## Work of Many Years to Count a Billion

It is practically impossible for even the trained mathematician mind to conceive a billion objects of any kind, says the Family Herald. In dealing with the subject of "one billion," Sir Henry Bessemer, inventor of the Bessemer steel process, on one occasion said:

"Let us try in imagination to arrange this number for inspection: Put a 25-cent piece on the ground and pile upon it as many as will reach twenty feet in height. Then let us place numbers of similar columns in close contact forming a straight line, and making a sort of wall twenty feet high, showing only the thin edges of the coins. Imagine two such walls running parallel to each other and forming, as it were, a long street. If we keep on extending these walls for hundreds of miles we shall still be far short of the required number. It is not till we have extended our imaginary street 2,500 miles that we shall have presented for inspection our huge number of coins."

### Leading Eastern Teams Reject Offers of New Year's Gridiron Classics With Western Squads for Exhibition Purposes.

NEW YORK, Nov. 17.—Leading eastern teams probably will not be available for any post season series of any kind. It has been learned from a well informed source that could be the best attractions. Either arrangements or faculty objections are the main reasons.

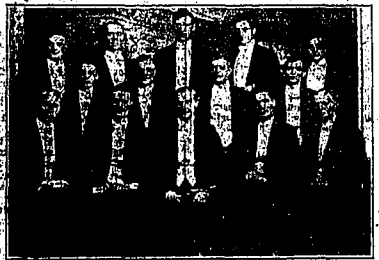
Dartmouth, leader, outstanding team in the season, naturally was the team most desired for the annual New Year's day intercollegiate classic in California, but the Dartmouth Athletic Association turned down several invitations and warred off others with the announcement that the team had been disbanded.

It is generally understood that a policy against post season games prevails at Dartmouth instead of a policy against intercollegiate games, which in being opposed by several leading eastern colleges.

Princeton, next to Dartmouth, in the best athletic condition in the country is bound by a "big three" rule not to engage in intercollegiate games from non-college, or to other colleges with a drawing capacity, which would not include the team cooperation and as far as is known, no invitations have been received.

The western conference is also supposed to post season games. It is understood that Alabama, one of the best teams in the south, will be invited to go to the east and will accept the invitation.

Dixon, this morning. Filer has charge of advertising and the officials of the competing clubs of Filer and Nampa will serve on officials if possible. If not the state committee will make the decision on this point.

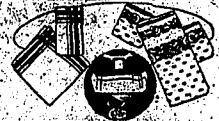

(Boise Correspondence) Changing the Republican party of today in Idaho to a "Mossback party" and that while he is a Republican and proposes to continue to be, he determined there be placed in party control those who will support a program of state development. Ralph Edmunds, field secretary of the Idaho chamber of commerce, president of the Idaho Falls Real Estate board, and the Idaho Falls Real Estate board, has given out a statement released to the press for publication today.

His statement follows: I am always have been and always expect to be a Republican. I am not a candidate for governor of the state of Idaho; but if I were, my platform would be something as follows: I would ask the next legislature to appropriate for the Bureau of Immigration the sum of \$50,000 per year and would name as commissioner either the state or county commissioner of a county publicity bill making it a history for the county commissioner, then the state of Idaho, of the voters, to levy a tax of two million dollars of the property within their respective counties for the purpose of a general publicity.

An undeveloped natural resource is waste. Millions of potential horse power is going to waste in our rivers; millions of acres of mineral wealth in hidden in our mountains; millions of acres of rich land is undeveloped for lack of the state money and men to farm it. The greatest wealth of natural scenery in America, here within our state but is largely inaccessible because proper roads have not been built to it.

I cannot see our undeveloped resources, Idaho is just about 15 percent developed today. Develop all of our potential wealth and our taxes would not be one-fourth of what they are today. I would advocate a paved highway from the Yellowstone Park to the state line near Prater and a paved highway from Pocatello to the western border of Idaho. I would work upon the modern theory that the main travel roads in Idaho and in all of the other states will be paved within the next few years.

I would ask for a law to put the weeds under state control and I would ask for an appropriation of \$20,000 to be used in the control and eradication. I would ask that the law provide that the county commissioners must co-operate with the state in the control and eradication of noxious weeds and in the event that they failed to do so their term of office would automatically end.

I would detail most of my time as governor, fighting noxious weeds and mossbacks. The Republican Party of Idaho as constituted today is a mossback party. The majority of the present senate and house are mossbacks. The majority of the county commissioners are mossbacks. There is no difference between a conservative and a mossback. They both believe in doing nothing toward advancement. They fight all progress. We have tried them in Idaho for five years and most of us are tired and sick of the mossback. In spite of the official record back stone wall that has been built up in Idaho, the mossback party has up the congressional organization. And the state, have handed the power over to the mossback party.

The so called Progressives who are now in the state legislature are the most part, those who believe in the mossback party. They are the ones who have nominated our present governor, who have nominated our present county commissioners and who have nominated our present state senators. Put up a real progressive party for Idaho, for every office in the state and in the county. We will have a population of fifteen million people in Idaho.

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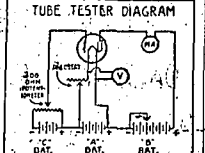
