NEW WAY TO TIME PLAYS IN FOOTBALL

Brown and Boston University Will Try Experiment Whereby Periods Will Be Called After 40 Plays and Not By Stop Watch.

NEW YORK, Nov. 6.—Football footballists will put the same thing through the most interesting experiment tomorrow at Providence, but has been tried since the conservatives were forced to accept the forward pass. Brown university and Boston university have been persuaded by a small group of ardent radicals to measure time by a number of plays instead of during the periods by the tick of a watch.

The principal motive of the new plan is Harry E. Coffin, a Harvard man from Boston, who is to instruct any of the big three coaches, principally because the experiment had to be conducted on a friendly basis and the big three, as well as other big eastern colleges, have no friendly relations.

Brown, however, is willing to play anyone and try anything once and the officials will be sure to turn the game into a laboratory test.

The idea is this: Each period will be restricted to forty plays and they are to count consecutively, excepting cases where a foul has been committed by the defense team necessitating the imposition of a penalty. For instance if a play is called back because the defense team was offside, the play will not count against the team in possession of the ball. If after four plays the ball goes to the other side on downs, the play will be counted, the same rule will prevail as under the watch system.

At the start of each period the scoreboard will indicate "40 plays to go, time 20:00" and so forth.

CREDIT MEN'S ASSOCIATION HOLD BANQUET

Faith in Human Virtues Is Foundation of Credit Says Chapman, but The Much Credit Is Often Extended, Shad L. Hodgins Argues That Co-operation Is Needed Among Peace Officers.

"Lack of co-operation between the police force and the sheriff's office is what has caused this indignation over the liquor question in Twin Falls," said former Mayor Shad L. Hodgins before the Twin Falls Credit Men's Association banquet last evening. He stated that lack of co-operation among themselves was also a disturbing factor in the police force, which had brought about the present situation. Nevertheless, the speaker went on to say "Twin Falls is the cleanest city in Idaho and the best place to live and raise a family," according to Mr. Hodgins.

Mrs. Hodgins urged his hearers to have faith in this city and in each other and stated that this is the basis of future development of this northern Idaho metropolis. He said that he was a firm believer in the principles and ideals of good government and if people talk about you and believe you let them go ahead but if you tend to your business and do right you will win and your city will win, regardless of what folks may say.

Chairman D. B. Alvord in introducing the speaker stated that the organization was strictly non-partisan. As evidence, he gave a republican speaker and the second a democrat. W. Orr Chapman prefaced his remarks by the fact that he was a humble democrat, but stated that he had noticed recently that New York had just elected a democratic mayor and that Virginia had re-elected a democratic governor.

Discussing the subject of credit from a broad standpoint, Mr. Chapman declared that credit depends upon essential faith in human virtues and rugged honesty that is essential to all human relationships.

He suggested that merchants in some instances, desiring to increase the volume of their business, had offered against sound credit principles by stimulating demand for credit and thereby encouraging use of credit.

He praised the credit association as an agency making for better economic conditions by combining forces of credit and bringing about appreciation of the value of credit.

Suggesting that the association might combine its work with that of the chamber of commerce, Mr. Chapman indicated his opinion that too many diverse organizations were created and aimed for unity of effort through one central organization.

Hodgins spoke on legislation. John D. Hughes spoke on needed legislation in Idaho in order to top the bad check article who are operating in this state and also stated that one levelment of more than \$200 was in effect at the time of the legislature and that some good lawyers would not let the association and help put the law at the next session of the legislature.

The chairman called on several other speakers who did not have time to speak. F. W. Bonham said a few words on Armistice day cheering.

ANOTHER VICTORY FOR THE LEAGUE

In at least a dozen instances the league of nations has won signal victories in disputes. However the one it has just won is outstanding because of the character of the belligerents. Greece and Bulgaria are both open to criticism in their international conduct always. They are insensible to the rule of international comity. They are the unruly children among the nations. Their last trouble was over trivial causes but both nations rushed armies into the territory of the other claiming it was defense. It was clearly aggression but where neighbors wanted to see it it was hard to convince them that they were violating their international obligations. At last the pressure brought to bear by the league was sufficient to stop hostilities and send both armies back home. It is not a hard matter to settle the differences once hostilities are over.—Idaho State Journal.

The State Journal is right in calling attention to the fact that the league of nations had prior to the settlement referred to won many victories. Its first achievement was the prevention of war between Sweden and Finland. Its second was the adjustment in Upper Silesia which almost led to war before taken up by the league of nations. The third was the stopping of war between Albania and Yugoslavia after an invasion of Albania had actually started. A fourth was the halting of actual fighting between Romania and Lithuania.

The trouble between Italy and Greece has been said to be an exception, since that was adjusted through arbitration and not through the league of the world court. But this is an error, since the league took the matter up, and while Italy refused to have the league settle it, it did agree to submit the issue elsewhere, and the avowed purpose of the league is to get some sort of peaceful settlement, either through the league council, the world court, The Hague tribunal or by some sort of arbitration. In many minor matters, the league has adjusted differences and the State Journal is right in saying that in at least a dozen instances it has gained victories in disputes.

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CANAL DEBT IS REDUCED LESS THAN EXPECTED

Reduction of \$30,000 Is Told But Budget Expectation Was \$50,000 Greater, Report of Company Shows; Office Mails Out Financial Statement.

The annual report of the Twin Falls Canal company is being mailed out today from the office in this city. Reduction of indebtedness in the sum of \$30,000 is shown, but it is stated that a reduction of \$50,000 was contemplated in the budget. In 1924 the debt increased \$2000 and the previous year was reduced \$102,000. The effort to collect old debts is proceeding with comparative success the report states. It is pointed out, however, that the company has been operating to some extent on receipts from outstanding accounts and that during the past three years \$150,000 of the expenditures were paid from this source.

The system of book-keeping has been changed and modernized during the year, making comparison difficult between this year and previous years in individual cases.

The hit increase in surplus over the preceding year was \$18,191.57, it is stated. Expenditures for the year amounts to \$17,327.25, consisting of machinery, tools and equipment, \$16,847.97; livestock, \$250; furniture and fixtures, \$423.28.

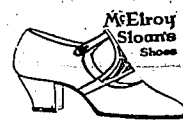

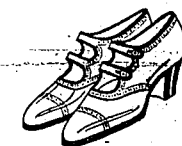
