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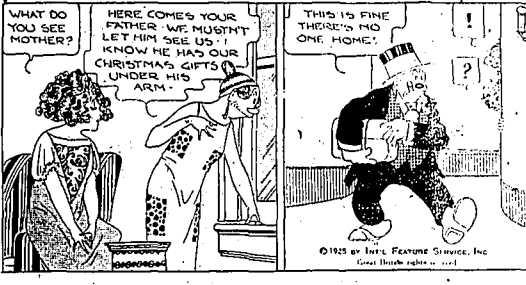

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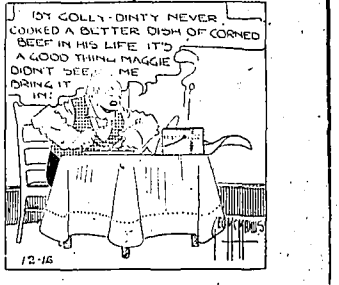

## BLUE LINE SAYS TRAFFIC LAW OF CITY IS INVALID

Attorney for Defense in Dr. Ormsby Traffic Suit, Insists That Ordinance Under Which He Was Charged in Police Court Is Invalid of State Law.

The validity of the city ordinance in force at the time that the Blue Line traffic struck the V. H. Ormsby Buick car which resulted in the death of Judge James H. Bohwell in behalf of the defendants in the damage suit in the course of the cross-examination, Frank L. Stephan in behalf of the plaintiff, had asked some questions reflecting on the credibility of the witness with reference to the application of the ordinance.

Judge Bohwell on redirect examination wanted to know at whose suggestion Mr. Peronius adopted the plan of turning without going around the button; something which he said was impossible with the big car. He said that it was done with consent of the police chief, Judge W. A. Babcock maintained the objection of Mr. Stephan that the chief of police could not give permission to violate an ordinance. Judge Bohwell replied, but said that it was asked for the purpose of eliminating the reflection on the credibility of the witness. Judge Bohwell said that for that purpose, naturally the answer would be allowed to stand. Further questioning by Judge Bohwell regarding the situation, brought an objection from Mr. Stephan who said that the statute of Idaho governing the case is valid and the ordinance was drafted in accordance with that statute and not proposed to challenge its validity of the ordinance. To this Judge Bohwell replied, "We do challenge the validity and legality of the ordinance."

Case Still Pending. Mr. Peronius was arrested and fined under the ordinance in the police court and appealed. The case is still pending in the district court. The plaintiff seeks an injunction to prevent the defendant from violating the law. The defense therefore desires that the case be dismissed and further that the whole ordinance was invalid. The contention of the defense is that the defendant was complying with the state law.
