COUNTY ROADS AND TAXES

The report of the Idaho State Automobile association on county road conditions, and its appeal for better year by year maintenance in the interest of economy and to safeguard a heavy investment, raises the question. How far should we go in immediate tax reduction at the expense of the roads?

The average citizen spends a certain amount each year for the upkeep of his property, without which it would fall into decay and ultimately necessitate a heavier expense than if carried annually.

If the same rule may be applied to public property, it may consistently be contended that to allow our county roads to deteriorate in the name of tax reduction constitutes false economy. With such a program we have already reached a stage of reconstruction, whereas annual maintenance would have avoided it and the big expense involved.

CONSTITUTION WEEK PROCLAMATION

(By Governor C. C. Moore)

"I believe that we Americans have the best government that has ever been created—the freest and the most just for all the people—and that it is my duty to uphold and defend this government at all times. I believe that just as the 'Minute Man of the Revolution' was ready upon a moment's notice to defend his rights against foreign usurpation, it is my duty as a patriotic American to be a 'Minute Man of the Constitution,' ready at all times to defend the long-established and cherished institutions of our Government against attacks, either from within or without, and to do my part in preserving the blessings of liberty for which my revolutionary forefathers fought and died."

The adoption and practice of the above quoted creed by everyone who calls himself an American would soon remove the need of protection to the Constitution by campaigns of education to arouse the citizens of this country to the perils of attacks from both open and secret propagandists, who advocate the overthrow of our present form of government for one of class tyranny.

Realizing the growth and extent of the plan for the destructive revolution in the United States, six years ago patriotic organizations inaugurated a campaign to overcome the evil consequences already noted, and to educate the American people to an appreciation of their fundamental law—the Constitution.

Thousands throughout the land have thus been awakened to the essential need of nation-wide education concerning the principles of our government. No other political document ever framed can even form an interesting comparison with the insight, inspiration, power and justice which the Constitution embodies. The more deeply it is understood, the more will it compel general appreciation and gratitude.

Now, therefore, I, C. C.
