Prohibition Has Cost One Hundred Million in Past Five Years

FARGHINGTON, D. C., Sept. 22.—Enforcing the prohibition laws has cost the government nearly \$100,000,000 during the five and a half years it has been in existence, figures compiled in a federal department today show.

In addition to the tremendous outlay of money for law enforcement, 40 prohibition officers have been killed and hundreds injured in line of duty. A number of dry agents have been "poisoned and temporarily blinded from sampling evidence."

At present about 14 per cent of all prisoners in federal penitentiaries are serving sentences for violation of the prohibition law and an equal percentage of prisoners in state institutions are serving sentences for similar offenses, but the states pay the cost.

WALKER WINS IN 15TH BY HARD FIGHTING

Dave Shade Leads Fight Up to Fifteenth Round When Jack Kearns Goes After 'Mickey' and Tells Him to Fight; Walker Leads in Last Round in Terrific Fashion and Wins Decision.

 NEW YORK, Sept. 23.—By the slim margin of one good round, Mickey Walker is still the welterweight champion of the world. Going into the 15th round of a hectic contest in the Yankee stadium last night, Walker was a beaten champion and Dave Shade the California challenger was expected for the title.

Walker staged such a desperate rally in the last round that he almost knocked Shade out and he enticed the referee and the two judges so much that they gave him the decision.

When the fourteenth round ended, Shade's manager, Sam Langford, gave him a tongue lashing almost as severe as the beating he had taken all during the fight from Shade. "You gotta get this round. Go out there and fight. You're home if you win. Kearns should show the ten to eight at the ringside. Walker went out and fought. If he had carried the same kind of an attack earlier in the fight he might have annihilated Shade, but he seemed content to let Shade do all the leading and fighting and score all the points.

Walker had been trained carefully to meet a crushing attack by Shade usually one and he was surprised and annoyed in the early rounds of the fight when Shade stood up straight and started to swap punches with him. In the clinches also Walker received a surprise when he found the Californian testing him around just as much as he wished.

The worst that Shade should have received was a draw. One good round did not make a decision and Walker certainly won the decision on the showing that he made in the fifteenth round. Perhaps the main reason for the blood from Shade's face in the last round, made Walker look like a big winner.

Shade through most of the fight did all the leading, all the fighting, he wore the hardest and clearest punches and he completely outboxed the little champion. He was a leader in the 15 rounds but it seems that the last one is the big one and the only one that counts.

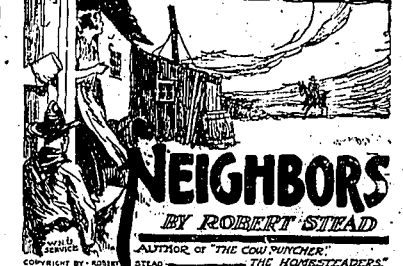

Remember how, in Shakespeare's play of Julius Caesar, Cassius tries to bait Caesar in the eyes of Brutus, saying: "Upon what meat doth this our Caesar feed, That he is grown so great?"

In these days of calories and vitamins, we have come to believe that the science of dietetics is a modern invention. We forget that eating is quite an ancient art and "eat" before we were to eat. In the manufacture of food, our instincts were a pretty reliable guide to what was good for us.

And then Bernard Shaw reminded us that a pleasant habit of reminding us. The greatest of living dramatists is great because he can take the most apt of characters and show us how they were human—and why; how they were great—and why. In his "Caesar and Cleopatra" he never lets the audience forget that Caesar was one of the greatest men who ever lived. He is also never to be forgotten that Caesar was human; human about his food, for instance.

Shaw, with his charming and profound insight, indicates that the secret of Caesar's greatness may have been in his eating habits. When Cleopatra offers him a feast of peacock's brains and nightingale's tongues, he says for instance: "When she offers me the most wonderful wines of the world, he insists on barley-water." Shaw, of course, is known over the world as a vegetarian and teetotaler. Meat-eating critics had a great deal to say about him—but at him—but at the age of seventy, at which his critics and rivals will be wondering subconsciously to his graves or already resting in them, Shaw is learning to dance the tango and writing more wonderful plays than ever. He hasn't dined the world that fix and daint and carrots and nuts are good for all of us, at least he has proved they are, good for him. And, incidentally, scientists are finding out that the same is true of the Romans and the Egyptians before them—and Shaw after them—knowing long ago. 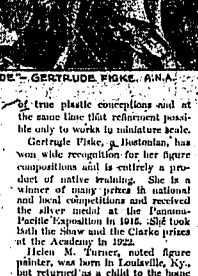

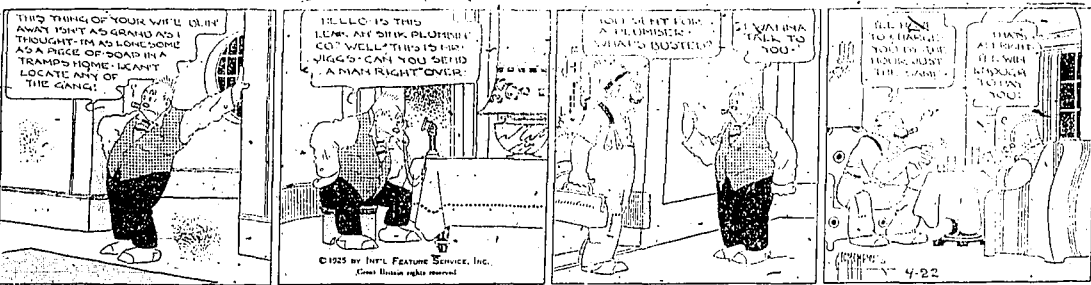
