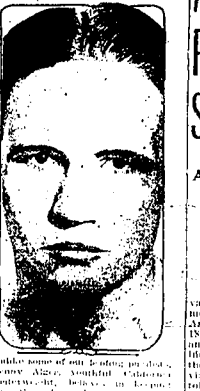

Fire Destroys Block in Business District of Council Bluffs

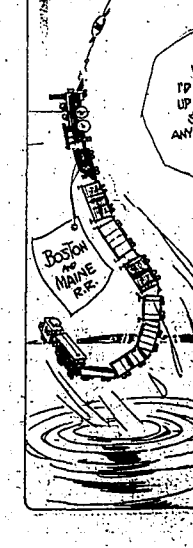

Hordes of Hunters Fail to Do Serious Damage to the Celestial Birds in Most Places; Opening Too Early for Everybody Except the Chinese Chicken; Migratory Birds Victims Now.

Except in a few localities the Chinese pheasants have introduced only a little from the two months hunting season which closed Monday, according to game warden John S. Sells today, after about the terms of the open season following the change of period. The opening time for the season, namely to October 1, is too early in the opinion of Mr. Sells today.

Many of the birds are under development in October 1, they are difficult to catch in many cases, and hunters insist on going with farmers and before some of the crop. He favors a later opening.

Only migratory birds have now to be shot. The season for these closed on January 15. The closing period for these every day is from half an hour before sunrise to sunset.

According to schedule the time of sunrise will be 7:55 tomorrow; 7:52 Sunday; 7:54 Monday; 8:00 Tuesday; 8:01 Wednesday; 8:02 Thursday. Sunset is marked for 4:52 tomorrow and 5 o'clock for the rest of the week.

POLITICS AND THE BRIDGE

It seems that our civilization has become so involved in politics that scarcely anything can come up but that it has a political angle. It appears now that the political bosses have dipped their hands into the bridge proposition and according to one of the leading Republican workers and a prominent pioneer citizen of Twin Falls this bunch of political dopesters are about to queer the bridge deal by favoring a particular bidder to the detriment of the other. We have always said that we wanted the bridge but at as low a cost as possible. Politicians do not take this into account very often but instead they must take care of friends. Even if their friends charge them from one hundred and fifty to two hundred thousand more than the other fellow.

We have always believed in competition and we were glad when these two great construction companies sent their representatives here to bid on the contract for the Rim to Rim bridge across the Snake River. But now according to our G. O. P. friend referred to above one of these bidders is about to be driven from the field because of a silly and petty bickering which should not enter into such a deal. It also appears that some of our state political bosses are messing into the deal and are putting up the argument that we must look after our friends. Some one may say, what do you care, the folks will pay for this bridge but in the end the people will pay if we take the bridge over at the end of fifteen or thirty years as provided in the contract. Then Twin Falls and Jerome counties will pay this difference of \$150,000 to \$200,000 in that they will wait just that much longer before the bridge can be taken over because of this additional cost and must pay that much more in tolls. The commissioners of Jerome county have been congratulated because of their fair, open dealing in this matter and while we do not want either bidder favored in this case, we do hope that neither will be driven from the field by long drawout, meaningless phrases and specifications in the contract which only tend to befuddle the mind.

Too many people are running to our Twin Falls county board of commissioners and trying to dictate to them what they should do. If they do not know what they were elected for it is time to recall them, but we are of the opinion that they will do the right thing if they are left to act for themselves, but if the political pollsters are going to dictate to them and tie them as they have been to do this and to do that, they will perhaps be led astray. The old saying applies here just as elsewhere, viz: "If you repeat it often enough I will believe it."

POULTRY FACTS

FATTENED POULTRY BEST FOR MARKET

It is well known that during the fall months there is relatively little fresh-fledged young poultry on the market because the season for broilers has passed and the great bulk of the slaughter has not yet reached the market. Therefore, prices for well-fattened young stock are excellent.

Freshness and commercial poultrymen should never think of disposing of their market poultry in an unfattened condition, says the Department of Agriculture. This is true whether they sell live or dressed and it is apparent since much better prices are paid for well fattened stock than for the stock taken directly off the range. Farmers throughout the country lose many thousands of dollars through not properly fattening their stock. The birds to be fattened should either be placed in boxes, stalls, open pens or in fattening crates where they are kept for a period of two or three weeks. The size of the birds is an important factor, because a bird that weighs from three to four pounds usually fattens more readily than the smaller bird. The larger the bird when the fattening period starts, the shorter the time required for fattening. Three-month-old birds are fattened quite well in three weeks, whereas a bird weighing four pounds when put in the fattening crates should probably be fattened in about two weeks.

Birds are best fattened on a ration consisting of ground grain, several good fattening feeds and a little oil. The ration which is as follows: Equal parts, by weight, of cornmeal, ground buckwheat and middlings. Another good fattening ration is composed of two parts cornmeal, one part crushed oats and one part middlings. A variety of grains and middlings, although correct, is not particularly valuable for fattening purposes. Whatever fattening mixture is used, it certainly should be mixed with clean water, being enough milk to make the milk out of the water which will run into the pan below the feed trough. This mixture not only improves the palatability of the mash, which induces greater consumption, but it also improves the quality of the flesh. It should be used whenever possible, for it not only has good fattening properties but also tends to keep the birds in good health.

When the birds are properly fattened they should each gain about one pound in weight; therefore, there is not only a larger live weight but the price per pound will be considerably higher than when the birds are not fattened. The price of live birds is not so high as fattening cacklers and culled pullets, and this year it should be done early because of the increase in grain prices.

Soy Bean Oilmeal Is an Excellent Poultry Feed

Tests at the Indiana experiment station covering four years and including 190 single-comb White Leghorns and Jersey Blacks, proved soybean oil meal equal to tankage or meat scrap for feeding hens. The matter must be added to the dry-laid oil meal, however, to make up the deficiency.

The Purdue standard basal ration was used in the tests. It consists of grain, 100 pounds of corn, 100 pounds of wheat, 50 pounds of oats and meal, 20 pounds of bran and 20 pounds of middlings. To this was added 30 pounds of tankage or 35 pounds of meat scrap or 35 pounds of soybean oil meal plus 10 per cent of mineral or 47.5 pounds of whole soy beans plus 10 per cent of mineral.

The mineral mixture consisted of 22 pounds of steamed bonemeal, 21 pounds of finely ground limestone and 15 pounds of salt. The addition of mineral matter is necessary to prevent a great growth of fat. The United States Department of Agriculture considers soybean oil meal an excellent feed for growth and egg production.

Crowding During Winter Is Harmful to Poultry

Quite a number of farm poultry raisers make the error of housing too

many birds and pullers together during the winter. It is well known that they do not do well if crowded and well cared for in a free range. But they are not so crowded when they are confined. If the birds are being fed and forced for egg yield alone, we must get them into winter quarters in their pens early in the fall and keep them there without changing their food. Introducing new birds into the flock of laying birds always causes more or less confusion, and this helps in decreasing the number of eggs laid.

Best Turkey Fattener

Old corn fed partly whole and partly cooked, with boiled potatoes, and steamed into a mash with meal, is one of the best fatteners for turkeys. Give the mash in the morning and the whole corn at night. Do not confine them. If new corn is given, the tendency is to have bowel trouble. For this give boiled milk. They must be free from lice to fatten. Turkeys will be so high this year that each carcass should be made to bear as much cash as possible.

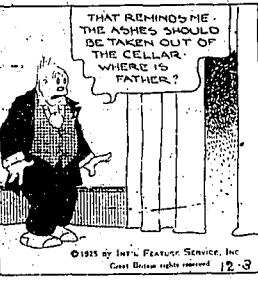

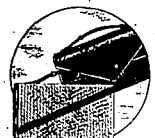
