

RESIDENT WILL RETURN TO ARIZONA... Chief Executive in Address Before National Convention of American Legion Declares Against Increased Expenditures for Army and Navy.

OMAHA, Neb., Oct. 6.—President Coolidge today declared against increased military expenditures by the United States and by the country to practice tolerance at home and abroad as a guarantee of peace.

"Our people here and all the world, and all the nations, are entitled to peace," he said. "I solemnly warn the military against militarism, suppression of civil liberties and religious and racial bigotry."

"The results of the war will be long and we are only at the beginning of preparation for another conflict," the president said. "We must not neglect the home front, the health and the education of the people of the earth."

"If our country is to have any position of leadership in the world, it must be in that direction, and I believe that the place where it should begin is at home."

After praising the patriotic valor of the veterans and the military profession, Mr. Coolidge expounded at length on opposition to increased military expenditures.

"I believe that we should spend money on necessary military expenditures, the president stated, but he urged that the making of good roads, building of better homes, the promotion of education and all the other arts of peace."

RAIL OFFICIALS CHARGED WITH HAULING BEER... BYRANUSSE, N. V., Oct. 6.—Local valley railroad officials are expected to plead guilty at Auburn to an indictment charging them with illegally transporting beer.

Smith, 36, another man, whose identity has not been revealed, was named by Lark S. May, Seattle criminologist, in the suspicion that the evidence against him prevented them from making a prize fight in Kolsa last week. Smith is said to be the brother of the crime, May believes.

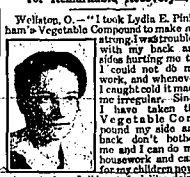

FARRELL PICKS THE SENATORS TO WIN PENANT

Pitching is Big Factor and Writer Believes Bucky Harris of the Washington Team Has Ability to Switch Twirlers to Gain Decided Leads.

(BY HENRY L. FARRELL) PITTSBURGH, Oct. 6.—After considering the relative pitching, fielding and batting records of the teams in the world's series and the mental morale of each, the writer has no doubt that the Washington Senators will win the series from the Pittsburgh Pirates.

It is only a guess and no better than the opinion of any one who thinks and is willing to wager that the Pittsburgh club will defeat the Washington veterans.

The Pirates are considered stronger than the Senators because of the quantity of good pitching, heavier hitting front eight men in the lineup who are 200 or better and great speed about but a close analysis of the figures will show that these advantages are not so heavy.

Confessing to the fact that the Pirates were leading the series with an average of 205 but the Senators were leading the American League with the 142 bases and the veteran Senators had a record of 132.

When it comes to pitching it does not mean that the Pirates have more pitchers than the Senators but the Pirates staff lack as flexible as the Senators staff and as maniac. In the Washington staff and as maniac. In the Washington staff and as maniac.

Harris, in beating the Giants last year, knew almost exactly how many innings pitchers were good for and he made his plans accordingly. He had in Starbuck and he still has in him the greatest relief pitcher in baseball and he ought to be in the lineup again this year.

The difference between the winners and the losers share in the world's series last year was more than \$200 to each player and it ought to be the same this year. Every ball hit in the series will be valued with \$200 and the Pirates will think more of it than the Senators, who have been through one terrific series and two hot pennant races.

With the exception of that annual old veteran, Babe Adams, none of the Pirates have been in the series and their path to the National League championship didn't lead their attention to any great extent. It is probable that the Giants suffered all season.

The Interparliamentary Union meeting in Washington is likely to prove a factor for good and for the solving of international problems. It has endorsed the movements of the League of Nations and of the Pan American Union for a general conference on disarmament and for the codification of international law and it has approved of the world court for the hearing of disputes between nations. Pan Americanism as an organized movement was discussed immediately after the Latin American nations obtained their freedom from Spain. It was given the greatest impetus by James G. Blaine, who was instrumental in getting through a resolution in favor of arbitration of all questions between the countries of the western world, although this was not at the time ratified by the governments represented. Blaine realized that union of commercial interests would be a powerful factor in cementing the friendship of the several nations, hence he stressed reciprocity.

When leaders of the world's parliaments get together as they have done within the past couple of weeks and consider the things that they have in common, much good should result. If the people whom they represent will heed the lesson which the legislators bring home to them. The meeting did not specifically advocate joining the League of Nations by the United States or by the few countries now outside that society but probably went as far in the direction of international peace as could be expected.

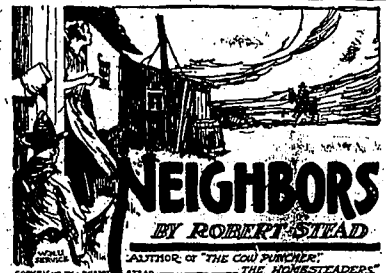
