AIRPLANES CAN REACH THE ARCTIC

Commander Byrd of MacMillan Expedition Tells Inquiry Board That Flights to Polar Regions Are Feasible in Good Weather; Defends Planes as Best for the North.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 15.—Byrd from the icy wastes of the north. Lieutenant Commander Richard E. Byrd, United States navy, today brought to the special aircraft inquiry board a dramatic tale of the battle of the air.

Byrd said that the airplane is the best means for reaching the poles. "With more time and a little better engine, the unexplored regions of the polar seas could be reached by airplanes with ease," he said.

"All to the planes," said Byrd in reply to a question of Colonel William Mitchell that they were built for the tropics and unsuited to polar conditions. "They were undoubtedly the best planes for this work."

Conditions were far worse than we had anticipated, both at our main base, Etah and out over the frozen wastes. They were rocky and could not be approached without the dual landing gear we had.

On the question of whether airplanes or airships would be used on future polar explorations, Byrd, loyally stuck to his airplanes although conceding that airships could be employed successfully in fact, he recommended that "any further flight to the poles should be chosen for the starting point."

K. K. are yet to be found in Hamilton county. But the twelve men who are attempting to qualify as a jury to try D. C. Stephenson, Earl Klensch and Earl Gentry for murder, have not given up.

One venue of 80 men has been exhausted and the attorney probably will go well through his second venue of 100 "probables" before the day's court session comes to a close.

PEACE PACT FINALLY IS COMPLETED

Security Conference Effected Move Today After Approval by German Delegation; Question of Nation Entering League Next Problem.

U.S. SENATOR TO BE BURIED IN INDIANA

Samuel M. Ralston, Junior Member of Senate, Who Died Last Night After Lingering Illness, Will Have Final Rites in Home Town.

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Oct. 15.—The body of Samuel M. Ralston, junior United States senator from Indiana, will be taken today to his home in Lebanon, Ind., for burial, according to tentative funeral arrangements made today by members of his family.

Ralston died at 11 o'clock last night after an illness of many months from heart and kidney disorders. Urinary poisoning was the direct cause of his death.

At the bedside when he died were Mrs. Ralston his two sons, Julian and Everett, his daughter, Mrs. Ruth Lurie, his brother, Boyd M. Ralston, and two brothers and a sister of Mrs. Ralston.

FAMOUS FORTS IN U. S. HISTORY

Where "Star-Spangled Banner" Was Born

It is doubtful if ever America has known a darker dawn than the morning of September 11, 1814, Washington had been captured and burned by the British; our only navy had been driven to port by superior numbers; our army in Maryland had been defeated and on that morning a British fleet sailed into the Potomac river, headed for Baltimore, which the enemy hoped to capture.

The only obstacle to this scheme was a little fort three miles below Baltimore at Wholesome point on the Patuxent. Fort Mifflin was its name. A small fortification had been built there in 1775 and a more pretentious structure erected on the site in 1797. The only defense force it could muster was a force of untrained troops, who were called upon to defend their post against British vessels fresh from the continent were Wellington's Invincibles and Nelson's marines, winners at Trafalgar and the Nile. The outlook was gloomy enough, for if Fort Mifflin fell, Baltimore fell, and America lay at the mercy of the invaders.

Early on the morning of September 12 the battle began with an attempt by the British soldiers to storm the fort. The British were heavily thrown up toward the eastern side of Baltimore. That attack was repulsed by a storm of shot, which scarp from the fort, and the British were killed or wounded more than 800 British. The next morning the British advanced to bombard Fort Mifflin. All day long the battle raged, but the defense of the fort under Col. George Armistead held their own. Among the men who watched the progress of the battle was Francis Scott Key, who had gone to the British fleet to negotiate the release of a civilian arrested by the British on a charge of firing on them. All day long and far into the night he watched the fortunes of the fighting forces with painful interest. He did not believe that Fort Mifflin could possibly hold out.

When the dawn's early light gleamed toward the fort and through the smoke and mist of morning, he saw the "Star-Spangled Banner" being hoisted on the flagpole. With a heart overflowing with joy he sat down and wrote the words of the song which a nation has ever since been singing—"The Star-Spangled Banner."

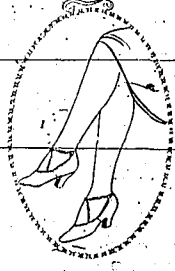

SECOND HAND CAR SHOW FOR PARIS PLANNED

PARIS, Oct. 15.—Paris, in the future, will have two automobile shows. PROBLEMS OF WARM WEATHER FOR DAIRY

With cream settling becoming a more common practice, the production of high-grade cream is one of the important points in successful dairying. Realizing the fact, the dairy department undertook to determine what effect the cream had in the production of quality cream.

filled with clean water to within six inches of the top. The tubes and test cups are immersed in this solution between milkings. One pint of the stock solution should be added twice a week and the original level maintained in the large check by the addition of water and salt as needed.

Production of Quality Cream Important Point

Proper washing and sealing of cream separators after the milk is drawn through them reduces the bacteria in the cream one-half and the keeping quality of the cream is greatly increased, according to the results of an experiment recently conducted by the dairy department at South Dakota State college.

Two separators were used in the experiment. One was washed and sealed after each milking while the other per- one was only rinsed. Cream separated 12 hours later in the apparatus that was only rinsed showed an average bacterial count of 10,880,000 per

cubic centimeter. Cream from the same milk, separated in the machine thoroughly washed and sealed, showed a bacterial count of only 5,000,000 and the flavor and keeping quality was far better. The plain milk in these trials showed even a greater difference in the bacteria present.

Silage and Alfalfa Hay

Glendora Dairy Cow Silage and alfalfa hay form the basis of a splendid ration and cows will do better on these feeds alone. To obtain the best results, however, some grain should be fed. Since there is plenty of oats and barley we would suggest a mixture consisting of equal parts by weight of ground barley and ground oats, and then feed about one pound of this mixture for each three and one-half pounds of milk produced.

Off-Flavors From Turnips

Feeding turnips to cows at the rate of 10 pounds, an hour before milking, produces objectionable flavors and odors in the milk. A successful investigation recently conducted at the government experimental farm found the above true. It was also found that increasing the allowance to a full feed of 20 pounds greatly increased the ab-

tenance of the objectionable odor and flavor. Proper ventilation greatly reduces the intensity of strong flavors and odors in the milk.

English Cathedrals Go

Far Back in History

The great cathedrals of England in many instances replace former edifices that were erected by the early Christians who formed part of the ancient British church, and which were later employed as "pagan shrines" by a writer in the Historical Family Herald relation.

For instance, Canterbury cathedral was first built in 602, in the site of an old church dating from very early times. It was destroyed by fire in 1070, and was rebuilt by Archbishop Lanfranc in 1070, and finished by him in 1174, and from that year William of Sens took up the work of rebuilding until 1178, when on his arriving severe injury by falling from a scaffold, another William, commonly distinguished as "the Englishman," carried on the work and completed it in 1181. Many alterations and changes have been made during the ensuing centuries. I would mention that early in 608, Theodorus of Tarsus, of the city of St. Paul, was elected archbishop of Canterbury, and appointed both the king of Northumbria and the king of Kent, respectively, in his election. He was the first archbishop to receive the title of primate of the whole of the English church.

Advertised Goods Reach You Without Lost Motion. A big part of the cost of living today may be charged to lost motion, to slow, slipshod distribution of goods, and to old-style, wasteful selling methods. For example, every year tons of fruits and vegetables rot on the ground, because it doesn't pay to pick them. Discouraged growers plant less the next season, and the supply of food is reduced. Meanwhile, consumers in the cities near by grumble over high prices. Demand and supply are not brought together. Exchange is lower today than it was ten years ago. In the 12 years since the first campaign was launched, the consumption of California oranges has doubled. The American consumer has been taught by co-operative advertising to eat nearly twice as many oranges as before. Had the orange industry remained on the old basis, there would have been no profit in growing oranges. New acreage would not have been planted. Old orchards would most surely have been uprooted and other crops planted. Advertising, properly done, saves money for the consumer and makes money for the producer by driving out the wasteful methods, increasing volume and cutting down the costs of selling and distribution. And this advertising has kept down the cost of oranges. Youth ranges unending forests in its heroic, epic things of future days. To be a dreamer, with a crimson shirt; to lead troops of men to conquer and build white cities, bridges; sail the seas, deal blows and get them and take hostages.

Such are the dreams of childhood and of youth. But how seldom are they brought to realization! How rare are they who, in the visions of their earlier years take and grow die before the stern realities of life. Only to the few, the men of strong courage and unflinching faith, is given to see their dreams come true.

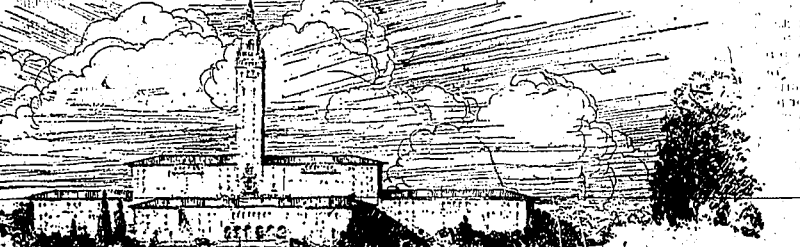

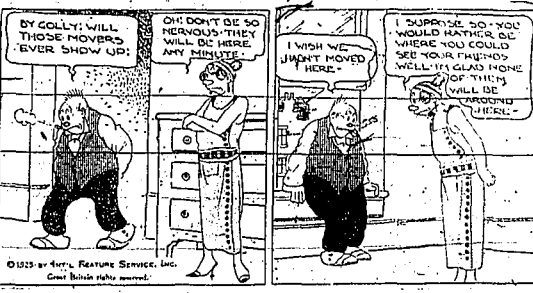

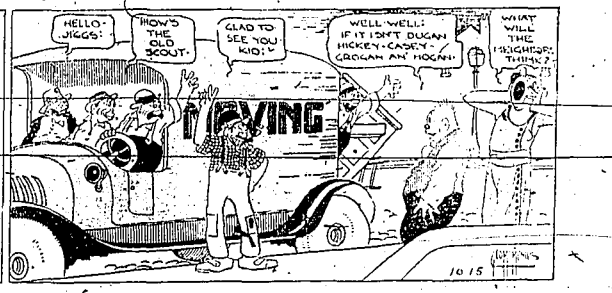
