

ANTI-EVOLUTION FIGHT STARTS IN CALIFORNIA

Fight Against Teaching of Evolution Starts and First Campaign Is On; Two Great Ministers to Take Up Bryan's Fight for Fundamentalists.

(By MAYNARD SHIPLEY, President Science League of America.) SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Aug. 7.—The anti-evolution fight in California has just begun. It will come into the open within a few days with positions for the leaders of the movement being taken before the vote at the next election. Fundamentalist leaders have carefully laid out their plan, spreading through organized church circles into the smaller cities and villages to the effect: "To take the Bible out of the school books." They have picked two men, Rev. John R. Stratton of Los Angeles and Rev. William Bell Riley, first Baptist, church, Minneapolis, first western leader.

Evolutionists had cause to fear the power of Bryan's name and his "silver tongue" they are not only eloquent and marvellous, but have a genius for organization and leadership. The program will follow the course of the eighteenth amendment campaign. In all states possible anti-evolution laws will be passed. Senator Blanton and Congressman Hiram Boren have agreed to introduce an amendment to the federal constitution. The program will be carried on in California, Oregon, Washington and the States of the West. In the south T. M. Martin, secretary of the Memphis World, will head the fundamentalist movement. In the southwest, the Rev. J. Frank Norris, Dallas, who boasts of the scraps of seven portions quoted for teaching of evolution in his ballcock, will be in charge. The Bible institute, Los Angeles, is the fountainhead of the campaign in this state. Anti-Saloon league methods will be used. The state of Kansas, KFSG already controlled at this source. The science league will combat the fundamentalists here, as elsewhere by a campaign of education by every city and hamlet, publicity as to what evolution really is.

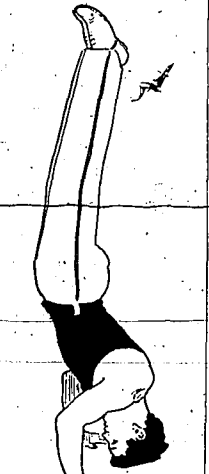

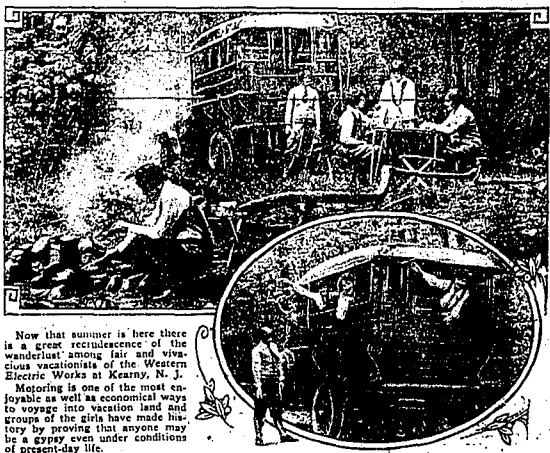

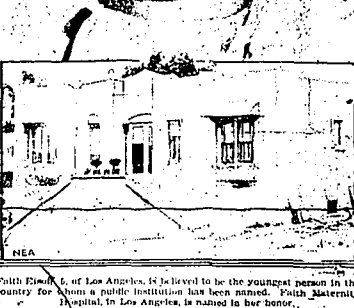

Champion Says He Is Running His Own Game and Has Given No One Authority to Sign Him for Match; Training Started in California.

(Copyright 1925 by United Press.) LOS ANGELES, Aug. 7.—It will take at least one million dollars to get Jack Dempsey into a title bout with Harry Wills, and the first promoter who will agree to the heavyweight champion that amount, and sign Paddy Mullins, the negro challenger's manager, will get the match.

In an exclusive interview today, Dempsey denied that he had any intention of becoming a Floyd Fitzsimmons to meet Wills at Michigan City and declared the million was not an offer to the promoter who could make the biggest bid for his services.

The champion said, however, that Fitzsimmons was the best bid for Wills to date and that "this Michigan City promoter" if he is a high bidder would undoubtedly be manager for the Wills-Dempsey fight when it is fought.

"I have signed with no one and made terms with no promoter," declared Dempsey, "and the match with Wills is still open to the highest bidder."

"Fitzsimmons" has offered me a flat sum of \$1,000,000 and if he gets Harry Wills' signature showing me the money, I will undoubtedly come to an agreement and the match will be staged in St. Louis' arena in Michigan City.

The first promoter who shows me Mullins' signature and accompanies him to Michigan City will get \$1,000,000 and the fight will be staged in St. Louis' arena in Michigan City.
