

CONGRESS MAY DECIDE TO U. S. RAIL MERGER

Consolidation of Nation's Railroads Postponed by Interstate Commerce Commission Until December; At That Time Congress May Act.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 29.—The Nickel Plate merger plan in the program of consolidation of the nation's railroads, may stand or fall on action of congress this winter. The interstate commerce commission today set aside any hope entertained by supporters of the merger that it would be out of the way before congress convenes. Agreement was reached to postpone argument until the end of December in the Van Sweringen hearing. It was concluded their examination of technical witnesses.

It was generally conceded that with the help of the independent and progressive votes, Meighan can form a minority.

FRENCH WARN OWN PEOPLE NOT U. S. OF BOMBARDMENT

Damascus Bombardment Was Made Known in Advance to French Nationals, But Americans Were Not Notified; U. S. Asks Reparations.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 30.—Officials of the government were frankly appalled today by receipt of information that the French bombardment of Damascus was preceded by warning only to the French nationals domiciled in the city, but it was judged that the official notice of the discrimination would be taken. Reparations for all damage inflicted to American property by the bombardment will be insisted upon, and in preparation for its request, the state department commenced today to assemble complete data on the extent of the damage.

DRY CHIEF DOES NOT FAVOR SEARCH OF PRIVATE AUTOS

"In After the Game" is Chairman of Prohibition Executive Authority and Not to Search Private Autos Which Carry Only Limited Supply of Alcohol.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 30.—Assistant Secretary of the Treasury Andrew Mellon today took steps to make the highway code for tourists and incidentally for those who carry a mere flask of liquor in their automobiles. Officers were banded to 24 regional prohibition administrators to disseminate "in after the game" and not make the federal law "obnoxious and cheap" by hitting automobiles and by arresting minor offenders.

Great Storms Damage Mexican Grain Area

MEXICO CITY, Oct. 30.—Unprecedented storms throughout the central and southern parts of Mexico today, have wrought untold damage to the grain crops in this region, the Ministry of Mexico, during the first days of the equinoctial rains. A cyclone arose in the Gulf of Mexico, swept over the isthmus of Tehuantepec, then turned northward carrying torrential rains which inundated vast portions of the richest agricultural sections.

Britain Plans Two Airships Twice Shenandoah's Size for England-India Trade

LONDON, Oct. 29.—Far from being dismayed by the fate of the Shenandoah and the disasters which have fallen to its own shipmates Great Britain is about to start the construction of two dirigibles each more than twice the size of the Shenandoah. "England has never lost faith in dirigibles," declared a high official of the British navy ministry in an exclusive interview with the United Press today. "To prove this statement we have started on the construction of two million cubic feet dirigibles equally. These are more than twice the size of any dirigible ever before constructed."

IDAHO FALLS, Idaho, Oct. 30.—Representatives from all sections of the state will meet in Boise December 3, 4 and 5 at which time plans will be made for a campaign of public relations for the year 1926. The meeting will be sponsored by the Idaho Chamber of Commerce and the representative organizations thereof.

MITCHELL WILL APPEAL CASE IF CONVICTED

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 30.—A general plea of "not guilty" was entered today by Colonel William Mitchell in the district court in conduct for which he is being tried by an army court martial here. RIO DE JANEIRO, Oct. 30.—Although Brazil still possesses what is perhaps the greatest forest reserves in the world and there is no immediate danger of scarcity of timber in the country, the government has decided to begin a program of forest conservation. Miller, former alien property custodian and several Swiss and German bankers and firms were indicted here today, after being charged with a conspiracy to defraud the government in connection with the handling of the affairs of the American Metals Company, seized as German property during war.

Specifically the indictment charges that by the alleged conspiracy payment of seven million dollars in cash and bonds to the Soviet Swiss pour Andre De Moteaux by the government was brought about. It represented the value of 49 per cent of the capital stock of the American Metals Company. Great Nevevy Burrows Deal.
