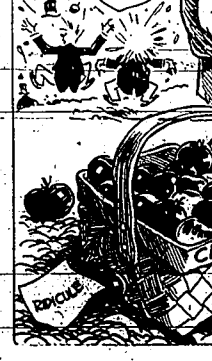

# WESTERN COW MAKES A NEW WORLD RECORD



3-Year-Old Owned by Real Dairyman, Yields 1002 Pounds Butterfat; Youngest 1000-Pound Jersey.

St. Mawes Lady's Pride 51544, a Jersey cow, owned by Harry D. Hill of Independence, Ore., has finished a year's official test, begun at 3 years 7 months of age, with 14,243 pounds of milk and 1,002.25 pounds butter-fat to her credit. Her milk averaged 7.1 per cent butter-fat for the year. With this remarkable record she becomes world's champion 3-year-old Jersey, surpassing the famous Jullifer 42545, owned by Hugh W. Hannah of Ohio, who has 914 pounds of fat to her credit.

The new champion is the youngest Jersey cow record to date—over 1000 pounds of fat in a year's test. She is a full sister to St. Mawes Lady's Pride, world's record holder yearling with 829 pounds of fat. Lady's Pride produced 1023 pounds of fat as a junior 3-year-old, and her full sisters have both produced over 1000 pounds of fat, and each holds a world's record.

St. Mawes Lady's Pride first freshened as a senior yearling. She finished in 1921 with 720.75 pounds of fat and was high Jersey for the year. In that class, she stands fourth in that class now, while her full sister in high cow, or world's champion.

Mr. Hill who owns St. Mawes Lady's Pride is a real dairyman with a wide reputation as a great feeder of dairy cattle. He has a herd of ten milking cows and makes his living by the production of his full herd and the young stock he sells. A recent check-up showed that he had a herd average of 5700 pounds of fat per cow, the average one of the class being 2 years and 11 months. One of the records was made in a 305-day test. Mr. Hill has been troubled with rheumatism lately and Mr. M. N. Tibbels, also of Independence, had full charge of St. Mawes Lady's Pride at his farm during her entire test. The result that he obtained speaks for itself, and it also shows that Hill Jersey can make records both at home and on other farms.

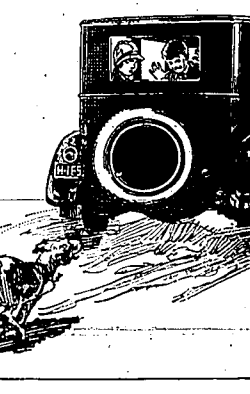

## ARMY MEN GETTING BIRDSEYE VIEW RECORD OF ALL NATIONAL PARKS

GLACIER PARK, Mont., Sept. 16.—Capt. A. W. Stevens and Lt. John A. Macready of the U. S. Army air service have completed the task of photographing various features of Glacier National park from the air. This is the first complete record of birdseye views that Uncle Sam has had made of his national parks.

In the past week these aviators made eight trips over Glacier park, below in the air eight hours and flying 1100 miles. In all they have taken 500 views of the park from points ranging from 1000 feet above the level of one of the lakes to the altitude above sea level of 15,000 feet over the Continental Divide.

Sunday they obtained a series of views from practically the same point which will produce a complete panorama of the park.

These views are being taken for the national park service and they will be used by the bureau in its various publications and will be exhibited at the centennial exposition at Philadelphia next year. The men are flying in a Delwind army observation plane, Captain Stevens is from McCook flying field, and Lieutenant Macready is from the Wilbur Wright flying field, both at Dayton, O., from where they set out 27 days ago. They already have flown 10,000 miles. They expect to cover 15,000 miles and will take 3000 pictures. other results of prohibition the council reported:  
Raided close speak-easies up for a while, but soon afterwards liquor appears as plentiful as ever. No one has the least difficulty obtaining all the drink he wants whenever he wants it.

"Booth liquor probably tends artificially to increase the number of deaths from alcoholic poisoning and the death figures are not as significant as they otherwise would be before this time have been able to secure an adequate study of its economic effects. Organizations of business men and employers seem to be afraid to take up the question for study because it is a highly controversial."

The death rate in Kansas, New York and Massachusetts has increased materially since 1920 while liquor fatalities remained about stationary in Indiana and Ohio.

Alcoholic intemperance in the United States is now much less prevalent than it was in 1910 but more prevalent than in 1920. The rate of decline since 1920 is greater among women than among men.

Prohibition, however, has a decidedly beneficial effect on business from an economic standpoint and has aided in making the American home more stable.

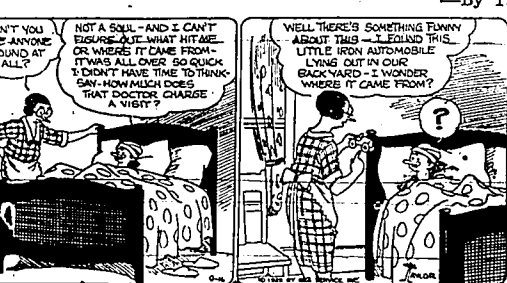

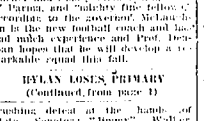
