### Railroad Accidents May Be Prevented by Radio Device

DETROIT, Mich., Oct. 31.—A combination of radio control and signal devices for automatic prevention of railroad accidents invented about 14 years ago by Thomas E. Clark at Detroit, has undergone successful tests on a regular passenger locomotive here.

The underlying principle of the device, Clark said today, is propagation of electro-magnetic waves pumped into the rails by means of a radio unit.

These waves, he declared, are then picked up by "collector coils" installed under the "cowcatcher" of the locomotive and transmitted to control levers in the engine.

Not only is danger ahead signaled to the engineer by means of the signal, but in event of his failure to stop the whole train is stopped by automatic application of the brakes.

### ARGENTINAISS SEEKING NEW IMMIGRANTS

European Immigrants Are Being Sought by President of Argentina with Promise of New Homes and Work; Republic's Estates Divided.

BUENOS AIRES, Oct. 31.—Holding forth homes and work, Argentina is seeking to attract immigrants from Europe, President Marcelo T. Do Alvear told me in an hour's interview in his home district which he discussed the leading problems confronting his nation at this time.

"I have presented to the congress a bill for the approval of a law which will be sub-divided into farms and sold on easy terms to immigrants with a loan for the years of payment.

"It was the promise of land and home that attracted hundreds of thousands of immigrants to the United States in the past 50 years and this great influx was one of the foundations upon which the development of the United States was based."

President Alvear will divide estates, he said, and will give to the Argentine immigration problem 60,000 many years of futile effort by socialists and communists to force the Argentine congress to compel breaking up of the republic's great estates.

In these cases, "fish skin immigrants" have not sought to make their living from the land, but have remained in the cities to engage in trade.

It is estimated that the great stretches of Argentine could support 500,000 people as against the 10,000 who were there today.

### SOVIET COMMISSIONER OF HARBOR DENIES FOLLOWING OPERATION

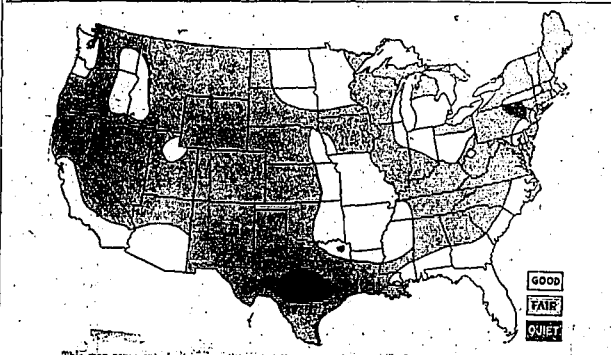
MOSCOW, Oct. 31.—M. V. Frunze, soviet commissar for war, died here today following a serious operation for cancer of the stomach.

### AIR SERVICE DEPARTMENTIST OPINION ON CONGRESS

Army Aviation Question Is Greater Problem Than Muscle Shoals and Is Thrust Upon Congress; Mitchell's Plan Is Abandoned by U. S.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 31.—One of the most difficult and unsettled problems that has ever been tossed into the lap of the question of organization and administration of the nation's air service will meet congress in December.

With a wide divergence of opinion on a program plan under which air branches should inherit the aviation situation is likely to be a major problem than the Muscle Shoals problem which remains untried after nearly four years' consideration by the house and senate.

Members of the air board have given no indication of what the final report will contain. "Those who have followed the air board since its inception are unlikely to believe that all suggest measures that will call for any essential change in the structure of the systems now in vogue in the army and navy.

While the committee and the air board are certain to urge legislation to provide for exhaustive investigations and research in all air regions and corps of skilled military aviators. The need for the former has been particularly stressed recently by the board since the Shenandoah crash in a "catastrophe" storm. Many witnesses have been interviewed and it is expected that a bureau or section of aviation will be created.

While it is vitally certain that neither the house nor the senate committee will suggest adoption of Mitchell's plan, even in modified form, his proposal will be placed before congress along with a copy of other plans in regular bill form.

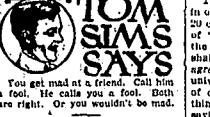

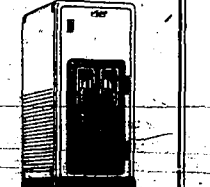
