TECH GRIDDER DIES OF HURTS

Ernie Conan, Idaho Tech backman, succumbed in Burley hospital to injuries received in Albion Normal Game Saturday.

POCATELLO, Nov. 4.—Ernie Conan, star back field man of the Idaho Tech football squad, died in a Burley hospital yesterday of spinal injuries received in the recent Albion Normal Tech gridiron game at Burley, school authorities here have been advised.

The body was due to arrive in Pocatello today. A brother, living in Idaho Falls, and his mother, living in Miller, North Dakota, will make the funeral arrangements. The brother arrived today.

Conan was 24 years old and a native of North Dakota. He was a member of the Pocatello Order of Elks and prominent in Tech student affairs. His record on the gridiron while with the Tech squad had been a source of attraction, according to the Tech coach.

Physicians who attended the youth in his injuries said he died of concussion of the spinal column. At his death Conan was completely paralyzed. He suffered his injuries Saturday when he was tackled and fell on his back in much a way as to strain his spine. When removed to the hospital his left leg and left side of his body suffered paralysis. Later this affliction extended. Conan regained consciousness before his death, physicians said.

It is not known whether the Tech will continue its football schedule for the remainder of the year out of respect in the loss of its star. School activities were suspended today.

Billy Gibson, Tunney's manager, offered the peculiar scheme that the former marine had drawn the color line and that Harry White was the only negro that he would consent to fight.


