

REACTION TO BARRING RED, HITS CAPITOL

Condemnation and 'Praise Showed Upon Secretary of State Kellogg for Decision Not to Permit Communist in America; Borah Opposed.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 17.—Secretary of State Kellogg today assumed entire responsibility for barring Senator Saklatvala, Parry, communist and a member of the British parliament, from the United States.

Asked today after a conference with President Coolidge whether the president intended to bar the British member, Kellogg said: "I assume entire responsibility. That is all I can say."

Kellogg denied that he had taken into account the fact that Saklatvala is a member of the British parliament, although it is generally assumed here that Kellogg's decision was based on that fact.

Representative Theodore Burton of Ohio, a leading member of the American group of the inter-parliamentary union, and Senator Borah, both participated in conference with Kellogg.

Secretary of State Kellogg is absolutely sure from every angle of view, that there is no possibility of coming to the convention of the union as a member of the British parliament.

Whether the barring of Saklatvala will be followed by barring other members of the British parliament and other delegations from the remaining of the union was a matter of speculation today.

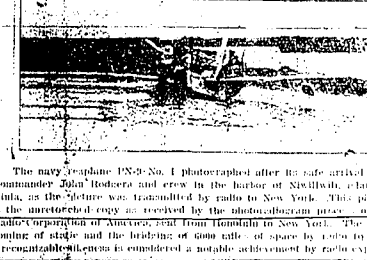

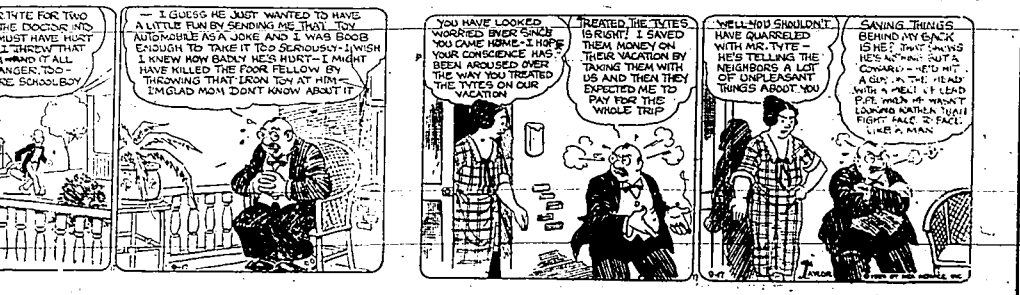

This is the 138th anniversary of the signing of the Constitution of the United States by 39 delegates, after which the great convention adjourned.

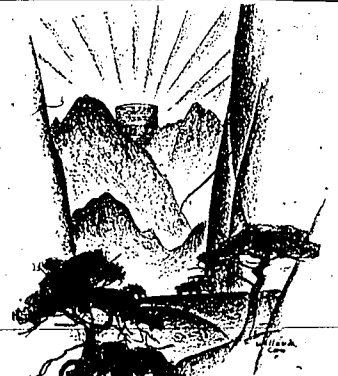

### READ YOUR CONSTITUTION

Many of us do not know what our scheme of government actually is. Too many of our legislators, busily turning the handles of the lawmaking machines, do not know and do not care whether their brain children have a legitimate place in the American scheme.

The chief purpose of the Constitution originally was the protection of human rights and individual freedom.

Today the federal government is chiefly busy with doing things for us and doing things to us. It is a great and costly service agency engaged in about twenty-five thousand separate and distinct occupations.

And while trying to help us with one hand, the government is spanking us with the other. Congress has passed about fifty thousand laws. No one could enforce them all.

The debate over states' rights is livelier than ever. The dread of centralized power stalks abroad. One group cries out that we are suffering from "government by the courts."

There should be no rash and sudden changes in our system, but we know that changes must and will be made. Unless a majority of the people know what it is all about we shall go on prescribing cures which are worse than the diseases to be remedied.

Every office holder takes an oath to "defend the Constitution." Citizenship carries the same obligation. How can we defend it if we don't know what it is? Read your Constitution.—Collier's.

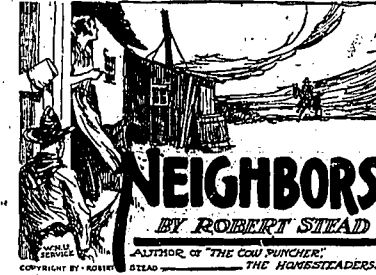
