WASHINGTON, Sept. 18.—Records of radical delegates to the annual meeting of the International Union here next month are being scanned today by state department officials to determine if any of them are revolutionists intending to advocate subversive action against the United States although the only case in which the official attention of Secretary of State Kellogg has been called is that of Edward Saklatvala.

A score of more socialists are said to be included in the various European delegations all of which are made up of members of parliament and high officials of governments.

Borah Gets Hint: Senator Borah, Idaho, chairman of the Senate committee on foreign relations, issued a statement outlining his opposition to Saklatvala's inclusion in the delegation.
