

# OUTLAW MAY BE TO FLORIDA

### Municipal Police Chief Thinks "Dutch" Anderson, Accused of Double Murder, Is Probably Headed for Everglades Retreat in South; Threatening Letter Received.

MUNICIPAL, Aug. 17.—George "Dutch" Anderson, notorious outlaw charged by police with the murder of Ben Hance and his wife near Friday night, may be on the way to an outlaws' rendezvous in the Florida Everglades, Police Chief Randolph said today.

Not a single concrete clue as to Anderson's whereabouts has been found despite the careful search conducted by a unit of deputies, sheriffs of scores of cities. Anderson was camped there. An abandoned camp was found and police believe Anderson spent Friday night there.

### Wife Has A.M.I.

Charles "One Arm" Wolfe, arrested shortly after the killing, has a "perfect alibi." His attorney filed a motion. Wolfe is charged with having aided Anderson in the murder. Wolfe's wife, Mrs. Wolfe, is a super-beauty, awaiting trial for killing a Connecticut policeman. Hance, who is charged with the murder of a policeman, betrayed him to police. A coroner's inquest into the double murder will be held for the day. Tomorrow a double funeral service will be held for the victims.

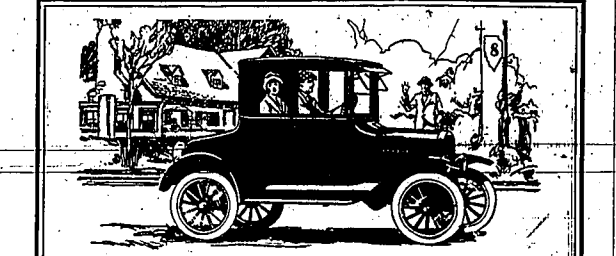

### THE BLACKFOOT TRAGEDY

The most discouraging part about efforts made to warn auto drivers they must at all times be cautious is the repeated reporting of deaths caused by daring and foolish drivers who will insist on taking chances. The Idaho Falls tragedy serves to illustrate the danger of an auto driver taking a chance, even if it looks like only a slim one.

Three Blackfoot boys are dead because they thought they could beat a train to a crossing. While more sensible drivers waited for the train to pass, they turned out, passed the waiting cars and were crashed into by the passing train. Two of them were killed instantly. The third died of the injuries he received, shortly afterwards. Three lives were snuffed out, were forfeited and ruined because the simplest principle of common sense was not observed. They flirted with death. There was never a chance for them to win. Death always wins in a case of this kind.

But if auto drivers will place their lives in constant danger by failing to be cautious, society will be justified in seeing that laws are enacted so rigid in their terms that they will not be able to kill themselves. The greatest measure of caution is none too necessary for any driver of an automobile no matter how experienced he is. When there is the slightest abandonment of caution, accidents and fatalities will result.—Exchange.

### TOURISTS AND NORTH AND SOUTH HIGHWAY

Diverting tourists traveling east and west across the country over the north and south highway is meeting with success. The North Idaho and South Highway association is keeping a check on the cars that are passing over this scenic route and its agents are busily engaged in diverting tourists north, from the south, and south, from the north. Northern Idaho cities and Spokane, the metropolis of this Idaho empire, are becoming greatly interested in this Idaho road. Southern Idaho has shown more interest than its northern neighbors, because, no doubt, more people reside in this part of the state and they are interested in seeing the panhandle.

The north and south highway will be used extensively only if Idaho citizens take an interest in it and organize to systematically divert travel over it. And by that action they will be doing tourists a real favor, for the north and south highway is well worth seeing. Spokane ought to be as interested in the development of this highway as Idaho cities and towns, for a vast amount of tourist travel is not going to Spokane because it is being diverted west into Portland. And tourists having the choice of several loop trips to reach either Portland or Spokane, can use both the Old Oregon Trail and the north and south highway.

It is interesting as well as significant to witness the growing interest in the development of the North and South highway. Unfortunately the last Idaho legislature took about as much interest in it as it did in everything else that came before it and that was little. The legislature did not seem to have the capacity to appreciate the importance of this or other highways to this state and the necessity for their development. And it has been proven beyond question of argument the state that lags behind in road construction and maintenance can forget attracting tourists or tourist travel.

The people are moving about. They are traveling for pleasure and comfort. But they avoid inferior roads wherever and whenever possible and it is not putting the case too strongly to say they will stay out of a state that has inferior roads. There are other states with good roads they can pass through.

Idaho needs an awakening in road construction. The department of public works and the highway department, which is under its supervision, is doing what it can but it cannot get the result Idaho should have when forced to work on a shoestring. That is where the legislature left it.—Capital News.

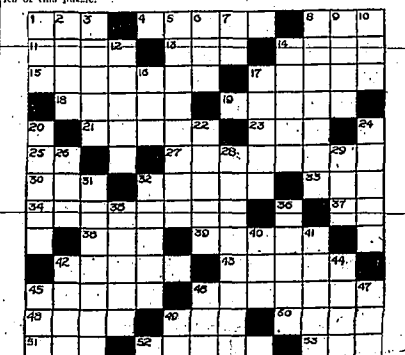

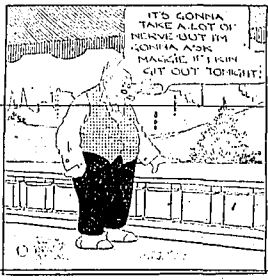

# IDAHO GIVEN BLACK EYE BY LEADING MEN

## Resolution Asking That Twin Falls County and Southern Idaho Be Praised Instead of Slammed as Some Statesmen Have Been Doing; Kiwanis Club Elects Delegates to Convention.
