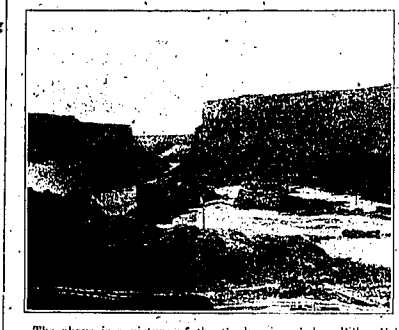

TWIN FALLS BANKS SHOW GREAT GAIN

There were nine white black spots in the United States last year, only one small area in Pennsylvania shows black this year.
