EXPLOSION IN ALABAMA KILLS MANY

Family Row in Senate Throws Republicans on Mercy of the President

Coollidge Will Be Asked to Settle Dispute Over Seating of La Follette in Party Ranks; House Resumes Tiring Business of Hearing Further Arguments on Extensive Tax Slash Proposed.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 10.—Senate Republicans may carry the family row over the arguments to President Coollidge and ask him to arbitrate their dispute.

FEDERAL COAL LEGISLATION IS OPPOSED

Chairman of Anthracite Operational Action; Calls Pinchot Plan a Farce.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 10.—Federal coal legislation was opposed by Samuel D. Warriner, chairman of the anthracite operators conference in an address to the American Mining congress here today.

Warriner said there was "much misunderstanding on the part of the public as to the underlying causes of the failure of strike settlement negotiations and he blamed the mine workers for the corruption in 1922 of two years of almost continuous non-production.

Warriner said he believed anthracite is not an essential and hence, a contract should be made on an armistice to include concerning the hard coal industry.

Warriner endorsed President Coolidge's recommendation in his message for some government fact-finding agency to compile "essential factors."

VATICAN IS DISPLEASED WITH LETTER

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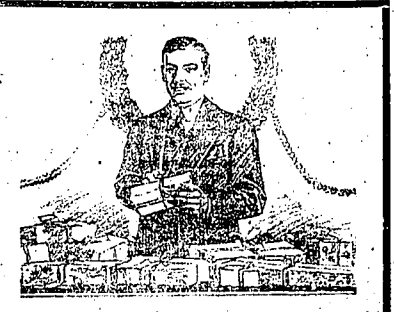

EDUCATION WEEK NOVEMBER 16-22

Federal, state and local officials from President Coolidge to mayors of cities, prominent leaders all over the nation, firms and associations of many sorts co-operated actively and wholeheartedly in arrangements for staging a National Education week at this time this year for November 16 to 22. The National American Legion commission of the American Legion, the United States bureau of education, the National Educational association, the three agencies sponsoring the demonstration, report a marked increase in interest in the week.

President Coolidge expressed his co-operation by agreeing readily to issue a proclamation calling attention to the observance. His example was followed by governors and mayors from one end of the continent to the other. State superintendents of public instruction and other educational authorities, state and local, joined heartily in the work. The American Legion, through its national, departmental and post officials of the Legion, were especially active.

The American Legion Auxiliary came forward to carry on a nationwide "Visit Your School" campaign for the week. The campaign was announced to be to acquaint the general public with the actual operations of the schools and to stir their interest in seeing the schools.

Many large concerns agreed to carry matter in their national advertising for the week. The American Legion, especially Community Health Dept. Members of the American Bankers' association and the Association of Independent Businessmen have also agreed to a suggestion that they display window placards announcing the program for the week and emphasizing the education and training of various teachers' agencies and other organizations co-operated.

Representatives of the 375 national organizations which have co-operated from the beginning in putting on the week are such groups as the American Bar association, the Boy Scouts of America, the Daughters of the American Revolution, Kiwanis, Rotary, the National Picture and Postcard Association, the National Congress of Mothers and Parent-Teacher associations, the American Red Cross and the Playground and Recreation Association of America.

Plans Poster Contest to Aid Training Camps

A national "art poster contest in the interest of citizens' military training camps" is being sponsored by the American Legion auxiliary. It was announced recently by Mrs. O. D. Olliphant, national president.

"The purpose of the contest," declared Mrs. Olliphant, "is to extend information concerning and to promote the citizens' military training camps conducted each year in various sections of the country."

Three national awards will be made. The prizes are to be \$100, \$50 and \$20, respectively. Fourth and fifth-place winners will be given honorable mention signed by the contest and a national award. These five posters will be chosen from designated entries from the states and territorial possessions of our country.

Commenting on the plan, Mrs. Olliphant said: "The auxiliary's sponsorship is the outcome of its wholehearted interest in the plans for national defense and the belief that privileges offered by these camps present to the nation an excellent opportunity for promoting Americanism and for the rearing of a citizen-soldier which will serve this nation in time of national emergency."

Fidac Seal to Be on All Membership Cards

Each 1926 membership card of the American Legion will have printed opposite the American Legion emblem the seal of Fidac, international federation of World War veterans, according to announcement made by James F. Barton, national secretary.

"In this manner the three-quarter-million members in the American Legion will be members of Fidac in fact as in name," said Mr. Barton.

"Wherever a Legionnaire may be, if he has his Legion card with him, he will be admitted the convention and privileges extended to members of Fidac."

Flighting of the seal on the cards follows out the resolutions of the international congress of Fidac envisaging that all member associations have the Fidac seal on their membership cards.

A picturesque demonstration of the proper manner to display the American flag was made at Spokane, Wash., recently, under the auspices of the local American Legion post. A command of soldiers from a nearby fort marched on a main street, carrying bunched flags and at a given command each soldier stepped to the side of the street and placed his flag in the proper position.

Snake River Scouts Show Big Progress

Twin Falls Van Elected Chairman and Scouting Shows Steady Gain During Past Year 1925 Boys Are Now Enrolled in Scouting Gaining in New Addition to Snake River Council.

Representatives from Tuhl, Piber, Gooding, Burley, Wendell, Twin Falls, Jerome and Boise, met in a conference last evening at Tuhl's cafe and took a very earnest part in the discussion of scouting. Reports presented last night showed that in these respective places scouting has grown to the extent that now 325 boys are enrolled in 52 different troops. This number will reach beyond 1000 before the close of the year with the new troops which are ready to enroll in the next few days.

In the absence of Dr. J. H. Murphy of Tuhl, Vice President Arthur J. Peavey presided last evening. Reports from various departments were read and then short talks were made by representatives from the respective towns present. The total cost of running the Snake River council for the past year has been \$3,462.70 and this cost is about the lowest per capita rate of any council in the west. The Snake River council operated on a 1925 budget and realized in efficiency 25% over the previous year.

Department of Education. Dr. M. J. Gosse of Piber presented this report which indicates the progress of the council during the year. Sixty-five awards were made to 325 scouts, 175 first class awards, 75 merit badges, 200 first class caps, 110 "Training schools" were held in seven communities and 127 different men were reached during the year by doing of the laboratory method was used in these schools.

Scout Executive's Report. The year 1925 has proven a successful year in the history of the council. E. D. Hawley, district representative, stated in his report.

Statistics were submitted to show the cost of operating the council during the past year in the Snake River district was \$411 per scout enrolled, no comparison with an average of \$415 per scout throughout the United States.

Recommendations for 1926. For 1926 the executive recommended the following activities: Concentration of training programs over a single month in the spring and another month in the fall; concentration during January on troop inspection by the executive, district commissioners and troop committees; district rallies during scout anniversary week in February, and troop or community "father and son" banquets during the week; a series of winter camps; week end affairs in every district during the spring; a boys week in May. The camping department, the executive advised, should carry on its position and should decide, not later than February, the dates and places for summer camping program.

Other Boys' Program. A patrol leaders convention on the order of the Y. M. C. A. other boys' conference, but with a program of its own should be held during April at a central point, and the training program of the boys scouts should be the special project of the department of education during the coming year, the executive advised.

The camping department report was presented by T. M. Robertson, and shows 160 boys in camp for a total of 106 boy weeks; 27 adult leaders in camp; 85 scout advancements in camp; 200 stanzas in camp during the season; 829 scouts and leaders in camp on one kind or another during the 1925 camping season.

The next regular meeting of the council is to be held in Jerome on about the budget for the year 1926. Members of the council who attend at the meeting here Wednesday evening included: Harry Levy, Buford Kubus, Clarence Paunbury, E. S. Bane of Gooding; S. L. Sullivan, Dr. J. G. Phillips, E. A. Klus, and C. J. Carlson of Teroun; W. C. Roberts and W. C. Pond of Boise; E. R. Brooks and Dr. H. C. Colman of Tuhl.

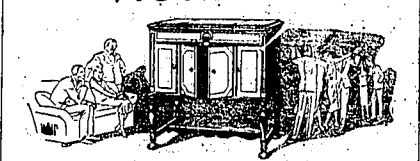

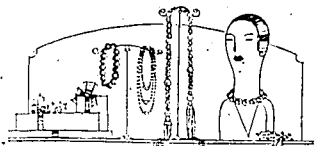
