Pittsburgh Wins the World Series

AIRPLANES CAN REACH THE ARCTIC

I. C. C. Should Have Wider Representation

WASHINGTON, Oct. 15.—Rumblings of the airways are stirring around the interstate commerce commission, as at present constituted, came closer today as the national association of railroad and utilities commissioners prepared to act on a proposal to afford additional episcopal representation on the body.

A report has been submitted to the association calling attention to the fact that "at present there is not a representative of the interstate commission on the commission from the eastern or southwestern states.

Five sections now seem to be covered.

There are three members from New York, three from Wisconsin and one each from Massachusetts, Kentucky, Indiana, Washington and Oregon.

Commander Byrd of Macmillian Expedition Tells Inquiry Board That Flights to Polar Regions Are Feasible in Good Weather; Discards Planes as Best for the North.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 15.—From the office of the Senate Select Committee on Aeronautics, Senator Fred M. Byrd, United States navy, today brought to the special aircraft inquiry board a dramatic tale of the battle of himself and his flying comrades in the Macmillan expedition to locate the "ice-swept" regions near the pole.

Byrd was all enthusiasm over the results of the expedition, despite its failure to attain its objectives and proudly proclaimed that "airplanes are the best way of conquering" any part of the world.

"With more time and a little better season, the unexplored regions of the polar seas could be reached by airships with ease," he said.

When asked if he considered the naval attachment that it nothing else had been accomplished, at least it had been established by his party that the United States had nothing to fear from an attack via the polar regions.

Byrd paid tribute to his planes, his men and his colleagues. Commander Macmillan, leader of the expedition, denying flatly that he had ever before turned himself and Macmillan.

"All to the planes," said Byrd in replying to charges of Colonel William Mitchell that they were built for the tropics and intended to polar conquest. "They were undoubtedly the best planes for this work."

"Conditions were far worse than we had anticipated, both at our main base, Etah and out over the fjords. Beaches were rocky and could not be approached without the dual landing gear we had."

On the question of whether airplanes or airships would be used on future polar explorations, Byrd, loyal to his planes, said that he still considered the airship could be employed successfully. In fact, he recommended that "another flight" be decided on and Spitsbergen is chosen for the starting point.

American Troops Are Being Withdrawn from Canal Zone As Strifes of Street Car Men and Rent Payers Close in Quietness.

BALBOA, Canal Zone, Oct. 12.—Business in Panama returned to normal today, with arrival of officials by train and automobiles and by air and seafarers. The American troops summoned by President Chiriqui when the government was unable to halt demonstrations of anti-rent payers may be withdrawn in a few days.
