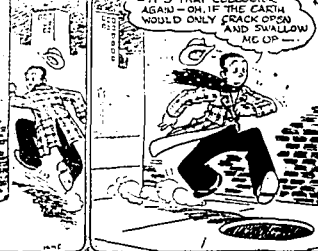

U. S. Wool Production Falls Behind Wool Consumption



The Horn Tailors Guild. PRODUCTION of wool per capita in the United States has decreased sharply since 1880, according to the Horn Tailors Guild of Chicago. The size of the annual clip has not changed a great deal, while the population to be clothed has increased from 50,000,000 in 1880 to 115,000,000 today. Consumption of wool per capita seems to be a trifle less than it was fifty to sixty years ago, owing to changing styles and increasing use of silk and other fibers. But the decrease has been slight, so that there has been a growing gap between domestic production and consumption to be filled in with imported wool.
