## FLYING COLONEL CONVICTED OF MISCONDUCT

### WORLD COURT PLAIN DUSHED INTO SEAT

#### Amendments Are All That May Mar Issue Is Belief.

#### SWANSON SPEAKS

Democrat of Virginia, First  
of the Floor, Gives  
His Views.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 17.—The senate today took up the two year old World Flighters-Congress issue for the United States adherence to the world court—the permanent court of international justice at The Hague for discussion with prospects of a decision.

The issue, involving many phases of foreign policy and the League of Nations, was to have before the senate after noon by Vice President Charles G. Dawes, under the order made last March.

Senator Swanson, Virginia, democrat, whose resolution embodies the administration proposal is to have the floor first.

The proposal for American participation in an international court has a wide margin over the necessary two-thirds majority, according to most of the polls of the senate. Senator Swanson counts 78 votes, 12 more than two-thirds.

The chief danger to the measure is believed to be amendments which might so alter it that some fraction of the senators from both parties supporting it might split away from the present almost solid front.

The permanent court of international justice was heralded today as the greatest advance in the settlement of world disputes since the League of Nations.

Participation in this World Court by the United States, the Virginia senator asserted, will not enmesh the government in a League of Nations because no important question would be submitted until such action and then by a vote of the president and two-thirds of the United States senate.

The court is demonstrated that it is able, independent, painstaking and is governed by wisdom and common sense.

### ELIMINATION AUTO TAX IN CUT PLANNED

#### Congress Is to Consider Drive to Strike Out Motor Excise Levy From Reduction Plan Today With Much Argument.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 17.—A drive to eliminate the 1 percent auto excise tax from the \$27,000,000 federal tax reduction bill was started in the house today by a coalition of democrats and republicans.

### KOCH FAILS TO ORGANIZE A MINISTRY

#### Former Minister Reports Coalition Cabinet Impossible.

#### MEETS OPPOSITION

#### Socialists Prevented Program of Formation, Official Declares.

BERLIN, Dec. 17.—The attempt of Erlich Koch, democrat, and former interior minister, to form a new cabinet to succeed the resigned Lutherer ministry, has failed.

Koch today reported to President Von Hindenburg that he was unable to get together a cabinet on the lines of the "big coalition" which Hindenburg had advanced.

Socialist opposition to Koch's program led to his failure. Meanwhile, the frustrated and beleaguered ministers, led by the life of Foreign Minister, Stresemann, offered up here an embittered political controversy between the right and left.

The police have held a Paderborn, named Muller and a national socialist leader and then escape by motor. They alleged plotters themselves were not responsible for their proposed deed. The Nationalists and Catholics who have agitated against Stresemann for his League stand and other proposals unpopular with the monarchists, were to blame for the scheme.

Stresemann himself was favored of the plot only after the men had been arrested.

### Utah Governor Is Opposed to Dam

WASHINGTON, Dec. 17.—Governor C. M. Hays, Utah, declared today before the state committee on irrigation that the state should not support the proposed Boulder Canyon dam until after legislation by the United States congress.

After realization of the dam, his bill would not support the Boulder dam project, he said. James McHugh, Santa Fe, president of the general of the state of New Mexico, likewise asserted that new legislation would not support the Boulder dam project if the water rights of the state to the Colorado River were first fully protected.

### MITCHELL IS GUILTY SAYS ARMY COURT

#### Board of Generals Returns Verdict After 33 Minutes.

#### PENALTY IN DOUBT

#### Court Martial Returns to Jury Room to Decide Upon Pier's Fate

WASHINGTON, Dec. 17.—The jury of generals trying Colonel William Mitchell for the alleged official misconduct as charged.

The court returned its verdict, which after 32 minutes consideration it filed into the court room to ask the president if there was a record for a previous conviction of the accused air officer, Colonel Stephen Macdonald. 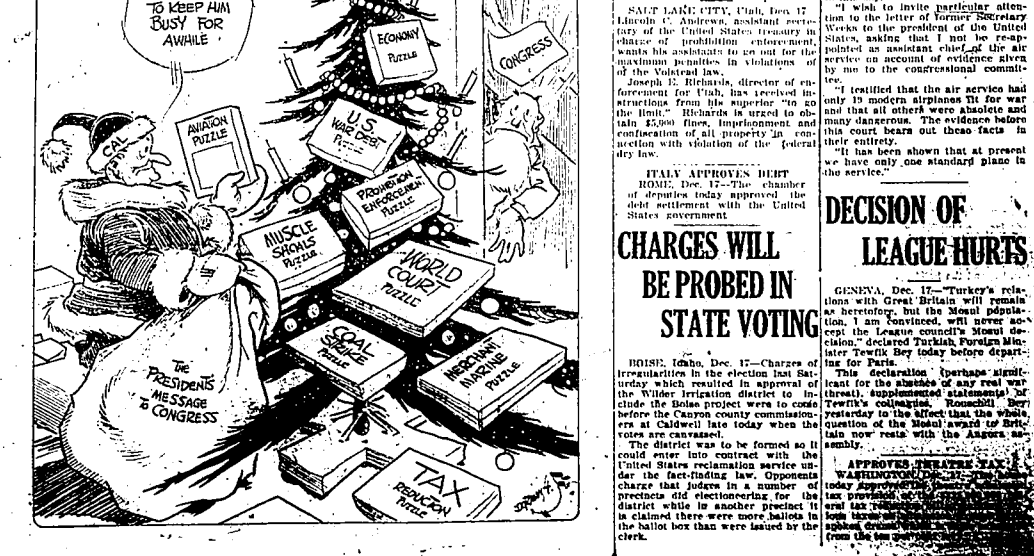
"My trial," he said, "is the culmination of the efforts of the general staff and the general board of the army to deprive me of my power and keep it in auxiliary." The general staff is a committee composed of our whole system of national defense.

"I am not aware of any useful purpose." "It has been shown that we have only one plan in the service," Mitchell said.

BASEBALL TO CONTINUE ITS RESIN FIGHT National League Favors the Adoption of Material That Pitchers May Soap Balls While Others Oppose the Plan.

BASEBALL, Dec. 17.—Efforts to have the rules amended so that pitchers will be allowed to use resin on the ball will be continued by the National League at the meeting of the joint rules committee, according to John A. Heyler, president of the league.

The meeting hasn't been called yet by Commissioner Landis but it probably will be held next month or early in February and three National League members are under instructions to fight for the resin rule.

The National League has in recent annual winter meeting won on record as favoring the use of resin to pitchers under the supervision of the umpires. The American League, however, voted against it.

It is argued that the pitchers would cheat and use a little sack of resin, and leave it on the ground near the pitcher's box and the pitcher would be allowed to reach into his pocket.

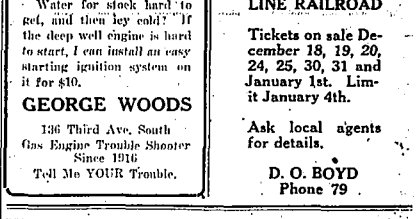
