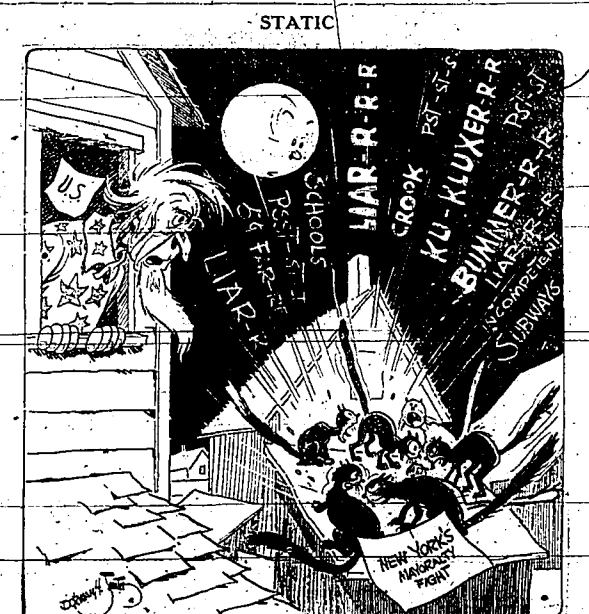

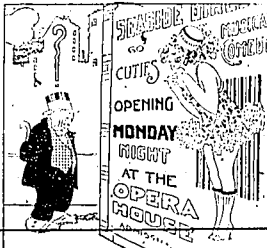

The particular receipts above referred to were as follows:

"The report continues: 'We are not, however, that these receipts are submitted to a handwriting expert for further examination.'
