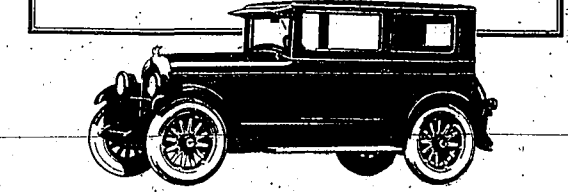

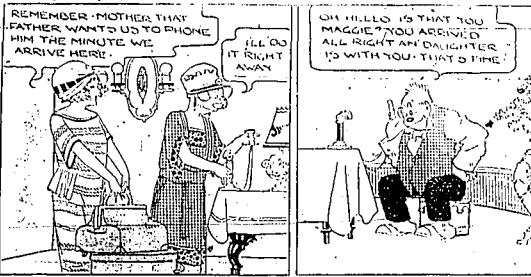

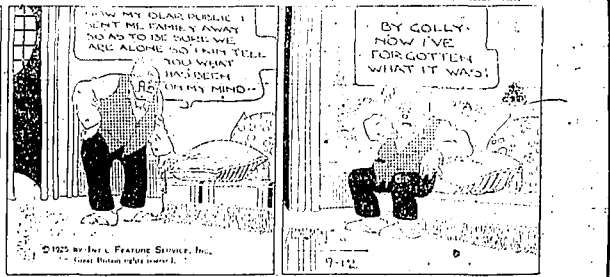

Perry of the American Legion, and Secretary Charles D. CASTLEFORD MAN WITH GUN MAKES GRAVE CHARGE

Jackie Matthews Jr. Taylor Is Quoted As Saying He Will Appeal to Law to Prosecute Man Whom He Says Represented Him in Buying Automobile in Order to Get Him.

Up to present time this afternoon definite action had been taken in regard to statements alleged to have been made by Jackie Taylor of Castleford to the effect that Ted Cornell and T. D. McKee had made false statements in an affidavit naming his daughter, Bettie, to be more than 18 years of age as a result of which a license for a Buick car had been granted to Cornell to drive the car on Wednesday afternoon, and on learning of it, McKee is said to have threatened violence to Cornell. Taylor is not in town today, officers said, and the boys are held pending further investigation.

Late yesterday afternoon Sheriff M. E. Pugh received a telephone message from Castleford, in which a man named T. Taylor was threatening somebody if he could get car license. The sheriff went out on the place and found Mr. Taylor in a very indignant frame of mind. He had a pistol but no ammunition. He explained that, according to information he had through the newspaper, a man named Ted Cornell had started his daughter, Bettie, who was stated to be under 18 years of age.

The sheriff explained that if such were the case, somebody must have sworn to an affidavit making satisfactory statements and that the proper authorities would be to take such steps as the law prescribed. Mr. Taylor came to town with the sheriff. It is said that he suspected the father of young Bettie with being the other witness in the case. This suspicion, if held, proved unfounded, as the other witness was T. D. McKee, who was employed on a threshing machine near the city. Taylor said the car was a Buick, which he had bought from a man named Taylor, who he said had been brought to town and carried off, after which the car returned to him and he with her parents as if nothing had occurred. Sheriff Pugh went out where Cornell and McKee were working and took them into custody pending further investigation.

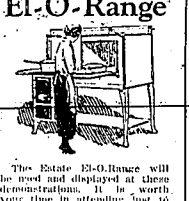
