

## STABILITY OF RESERVE TREATED

Desertion of Banks From Federal System Is Cited.

## NEW LAW ASKED

Comptroller of Currency Would Prevent the Spread of Branches.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 11.—Desertion of national banks from the national system to change in business under state charters is affecting the stability of the federal reserve system, W. McIntosh, comptroller of the currency, reported to congress today.

Legislation which would prohibit further spread of state wide branch banking within the federal reserve system would have a strong tendency toward restoring the equilibrium between national and state banks, he said. Such legislation has been approved generally by the banking associations.

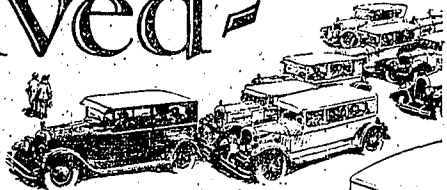

### Paint Surest Weapon Against Rat and Rust

Home is man's dearest possession. He who owns even the humblest of dwellings owes it two precious gifts—protection and beauty. As a man of business he will not willingly see his property deteriorate. As a reputable citizen and head of a family he will wish his home to present an attractive appearance and be an asset—not a disgrace—to the community in the eyes of the neighbor. Every house is beset by two inevitable enemies, which never take a vacation. These are rat and rust. Fortunately, they leave their fingerprints as they go about their ugly task of destruction. The fingerprints of rat are most easily found on such places as window sills, sashes, doorsills and the like; in fact, on any woodwork that is exposed to the ravages of the weather. Cellar stairs and windows are another salient point of attack by rat, because all these places, which they are exposed; while the deadly fungus of rust gnaws at the iron window grates and the furnace door. Paint is the surest weapon against these twin foes. By forming a waterproof film over structural materials, it keeps out moisture, and thus prevents rot from sending its fungus spores into cracks and crevices and porous surfaces. In this manner it checks the chemical action of the air upon exposed joints, which results in rust.

# WIXAMS DENY BOOZE CHARGE BEFORE POWERS

Man and Wife Released on Habeas Corpus After Months of Voluntary Jail Detention

Marion A. Wixam and his wife this afternoon entered pleas of not guilty to the federal charges filed against them before U. S. Commissioner H. J. Covert, alleging violation of the federal liquor laws. The Wixams were represented by T. K. Hutchinson, who is retained in connection with the Nevada trial of their similar plea before Mr. Powers and hearing will be had later.

Wixams Drop Charges. Attorney T. K. Hutchinson, representing Mr. and Mrs. Wixam, stated today that the statements that his clients were arrested at the mill or near the mill of which the federal officials had been told, was absolutely false. They were not and had not been within a mile and a half of two miles of the mill site, he said. Having been searched and found without liquor, they were let go and later arrested. The story that they had, after arrest and search gone to the mill was untrue.

Released on Habeas Corpus. The Wixams were brought to this city by federal prohibition officers and turned over to Sheriff M. E. Finch, through whom they were committing them to jail. The federal officer, who left and the sheriff was cited in the district court here to show why they were not guilty.
