

AMERICA HAS INTEREST IN SAFE PACT

Negotiations Between British and French Foreign Ministers Is of Keen Interest to the United States and Ambassador Houghton Is on the Job.

LONDON, Aug. 12.—America was intrigued today here by talk of a possible interest in the progress of the European safety pact negotiations proceeding between British Foreign Secretary Austen Chamberlain and French Foreign Minister Briand.

The rather more direct interest of the United States was interpreted from the fact that American Ambassador Albert B. Houghton was one of Chamberlain's guests at a dinner in honor of Briand, held at the Hotel de Ville and Italian embassy.

But keen diplomatic circumstances averted further "official" American participation in the situation.

It was pointed out that the American experience in Germany as the American expert there had given him a clear insight into the European situation and had qualified him admirably to inform the American government of the progress of negotiations between the French and British foreign ministers.

It was suggested, however, that Houghton's role was other than "official."

Reichstag Ratifies U.S.-German Treaty

POTATO AND APPLE BARS ARE DOWN

Word Received Here by District Horticulturist Gipson That California, Washington, Montana and Arizona Have Modified Weevil Embargo for Those Meeting Conditions.

The modified weevil orders have been issued in both California and Montana. Washington has also so as to allow shipments to those states of apples and potatoes where there are in fact no evidence of conditions imposed by the inspectors.

The California rules. "An official certificate signed by the state inspection officer of the state in which potatoes originate shall accompany each shipment of potatoes grown in or shipped from the infested territory into the state of California."

Inspectors must be notified before hand and the cars must be clean and free from alfalfa, clover hay or cereal straw. Sacks must meet quarantine requirements and be free from new clean, unbleached clean laundered number one second hand rice papers, free from lime, etc.

In the case of weevil worn inside the walls and getting into the floor to prevent weevil or other insects crawling through the cracks or holes. The floor may be of concrete or wood, but must not be made of new clean and free from accumulations of dirt or refuse of any kind.

Fruit must be repacked from cloth containers into new containers which have been kept free from all hay, straw, etc. of other means of contamination at packing houses and on platform at right of way and loaded immediately into car in such a way as to keep the containers loose apples must be cleaned, the same as potatoes and then bedded in excelsior covered with sawdust.
