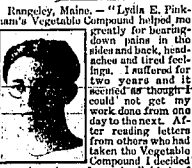

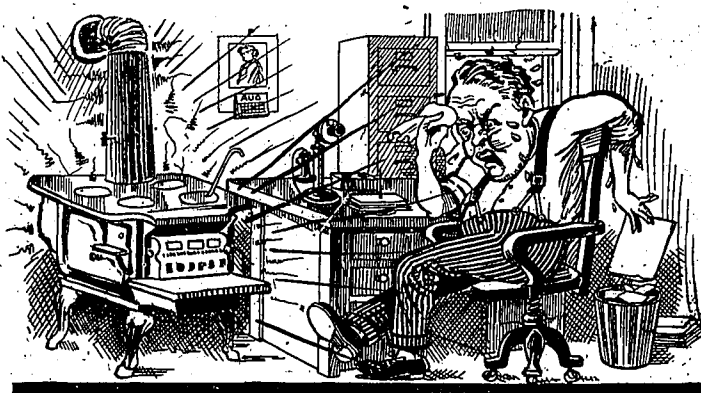

BUSINESS WORRIES DEMPSEY

DeForrest, Who Trained Dempsey for the Willard Bout, Says Champ Is in Very Poor Condition and Is Worried Over Real Estate and Business Affairs.

NEW YORK, Aug. 11.—Jack Dempsey's title will be in grave danger if he fights any one this year, Jimmy DeForrest said today.

DeForrest, who trained Dempsey for the Willard fight and who is now trainer for Charles A. Street, returned today from Los Angeles where he had been looking for the champion.

"The life of a man has been leading and the recent development of a lot of business troubles are blamed by DeForrest for what he calls the "very bad condition" of the champion.

"Dempsey is badly worried about business affairs," he said. "He wants to get out from under his real estate holdings and he can't do it without standing a big loss. His running around in the city is a big worry."

"I watched him in the gym and it didn't take me two minutes to see that he needs six months rest. If he is to get back into anything like his old fighting form, he is slow on his feet and almost in his action, his color is bad and there is no snap in his eyes. He hasn't done well since he was in his work, but I believe that is because of business worries."

DeForrest said he will talk business with Dempsey because he believes there was nothing done this year. He said that Floyd Fitzsimmons, Michigan City promoter, did plan Dempsey to fight Harry Willard next year, but there is a clause providing that the winners must pay one million dollars on the line before the contract becomes final.

BILLY SUNDAY, McADOO AND THE RAILROADS

(BY JAMES D. WHEELAN)

"I do not believe in public ownership of public utilities. Billy McAdoo is a good friend of mine and a great financier but he is a nut as a manager of railroads."—Billy Sunday.

The double implication, taken in its context and connotation, is that advocacy of government ownership of railroads is socialistic, and that the management of the railroads under Director McAdoo was a failure. Neither implication is correct.

Not only is it true, as stated by Professor W. W. Willoughby, that practically all political economists of the present school believe such system to be necessary in case of natural monopolies, but the greatest anti-socialistic writers like Ryan, Rex, Hirsch and Graham hold it to be inevitable and desirable, as do, also, such anti-socialistic lecturers as Goldstein and Collins.

Colonel W. J. Bryan wrote powerful anti-socialistic articles and at the same time, not only worked out a feasible plan of state and national railroads but after he came back from a world tour defied the politicians who told him that an announcement that investigation abroad had confirmed his previous ideas on this question might defeat him for president, as perhaps it did.

On the other hand, socialistic writers like Hillquist, Vail, Uterman and Wilshire attack government ownership as essentially opposed to their principles. Government ownership of railroads, telegraphs and telephones prevails in the majority of nations, regardless of form of government.

The difference between the attitude that the government should or may take in regard to public utilities and competitive business is fully recognized by the courts. It is a legal axiom that a railroad is simply an improved public highway.

Regarding McAdoo's management. When the war broke out, the railroads were already in distress handling goods.

By December 1, 1917, freight was congested everywhere through lack of team work and the roads asked financial aid, priority of equipment, increase of rates and drafting of men for railroad service until needed for military service. The interstate commerce commission worked out a plan, which the roads rejected; the allies were calling for food and insisting that our failure to send it was endangering the cause, so under the statute of 1916, against which Senator Borah had voted, the roads were taken over.

In spite of the awful winter, the coal troubles and the growing needs of the government in all directions, things began to brighten by February 1, 1918, and in five weeks thereafter, or nine weeks in all, under government control supplies in such quantities had been shipped abroad that the allies asked many of the ships to turn to hauling more soldiers and less food. Had it not been for his management the allied armies would have lost the war.

The best railroad men were serving in France, and yet, although hauling all these supplies and a total of nearly 7,000,000 men for the government to serve in one or other capacity for the war, we hear a howl because things did not go in all cases as smoothly as in times of peace. They did not do that in any line as critics know very well.

Acting on the recommendation of the interstate commerce commission and Franklin K. Lane, McAdoo raised the wages of employees \$608,000,000. After he quit, Director Hines raised them \$391,000,000 more. Later under the Esch-Cummins bill, with a guarantee to the roads, the wages were shoved up \$620,000,000, under private ownership and the Esch-Cummins wage board and whole was charged up against McAdoo. McAdoo raised the lowest paid men, but not more than the average increase in private employment and the very highest paid men not at all.

Government control made the victory possible abroad. In paraphrase his own statement, "Billy Sunday is a famous evangelist, but he's a nut as a political economist." He's honest, but got a bum steer.

THE ESSENCE OF WORLD PEACE

Few lecturers can sum up the essence of world peace and the educational processes by which to attain same so admirably as Colonel Geo. O. Fallis did last night at the Chautauqua. The Colonel who served four years overseas has no axe to grind but his theory is based on the brotherhood of man and the proper training of the mind both at home and abroad in right thinking. Unless the nations of the world can banish prejudice through their educational systems and get back to the Golden Rule in international affairs very little progress will be made for the next half century in solving this greatest of all world problems. The speaker showed concisely how the minds of boys and girls had been poisoned in America and in other countries by false doctrines being taught through our school histories.

He showed how false impressions of nations arise by judging the whole body politic by a few of the citizens of that nation. He showed that what we needed most was forgiveness and forgetfulness. He stated among other things that we all believed that it Christian to apply the same rule to nations. Education has produced war and we have made heroes of our military leaders instead of

our literary and industrial leaders. Germany held up to her people that the military leader was the highest type of citizen for 72 years, and therefore the world war was the result. Our psychology of life has been wrong for years. The greatest nation is not the one that has the greatest army but the one which has done the most for humanity.

We hope that the great lessons which Colonel Fallis is teaching will finally bring forth fruit in the shape of world peace and that the harmony and love of nations as he depicts same in his admirable addresses.

WASHINGTON, This country is on the point of a showdown. It will mean one of two things.

- 1. We'll settle down to fundamental rule, with no more posturing about it. Or,
2. We'll be divided again—moralized, the fundamentalist way.

This is the opinion of politicians—fundamentalist and liberal alike—who drift in and out of Washington, snapping reports concerning the conditions they observe in their various haunts.

POLITICALLY the fundamentalist movement in the country—not confined to any one class, man or less, generally, nationality speaking—think they cannot count on any more of the fundamentalist movement which just "sunk in."

It once anybody realized it, here it was. The liberals don't like it. That is to be seen on every hand. So to be the fundamentalist, the

way the liberals think of arranging, making account the police.

What really is in a majority are those who are in a conclusive list of strength.

For liberals have never given ground, but by without actually putting up with a fight. This is done with their eyes to make a stand—more to put every name into a decisive effort to drive the fundamentalist back.

So fundamentalist and liberal alike agree in making no mistake. They agree, too, that the fundamentalists won't be satisfied with a mere defeat, they want to do their best to make a clean sweep for good.

THE struggle won't center about any single narrow issue—politics, evolution, some one detail of public morals, some particular socialistic line.

The conflict will open—has opened, in fact—with a little, technical skirmishing, but soon to do their utmost will increase in number and spread, and finally merge into a general campaign over the question of the relationship between religion and government.

World Peace Greatest Need of This Age Says Chautauqua Lecturer

Col. George O. Fallis Points Out Obstacles for World Peace and Says We Must Remodel Our Teaching and Get Better Appreciations of Other Nations and Become More Tolerant of Their Opinions; Brotherhood of Man Is Stressed and Manufacture of Munitions of War Must Be Taken from Private Interests.

In a wonderful lecture on "The Problems of World Peace," Colonel (Gov.) George O. Fallis, pastor of the Central Methodist church of Vancouver, B. C., who served four years and a half overseas during the World War, at the Chautauqua last evening, made a dramatic appeal, backed by a consistent line of thought, for the people to unite in bringing about an international spirit which would make effective the League of Nations, the world court and other international agencies promoting harmony among nations.

He dwelt at length on the methods required to defeat the causes of war and pointed out that this could be accomplished only by the development of a "new outlook of the world."

He said that the first difficulty in the way of world peace, declared Dr. Fallis, is to get the great nations to disengage themselves from a selfish attitude to cooperate in disarmament to adjust their differences in a peaceful way.

The United States cannot disarm unless others do likewise. The second is the idea that "brotherhood of man" is a "mantra," and that which such is the case we cannot end war. He believed in the League of Nations, as suggested by Kant, Haube and Dele, along the line of modern progress.

Although opposed to socialists, the speaker said that the nations of the world should be encouraged to governmental manufacture of munitions. With billions of dollars invested in plants to make war supplies, the temptation to foment international discord was too great. Labels were maintained by munition-makers in all the great capitals to stand in the way of disarmament in order that they might sell their goods.

The appeal in every case was made in the name of patriotism. It was of such men as these that Dr. Johnson spoke when he said, "Patriotism is the last refuge of a black-hearted scoundrel." The dastardly spirit of such men is reprehensible in the last degree.

He led to the fact that another obstacle in the way of peace is the idea, almost universally prevalent, that a sovereign nation has a necessary right to use physical force if necessary to further its interest if it can get by with it. A sample of this is the case of England forcing the opening of China to opium at the expense of the Chinese and the Indian surplus.

This has proven to be a boomerang for the Chinese because of the example of the great Christian nations, is now dominating the youth of China with joy.

us to form a bad judgment of other people from some superficial circumstances, coupled with the coaching of false history which teaches half-truths, is another obstacle to peace. 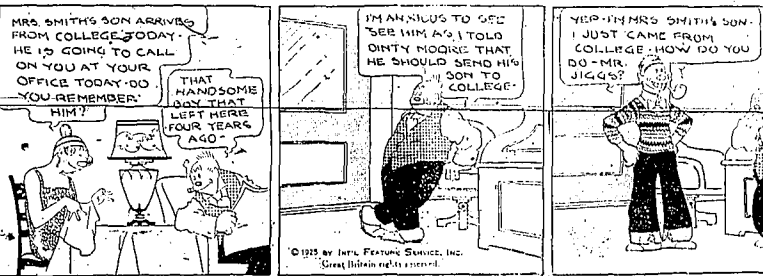

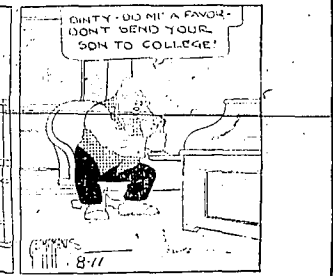
