

## ARMY TRIAL DRAGS ALONG FIVE WEEKS

And Counsel Now Calls

MORE WITNESSES

Defense Believes It Has Scored

WASHINGTON, Nov. 28.—Army prosecutors in the court martial trial of Colonel William Mitchell today abandoned plans to attack the Army Navy football game in New York and gave more attention to their preparations for next week. The court now convenes Monday.

Three events in the prosecution's opening session yesterday were regarded as victories for the turbulent air chief.

The shortest moments since the trial began five weeks ago came when Representative Field, Mitchell's counsel, overboarded his evidence with L. K. King, court member, characterizing Field's questioning of a witness as "damn rot."

General King apologized to Field after court recesses. Mitchell was not called as a witness.

The only two prosecution witnesses, both high ranking officers who are members of the Hawaiian committee, last summer admitted under cross-examination by Mitchell that the Pacific islands were given to him.

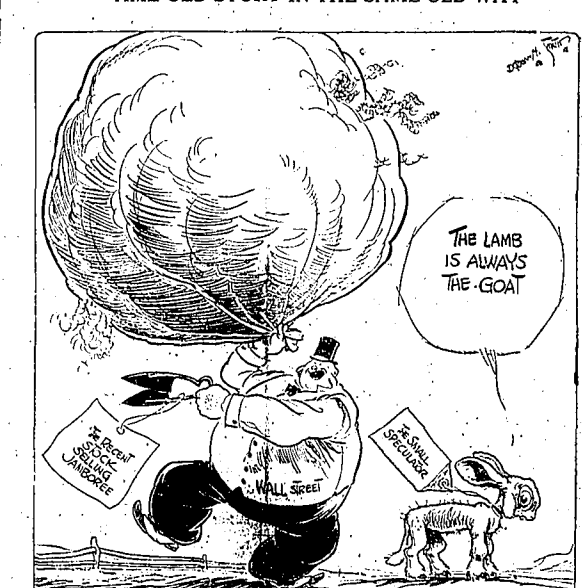
Fred John Noorlander Is Held in Ogden Charged with Murder of Idaho Merchant and Confesses to Other Offenses.

Noorlander was held in custody mentally and physically. Noorlander broke down and told the officers that he had killed a man named Fred (Stump) Norton, who has been sought by the police in connection with a murder because of a statement of Mike Noorlander, brother of Fred, who was in a Portland hospital, suffering from a bullet wound received in the Monday night shooting at Lakem.

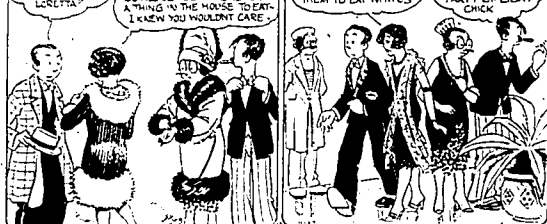

## TWIN FALLS MUST LEARN TO ACCEPT DEFEAT

Bruins Give Unfortunate Season and Complaint Against Coach is Heard, but Lack of Co-operation Was Primary Cause of Losing Team.

When a season like the one which closed Thanksgiving in Twin Falls comes to a finish they are always rumors of "a new coach for next year." In fact, this was the rumor of many times before the season was very far advanced and we feel that the suggestion has a deep-seated plot behind it. Coach Felix Platinio has not had the whole-hearted support and co-operation of the members of the Twin Falls high school squad this season and there is a reason for this lack of support. Whether or blame should be laid to the members of the football squad is still a question but we are of the opinion that there is still another cause contributing to the downfall of the team and that is the lack of co-operation and support on the part of the citizens and fans who generally boost the team.

All in all, Coach Platinio has had a lot of hard work with very little material to work with which has combined to the downfall of the 1925 Bruins. That the coach has made serious mistakes in judgment goes without saying, because the coach that doesn't win on the football map. Whether he has made sufficient of these mistakes to warrant securing another coach is the question.

Many coaches from other towns in Twin Falls think it is time for another change but change of coaches is always serious business and tends to handicap the team for a year or two. We are of the opinion that it is not so much the need of a new coach as it is the need of more co-operation on the part of the players and the fans. Twin Falls must learn to take defeat and not begin to cry because we are not winners. Yet three years ago when we lost to Burley the croakers began to cry and said that same season we defeated East High school 33 to 0.

Twin Falls plays high class football and turns out many of the best high school players in the state but we cannot always have a winning team and this is not the primary end. But some folks seem to think that if we are not winners there is something decidedly wrong.

At least 25 new men donned football uniforms in Twin Falls and these will be back next year for the game but a great many people think that because we did not win the district championship we have failed. If victory alone was the end of the game we have failed but that it is not the end. The Bruins finished the game Thursday against heavy odds and tied the district champions on Armistice day when they lost to the Pocatello Wildcats.

They lost to Burley by a fluke and no one thinks for a minute that the West Enders had a better team than Twin Falls, but it was one of those "when luck broke in favor of the weaker team and they won. But the Bruins could turn around and defeat Burley three games out of four if not four out of four.

Report had no business defeating Twin Falls but several of our men were not in the lineup and this game the Bruins were somewhat unfortunate in that it was played away from home and lost largely on a fluke.

We should remember that it doesn't take any sportsmanlike to support a winning team but it takes a little to stand behind a losing squad. Let's cheer and have "blue sporting blood" and not turn our back on everything because we did not win this season.

# Salmon District May Buy Roseworth Water For Better Irrigation

## Proposition Tentatively Submitted by Settlers Is Accepted by E. T. Meredith and Meeting Is in Session This Afternoon to Give It Consideration.

Acceptance by E. T. Meredith through his attorney of conditions suggested to him some weeks ago by Salmon settlers represented by Attorney T. K. Hackmann, has resulted in a meeting at the office of the latter this afternoon of the settlers in question, with the board of directors of the Salmon river district, and Attorney Ed Snow representing Mr. Meredith. The plan, on which Mr. Hackmann has been working for four years, involves the securing of the water of the Roseworth district for the Salmon land and in one of the points of contention raised continually in the suits in which Mr. Hackmann has represented clients. As Mr. Hackmann goes to Elko to represent plaintiff in a suit in which a dozen mining properties are involved, it was decided to hold a special meeting of the board this afternoon to give the proposition, which will be taken up Tuesday at the regular meeting in Hollister.

The proposition discussed asked for a statement of the proposition and the history. Mr. Hackmann said:

"About four years ago an effort was made to persuade E. T. Meredith to sell all the water of the Roseworth project to the Salmon river settlers. Mr. Meredith would not consider the proposition, notwithstanding the fact that he was urged from time to time to consider the same. However, about three weeks ago, he was finally persuaded to agree to Twin Falls and discuss the matter. He and his brother Pearl Meredith, and Edwin Snow, their attorney, took up the matter on behalf of Mr. Meredith. The first case, however, could not see his way clear to agree to a price that was suggested to him. He felt that it would pay him better to hold on to the Roseworth project for two or three more years. He admitted that he was overly optimistic, but felt confident the Roseworth project would ultimately be a success. In the last two days E. T. Meredith telegraphed his brother to accept the terms which had been suggested to him.

"The terms in a general way, are as follows:

"If the proper authorities, or the settlers themselves on the Salmon, will construct the ditch from the Meredith dam to the Salmon reservoir, which engineers estimate will cost about \$250,000 on acre foot for the water to be delivered, Mr. Meredith is to accept \$350,000 an acre foot for his water right, including all of his interest in the reservoir and canal. To arrive at this amount of water sold the measurements of the United States geological survey for five years are to be taken. All water in the Roseworth reservoir is to be drained out during the coming year, 1926, and if the settlers on the Salmon want the water it will be sold to them for use on their lands. Beginning October 21, 1926, water will be stored in the Roseworth reservoir. This water will be measured up to October 27 and the same thing done for the next two years, the measurements for these three years together with five years measurements by the geological survey, are to be averaged and the average amount shown will be the amount ultimately to be paid for. This can be done by retaining the present rights for the construction of the canal and purchase of the Roseworth water reservoir and ditch.

# TWIN FALLS IMPRESSES ENGINEER

## Morris Knowles, Civil Engineer, Tells About Impressions from Observations Made So Far of the Country and Its Resources; Will Make Report to Dravo Company.

"This is certainly a wonderful country," said Morris Knowles of Dravo Contracting company, who is here in the service of the Dravo Contracting company with a view of making a complete report on conditions and possibilities of the country around Twin Falls on both sides of the river. My work, which has to do with the possibilities of a bridge across the Snake river, will have to do with present conditions and based thereon, some conclusions in regard to what may take place in the future. I do not pose as an expert; merely said that an expert is a man away from home, but it would be presumptuous for an engineer to come here, away from home, and try to tell the people of Twin Falls all about the country. My report has nothing to do with the meeting at Jerome Monday."

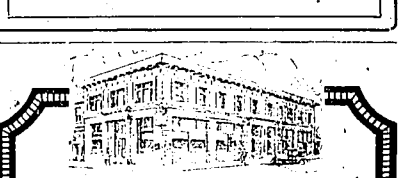
