

CONGRESS WILL NOT APPROVE FRENCH TERMS

French Offer on War Debt Funding Would Cost U. S. More Than \$625,000,000 in Five Year Period; Tax-payers Suffer; Borah Opposes Terms.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 2.—Approval of the American debt funding commission's action in refusing to settle the French debt on the terms of any of the French offers was manifest in congressional circles today following the interruption of resolutions which...

Statisticians estimated today that the cost would be about \$225,000,000 in five years. The first year's interest on this figure is in the following table:

The French are already paying \$20,000,000 on a debt of \$400,000,000 secured through the purchase of American war stocks after the armistice.

On this portion of the principal the American taxpayers themselves are paying interest at 4 1/2 per cent or \$18,450,000 a year, a total of \$22,450,000 over the five year period.

Senator Borah, Idaho, leading enemy of the French debt in Congress, today said that the French offer would be much better for France—more to her advantage than any other offer.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 2.—Approval of British labor in the British parliamentary union here has been decided to bring the Sukhlatvala incident in the floor of the union's executive committee.

TWIN FALLS MAN SAYS HE DIDN'T BREAK MAIL LAW

Fred N. Perkins Asserts in Federal Court That He Neither Intimidated Nor Debauched Merchants or Anybody.

BOISE, Oct. 2.—Fred N. Perkins, of Twin Falls, indicted by the State grand jury on a charge of sending threatening letters demanding money, was arraigned in federal court this morning and entered a plea of not guilty.

"I am not guilty of defrauding or intimidating anybody," Perkins declared to Judge P. S. Dietrich. "This is the second indictment against Perkins in the first having been returned in September, 1924, on a similar charge. Perkins pleaded guilty January 27, 1925, and was sentenced to 60 days in the Twin Falls county jail and to pay a fine of \$200.

EUROPEAN THIEF FOLLOWS JEWELS ACROSS OCEAN

Woolworth's Hauler Loses Value of \$700,000 in Jewels, Diamonds and Pearls Followed Across Water.

NEW YORK, Oct. 2.—A European thief who followed two men plunk pearls across the Atlantic was hauled today by the U. S. coast guard. The hauler, a 100-ton steamer, was carrying \$700,000 worth of jewelry, diamonds and pearls followed across water.

The fact that the two larger pearls in one of the necklaces taken from the Donahue room in the Hotel Plaza had arrived from Paris only 25 hours before the robbery led police to the theory that the jewels had been followed from abroad.

We have merely substituted new hazards for old; we have substituted the automobile accident for the runaway, for instance; but we are not losing more lives in experimenting and developing than we formerly lost.

We have found that nature has her way of adding accounts. We have found that she makes us pay with lives for every step we make in the direction of perfecting living.—Statesman.

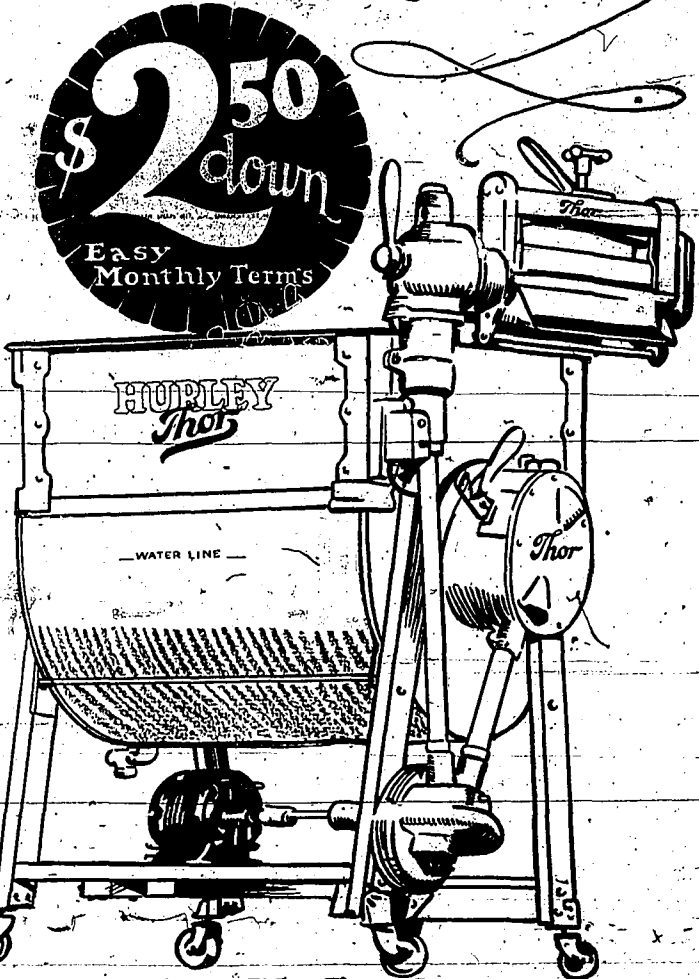

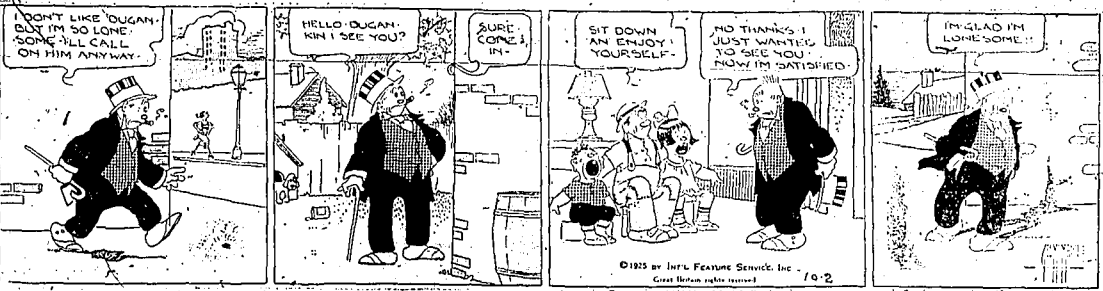
