

POWDER KEG OF BALKANS NEAR ABLAZE

Greece and Bulgaria on Verge of New Hostilities As Result of Clash of Frontier Guards and War Sovereigns of Only Hours.

SOFIA, Oct. 22.—A special cabinet meeting has been called for tonight to take up the Bulgarian ultimatum which declares war on Greece. The ultimatum, which was received by the British, French, Yugoslav, Rumanian and other powers, is a "frankly" endeavoring to stem the war spirit of Sofia and Athens.

The Balkans, Europe's ancient fault-line ground and battle zone, were today definitely off the verge of new hostilities.

From Athens came word of Greek plans to attack Bulgarian command posts in Greece, and to be responsible for spreading demeritism.

The ultimatum of Greece's ultimatum demands for reparations from Bulgaria in the form of an ultimatum. Bulgaria was reported planning to attack Greece's frontier posts, and an appeal to mobilize sufficient to defend her sovereignty.

Athens, Oct. 22.—Greek troops according to information today proposed to attack during the forenoon. Bulgarian forces still occupying a strip of Greek territory in the vicinity of Demetris, in northern Macedonia.

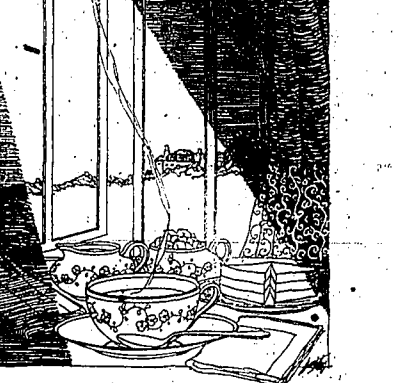


R. H. Lowden, Lowden machinery company, Fairfield, Iowa, today advised reduction of the present 12 1/2 per cent capital stock tax to six or eight per cent. He endorsed the proposal to combine the capital stock and the corporation tax.

A new schedule of normal income tax rates, amounting about 25 per cent from the present schedule was set out in a letter Secretary of the Treasury Mellon forwarded to Chairman Green of the house ways and means committee.

The new schedule would provide an income tax of 10 per cent on \$2000, two per cent on the next \$2000, five per cent on the next \$4000 and five per cent thereafter.

This compares with the original Mellon suggestion of one per cent on \$2000; three per cent on the next \$4000 and five per cent thereafter.

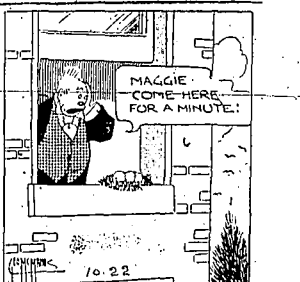

CHURCH WIPES OUT 'OBEY'

Episcopal House of Bishops Also Makes Other Changes in Marriage Ritual and Prayer Book in Convention.

NEW ORLEANS, La., Oct. 22—"The word 'obey' heretofore, spoken by brides in the Protestant Episcopal marriage ceremony has been definitely eliminated by a 66 to 27 vote of the house of bishops of the church. In eliminating the word 'obey' the bishops also struck out the bridegroom's promise of 'with all my worldly goods I thee endow'."

Pedrosa Is Guilty of Toting a Gun

Salvador Pedrosa was given a sentence of 30 days in jail, \$25 fine and taxed with costs amounting to \$28.75 by Probate Judge J. L. Hodgkin this morning. The fine was suspended on payment of costs and Pedrosa has already served a month in jail. The case against J. Hernandez for alleged malicious prosecution of Pedrosa is set for Friday morning.

The jury in the case of the state against Salvador Pedrosa brought in a verdict of guilty last evening in the probate court. He explained that he had purchased the gun the day before the shooting at a Mexican rooming house, and that he was exhibiting it before another Mexican, J. Sonora, when it went off accidentally and hit the latter in the arm. He was arrested on complaint of J. Hernandez for alleged robbery, but the latter later declared this was a mistake, and was himself arrested for false prosecution.

There was some difficulty in getting a jury without an opinion in the case and trial did not get under way until 2:30. The jury was out only 16 minutes when the case was finally submitted.
