept normal but must be increased to meet the demands of the population.

Thirty-five years ago the United States exported hundreds of millions of pounds of dairy products, while today the nation imports 60,000,000 pounds of those same products. Dr. Lippin declares, "The farmer is not to blame for this. It was started, he has had an enormous increase in the per capita consumption of dairy products at the same time as a great increase in the population. The object of the bureau of dairying is to bring the production of dairy products in the country so as to compare with the production of other agricultural products. One of the main efforts of the bureau is to develop the industry of dairying. It is hoped that this may be done by breeding and feeding and general care of the dairy animals. The farmer is encouraged to purchase better stock and to cooperate with the government in his efforts in that direction. 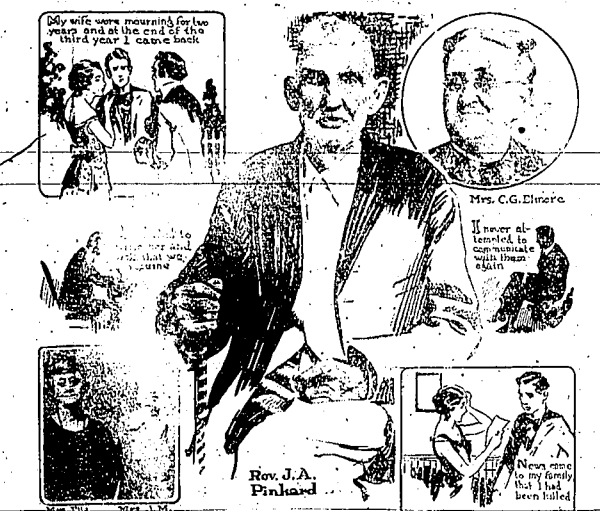

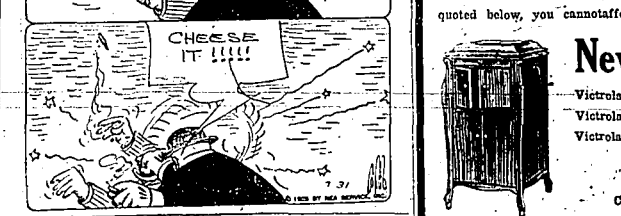

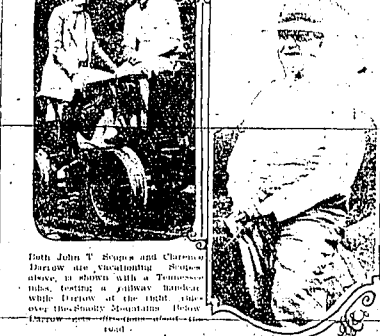

## WEEK'S BEST GOOD TURN

The National Scout Court of Honor has recently awarded the gold medal for life-saving to Scout Rex Guinness of Tower Hill, Indiana.

Through skill, courage and sheer grit this boy, last August, rescued two 10-year old lads from drowning in the river at Turkey Run Park, Indiana.

Rex Guinness, with members of his troop, was sitting on a large rock near the shore, when he noticed two children locked in a desperate grip, struggling in the water. They were about thirty-five feet from shore where the current was swift, the river deep.

Guinness, realizing the grave danger, slid down the rock and dove into the water, without stopping to remove shoes or clothes. Rapidly he stroked to the drowning boys and vigorously strove to secure a hold on them. The frantic pair, however, clutched their friend and dragged him down. Coming to the surface the terrified boys continued their struggle and a second time Guinness went down with them. But the next time up found the Scout in control. Grabbing one boy around the waist and the other by the back of the neck, he made shore with the exhausted pair.

## FIRE DANGERS GREAT

Only the greatest precaution can avert disaster in the forests of the northwest this summer. Forest service officials, government guardians of the vast timber-covered slopes, say this with the hope of awakening in the people a realization of what fires in forests mean.

In one forest nearby there is a burned-over spot. Blackened spires rise thickly and the ground is seared and the roots of grass and shrubs killed. Every direction it is a picture of desolation. On one of the ghost trees the forest service has nailed, where it can easily be seen by those passing on the mountain trail, a sign that reads: "Black forests do not produce."

No, a state in which the forests turn black reckons not what it means. No lumber comes from its trees; no water is stored in its soil to feed streams in summer time; no grasses grow to fatten sheep and cattle; no birds sing in its shade and no wild game flees to its heart for protection. The black forest laughs in mimicry at those who pass by.

Some fires cannot be averted, but the forest service insists the majority are man-caused. Lightning bolts touch off many blazes. An alert corps of smoke-chasers watch for these after storms, but the greatest menace and the hardest to check, are careless individuals. A smoldering cigaret or a campfire improperly cared for may give the people another black forest.

The timbered lands of the country are growing less in extent. Population is increasing. Black forests, therefore work a double hardship.

**WASHINGTON**—The monkey trial hasn't alone entertained the rest of the world. It has even puzzled some foreign governments.

Official diplomatic reports have some confidentially from Washington to several of them, it seeks out, seeking to analyze, for wondering old world statesmen's benefit, the psychology and mental slant of a people among whom an amusing a case was possible.

That the anti-evolution proceedings actually have cost America a certain amount of international prestige is the opinion of some state department officials who make it their business to keep posted concerning the country's standing abroad. If you don't believe it, they say, look at the foreign newspapers which are beginning to come in with their stories and comments upon the "monkey trial." Certainly the "monkey trial" has become a wide-spread story as this one has been in the last few weeks.

HERE it may have seemed as if the monkey joke was made by the "Tennessees," but Tennessee means nothing to foreign editors. They simply see, in general, the United States. The Tennessee law is national, for all they know.

So it's the whole United States that's looked. It isn't very good natured joking, either. Uncle Sam isn't overly popular in Europe. Europe owes him too much. The "that-very-thing" Europeans can't get too funny with him to his face, but among themselves it's a joy to make a monkey out of him.

That's why they grabbed on the ropes case so enthusiastically.

Of course the other countries, which are doing the laughing, each has peculiarities of its own—maybe just as queer as ours are. The entire "social family" intelligence—or lack of it—probably levels up—or down—to about the same general average. Just now, however, it happens that Americans have been pulling one of their best stunts. Law-win laughter—except a few well-considered individuals in whose brains it struck bolts of such a performance's sanity.

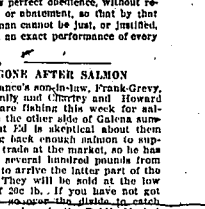
