

PROFESSIONAL POLITICIANS ARE DEFEATED

Cleveland Machine Politicians Planned to Defeat Proportional Representation in Primary Election But They Were Badly Defeated; Light Vote Cast.

CLEVELAND, O., Aug. 14.—Organized politics, which for many years has held dominant sway over the municipal government in Cleveland, near complete rout as the result of the voters' action in redefining proportional representation in the city charter according to the advice of professional politicians.

Two political machines combined several months ago in a movement to kill proportional representation. As a substitute they offered an amendment to the city charter for the re-establishment of the ward system, which had prevailed prior to 1921, when the P. R. city manager charter was adopted.

Proportional representation as the system of voting which is designed to assure representation of various groups in the city legislature, had a narrow ratio to their numerical strength. Under the city manager plan, the city was divided into four wards, each electing one member to the city council.

Professional politicians, in picking August 11, as the date for their special election, believed that with a light vote, they could swing the election to their own advantage by turning into the polling places thousands of workers.

As a result they are today in a precariously weak condition. A drive has started in the city council to act for the election of men and women who are unaffiliated with either machine.

IDAHO SUGAR BEET HOPPER TO BE STUDIED

All territory in Idaho, Utah and neighboring states infested with the sugar beet leaf hopper, has been designated as the field in which extensive entomological investigations will be carried on during the next few years by specialists working under a memorandum of agreement, effective August 1, between U. S. bureau of entomology and the state experiment stations of Idaho and Utah.

These studies are being upon by beet growers and sugar manufacturers alike as long of vital importance to the beet sugar industry throughout the mountainous territory where the leaf hopper causes annual losses amounting to many thousands of dollars.

The investigations will be supervised by J. Graf of the bureau of entomology, Director William Peterson of the Utah experiment station and Director E. J. Higgins of the Idaho experiment station. Leaders in the field of entomology in Idaho are the federal Dr. M. L. Howley of the Utah station and Claude Walter, state entomologist.

It is noted further that the two experiment stations will utilize field experiments at Logan, Utah, and at Aberdeen, Idaho, in an attempt to develop strains of beet resistant to the sugar beet leaf hopper.

More important phases of the general program include determination of (1) the complete life history of the insect; (2) the annual habits of the insect; (3) the possibility of developing a host resistant to the attack of the insect; (4) the possibility of finding a parasite to destroy or control the leaf hopper.

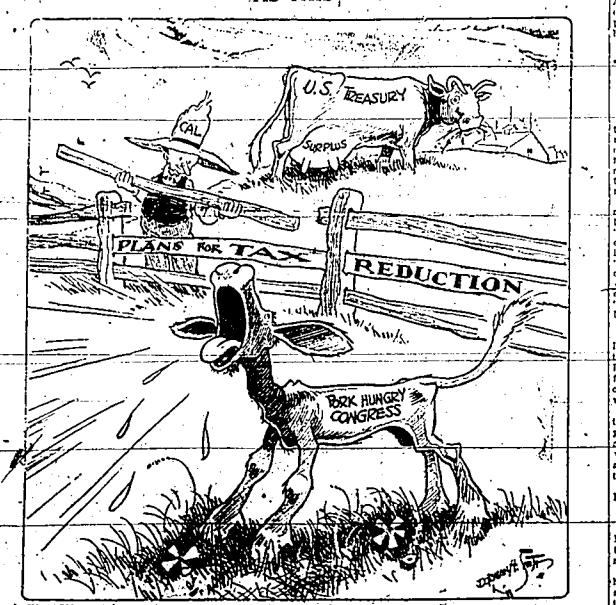

DEMPEY AND WILLS BOUT GREATEST OF ALL TANGLES

Jack Kearns Appears Before N. Y. Commission and Offers to Post \$25,000 As a Guarantee of Dempsey-Wills Fight; Kearns Asks Reinstatement But Commission Asks for \$25,000 First.

NEW YORK, Aug. 14.—Ployd Fitzsimmons, Chicago fight promoter left back in this afternoon for Chicago, bringing with him a signed statement in full backing HARRY WILLS to fight Jack Dempsey under his auspices in July or September, 1926, anywhere in the middle west.

It is said he was prepared to post a deposit of \$700,000 or \$800,000 in Chicago to assure both Dempsey and Wills that he had the necessary backing to promote the match.

Wills and Dempsey will go to Chicago on or before September 20, Fitzsimmons said, to make in a spectacular public showing of how articles for the fight, a ceremony which will be staged in an amphitheater so that thousands of people may attend.

NEW YORK, Aug. 14.—Jack Kearns appeared before the New York commission today and promised that next Tuesday he would sign the Dempsey to an agreement to fight Harry Wills for the world's heavyweight championship and accompany the agreement with a \$25,000 forfeit for Dempsey's appearance.

At the same time Kearns told the commission that by tomorrow noon there would be an agreement filed with the commission for a fight between Dempsey and Wills.

NEW YORK, Aug. 14.—Heavyweight championship matches usually are made under the name of a fight promoter, but in this case it is a fight between two men who want a hand in the money.

Wills and Dempsey have been agreed to fight in the making of other heavyweight matches. It is now known that Wills has developed in the attempt to get Dempsey back into the ring with Harry Wills.

Unless the New York boxing commission shows the signs of meeting today and demands action instead of conversation, it is possible that the rival promoters will hold the line and talk all winter.

As the situation following the commission today, the following contradictory angles will have to be straightened out:

Wills claims he has reached an agreement with Dempsey and Wills. Fitzsimmons says he has reached an agreement with Dempsey and Wills. Kearns says he will sign Dempsey to meet Wills tomorrow.

Wills says he will fight wherever he claims to fight. Fitzsimmons says he has more than a million dollars backing. Kearns says Fitzsimmons hasn't a dime.

Fitzsimmons says he will build an arena to seat 150,000 spectators. Richard says it is impossible. Wills says Dempsey never will fight him.

Ken Greenfield, steeple chaser who stopped the Fitzsimmons and Wills fight, says he has the choice of three places.

After trying to figure out all of the complicated angles, it seems that all depends upon Dempsey and the promoters. If Dempsey wants to fight Wills, it will be up to the commission to raise enough money and find a place where the fight can be held.

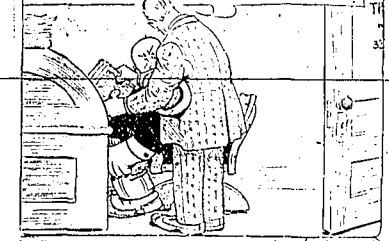

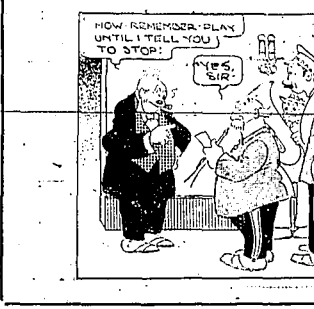

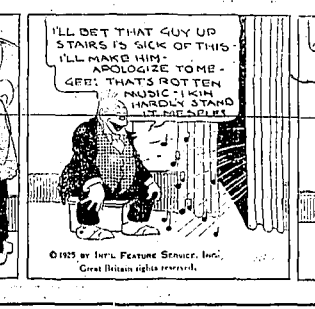
