FEDERAL LEGISLATORS ASSEMBLE FOR WORK TODAY

Co-operative Marketing Urged By President in Address to Farm Bureaus

Present Tariff Is Defended By Coolidge As An Aid to Farmers, While Price Fixing By Government Is Declared a Bad Thing By Chief Executive, Speaking Before Chicago Convention.

CHICAGO, Dec. 7.—High lights of President Coolidge's farm speech here today:

"Notwithstanding its present embarrassments, agriculture as a whole should lead industry in future prosperity."

"I propose actively and energetically to assist the farmers to promote their welfare through co-operative marketing. They do not wish to put the government into the farming business."

"Wherever there is a farm, there is the greatest opportunity for a true home."

"In intelligence, in education, in the general standards of living, farm life was never so well equipped as it is today."

"Some people would grow poor on a mountain of gold, while others would make a good living on a rock."

CHICAGO, Dec. 7.—President Coolidge declared the present tariff was an aid to farmers, warned against a government price fixing as a panacea for agriculture's ill and lauded co-operation as a way to farm prosperity.

Addressing the annual convention of the American Farm Bureau Federation here, he outlined the steps by which he believed agriculture could put off a sound and enduring boom.

The speech included extension of adequate storage facilities; co-operative marketing and advice from the agricultural department and farm loan bureaus.

Without discussing any of these in detail, Mr. Coolidge devoted most of his speech to the agricultural capital of the United States to give the American farmer his plans for the future of agriculture.

The speech which here Mr. Coolidge, from Washington arrived at the Grand Central station at 9 a. m., was followed by a series of addresses by the various bureaus of the American Farm Bureau Federation and a small group of regional heads of the federation.

Winter weather welcomed the president and his party and Mr. Coolidge shrank his hands together to keep warm in this kind and before the start of the train shed.

Mr. and Mrs. Coolidge and their small party were taken immediately to the Sherman hotel where the president had his headquarters and should not be revisited. With over fifty major articles purchased by the farmers all over the country, the president's party left the railroad station, cheering and waving.

APPROPRIATION FOR WATERWAYS IS ANNOUNCED

WASHINGTON, Dec. 7.—Appropriation for waterways as a whole, \$78,000,000, for navigation, ports, harbors and to pay \$80,000,000 for the trackage of coal in to compete with our own farm production. Protective grants, also, will be given to eliminate an unprofitable surplus. Any study of dairy products, furs, wool and many other commodities will demonstrate that.

"The total adverse cost to the farmer on account of the tariff is only between two per cent and three per cent."

"On the other side, protection is a great benefit to agriculture as a whole. The \$78,000,000 for agriculture will help us to compete with the world market for foodstuffs," he added.
