French Agree to U. S. Terms for Funding War Debt

Secretary Mellon Announced Late Today That the French Commission Has Agreed to Tentative Settlement of the War Debt at Forty Million a Year for Next Five Years

WASHINGTON, Oct. 1.—A tentative settlement of the French debt was reached here today between French and American debt funding commissioners.

On the contrary, Mellon said, the French were informed at yesterday's meeting that "their proposals were not likely to be accepted."

"Such a statement obviously did not come from Mr. Calliaux because the settlement of the debt is a matter of the highest importance to the United States."

The French have made this tentative offer: The annual payment of \$40,000,000 for five years; \$20,000,000 of this amount seven years and \$10,000,000 for another five years thereafter.

With Calliaux scheduled to leave Washington for France not later than tomorrow morning, only a day remains in which to bring about an accord which a week of negotiations has so far failed to produce.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 1.—Canada and the United States have combined to suppress whiskey and narcotic smuggling along the great lakes and the Atlantic seaboard.

IDAHO PRISON IS CROWDED

A visit to the state prison of Idaho will convince the most skeptical that crime is either on the increase in the Gem State or else the population of Idaho is growing rapidly. Recently the writer had occasion to look the prison over and was surprised to find that Negroes, Mexicans and Indians were crowded into the same section of the penitentiary with the whites. Convicts should be punished but this is a little more extreme than we would agree was justice.

The most hazardous part of this arrangement is that a "break" may occur some of these days similar to the one staged this week in Lincoln. If such a break does come all the crowded condition the likelihood of escape is all the more probable. If there were more guards and a larger space for the housing and confinement of these wards of the state the chances for such an escape would be greatly lessened.

The warden announced recently that there were now 820 prisoners confined within the walls of the prison and yet the cells will accommodate only about 200. This shows the congested condition.

Some years ago the ministers of Boise and a group of business men pressed this question before the board of prison commissioners and urged a program of improvement but nothing was done at that time and very little since. The earnings from the shirt factory has been used for some of the prison necessities but this has not done very far. It is expected that a special appropriation or perhaps a bond issue may be asked for in the next few years.

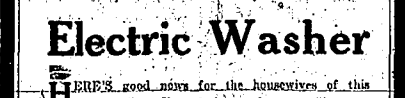

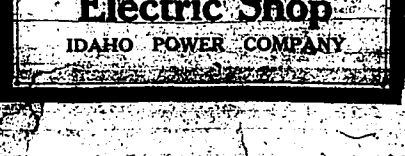

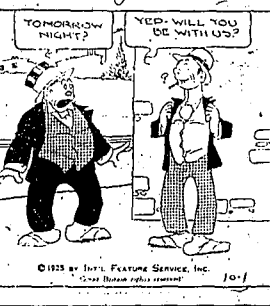
